COLLECTANEA I

GLASTONBURY ABBEY IN 1322.

INTRODUCTION.

WHILE recently working through the *Memoranda* Rolls of the Exchequer of the reign of Edward II for a specific purpose, Professor James F. Willard, of the University of Colorado, came across a long entry about Glastonbury Abbey, which struck him as remarkable in more than one respect. He noticed the extraordinary fullness of detail given with regard to the sixty ministers and servants who were not engaged on agricultural work, and the nineteen persons who enjoyed corrodies or pensions. He also found the whole entry to be "an enlightening commentary upon the slowness of mediæval officials."

Not having sufficient time left in England for further investigation of the subject, Professor Willard very kindly placed his transcript of the entry which he had found at the disposal of the Somerset Record Society. To the translation printed below there have now been added various explanatory notes, and translations of entries on a later *Memoranda* Roll and several Pipe Rolls, illustrating the successive stages of the examination of the account of a guardian of the temporalties of the abbey.

Inasmuch as the extracts from the *Memoranda* Rolls and the Pipe Rolls are given below in English, a very brief outline of the story will here suffice.

Geoffrey Fromund, who had been Abbot of Glastonbury for nearly twenty years, died on the 21st of November, 1322. Ten days later, the custody of the temporalities of the abbey during voidance was entrusted to William of Bourne and Joyce of Brankescombe, but, on the 14th of December, these two guardians on behalf of the Crown were superseded by Nicholas of Wedergrave.¹ The letters patent of appointment describe him as one of the King's Clerks, and there is evidence that he was also at that time Rector of Street with Walton, close to Glastonbury.

The royal licence for the election of a new Abbot bears date the 26th of November, and, on the 7th of December, the assembled monks made choice of Walter of Taunton, their Prior. His election was duly approved by the King on the 20th, but he died at Butleigh on the 23rd of the following month, without having obtained restitution of the temporalities. A fresh *congé d'élu* was issued on the 30th of January, 1323, and, on the 5th of February, Adam of Sobbury, the Sacrist, was chosen as Abbot. The royal assent was given eleven days later. Sobbury received episcopal blessing at Glastonbury on the 6th of March, and an order for the restitution of the temporalities on the 12th.²

Wedergrave had been responsible for the temporal revenue of the abbey for a period of a hundred and eleven days, from the 21st of November, 1322, until the 12th of March following. In the general account which he rendered at the Exchequer, he showed receipts amounting altogether to 460*l.* 14*s.* 6*d.*, out of which he had paid or remitted 17*l.* 14*s.* 6*d.* to the bailiffs, reeves, and haywards of the divers manors belonging to the abbey, and he paid 234*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* into the Treasury. The great roll of the Exchequer for the year ending at Michaelmas, 1323, represents him accordingly as owing 209*l.* 0*s.* 7*d.* to the Crown. Two days after his appointment, however, he had received specific authority to provide

for the maintenance of all the inmates of the house, and to satisfy all just claims of persons who enjoyed corrodies therein, with a promise that he should receive due allowance therefor. So, on the 26th of February, 1324, he obtained from the Chancery a writ to the Treasurer and Barons of the Exchequer ordering them to make him such allowance for these expenses as should appear reasonable.

Wedergrave consequently expected to be credited with 175*l.* 19*s.*, which, he said, he had expended in pursuance of the King's order, actually warranted by the Council. The Treasurer and Barons, however, could not be induced to do anything in the matter, having conceived an idea that no such expenditure had been sanctioned on former occasions. To meet their objections, a fresh writ was issued from the Chancery, directing the Treasurer and Barons not to trouble themselves any further about precedents, but to make due allowance to Wedergrave, unless it could be shown that there was any special fund for the maintenance of the monks and their servants and the payment of corrodies. In point of fact, the great rolls of the Pipe were found to show that previous guardians of the temporalities of Glastonbury Abbey had been allowed to charge for the maintenance of the inmates during voidances. Moreover, a commission appointed by the Exchequer failed to discover any such special fund as had been mentioned, or any error in Wedergrave's account with regard to the stock of grain in the granges belonging to the abbey. Nevertheless, the Exchequer continued obdurate. Although Wedergrave obtained allowance of 8*l.* for his personal expenses on the King's behalf, the Sheriff of Somerset and Dorset was, by four separate writs, issued in 1325 and 1326, ordered to levy money from Wedergrave amounting in all to 24*l.* 15*s.* 1*d.* After deducting this, the Exchequer chose to represent him as owing 175*l.* 19*s.*, a few shillings only more than the amount of his counter-claim for expenses duly authorised.

In the autumn of 1327, William of Everdon, one of the Barons of the Exchequer, having occasion to go westward,

undertook to do something towards settling the controversy which had already continued so long. Inquisitions were accordingly taken before him in each of the five counties in which Glastonbury Abbey had landed possessions. At all of these Wedergrave was represented by his attorney, and in every case the finding of the jury was favourable to him. Under these circumstances, the Exchequer decided to allow him 84*l.* 12*s.* 9*d.* in respect of his payment of 6*d.* a day to the Prior and 3*d.* a day to each of the fifty-nine professed monks. In this reckoning, Walter of Taunton, who, as seen above, was Abbot for a few weeks, must evidently have been regarded merely as Prior. The names of the monks are not given, but we know otherwise that Adam of Sobbyre was Sacrist, and that four of his brethren were named John of Worcester, Thomas de la Nye, John of Warmwell, and Walter of Kynardusleigh.¹

After this, no further action was taken for more than four years. The Exchequer did not abandon or modify its claim; Wedergrave did not pay, or promise to pay, anything. His death, however, about Christmas, 1331, brought matters to a crisis. The Bishop of Bath and Wells was ordered to sequestrate his goods at Walton and elsewhere in the diocese, and similar instructions were apparently issued to the Sheriff also.² On the other hand, the executors of Wedergrave's will lost little time in obtaining fresh writs from the Chancery ordering the Treasurer and Barons to give them due allowance of the payments which he had made while guardian. By finding security for 50*l.* they also obtained administration of his personal estate.³ Furthermore, their attorney produced at the Exchequer the letters patent of Edward II in favour of Wedergrave, a detailed account of the expenditure of which they claimed allowance, and a certificate from the Abbot and Convent as to its correctness.

Still the Treasurer and Barons professed themselves un-

satisfied, and they ordered yet another inquisition of a most searching character with regard to the individuals to whom, or for whose benefit, Wedergrave had made payments not yet credited to him. Master John of Hildesle, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and William of Stowe, accordingly went fully into the details at Somerton, in September, 1335, with the aid of a local jury.

Among the documents produced at one of the late stages of the process were a list of the twenty inferior brethren entitled to $1\frac{1}{2}d.$ by the day, an interesting list of the sixty servants, stating their respective duties, and particulars concerning the nineteen persons who enjoyed corrodies in the abbey. With respect to these last the monks were able to show that all the subsisting corrodies had been formally created by deed. They were furthermore able to show that while some of them had been created at the request of Edward II or his queen, the rest had not been created without good consideration. No charge of nepotism or undue favour could be adduced.

Upon the receipt of the report by Hildesle and Stowe, the Treasurer and Barons of the Exchequer had perforce to give way, and to allow all the payments actually made by Wedergrave. They only succeeded in reducing the executors' claim by about $4l.$ In November, 1335, the Bishop of Bath and Wells was duly informed that the account was settled.¹ It was not considered necessary to inform him that the execution had established a claim against the Crown for repayment of $2l. 19s. 2\frac{1}{2}d.$ Yet such was the inglorious result of a process which had lasted more than eleven years and had involved the taking of seven inquisitions and the issue of writs innumerable.

A.D. 1324-1335.

THE lord the King sent here his writ of his great seal, which is among the *Communia* of this year, in these words :

" Edward by the grace of God King of England, Lord of Ireland, and Duke of Aquitaine, to his Treasurer and Barons of the Exchequer, greeting. We command you that, having heard the account of our beloved clerk Nicholas of Wedergrave for the time during which he, by our commission, had the keeping of the abbey of Glastonbury, by reason of the last voidance of the same, you cause the same Nicholas to have due allowance as you shall think reasonable for the charges (*misis*) and expenses incurred by him during the aforesaid voidance for the maintenance of the monks, of the servants, and of the other ministers of the same abbey, and also for reasonable corrodies granted to divers men in the same abbey. Witness myself at Westminster the 26th day of February in the 17th year of our reign."

He also sent here another writ, which is among the *Communia* of this year, in these words :

" Edward, etc. (as above). Whereas we lately commanded you that, having heard the account of our beloved clerk Nicholas of Wedergrave for the time during which he, by our commission, had the keeping of the abbey of Glastonbury, by reason of the last voidance of the same, you should cause the same Nicholas to have due allowance as you should think reasonable for the charges and expenses incurred by him during the aforesaid voidance for the maintenance of the monks, of the servants, and of the other ministers of the same abbey, and also for reason-

able corrodies granted to divers men in the same abbey, and you have up to the present deferred making such allowance to the aforesaid Nicholas because you do not find that such allowance had been sued out (*exactam*) in previous voidances of that abbey, as we are informed on behalf of the same Nicholas, we, desiring that what is just should be done herein, command you that, if it shall appear to you that certain manors or rents were not set apart (*deputata*), at times of such voidances, for the maintenance of the aforesaid monks, servants and ministers, and of others having corrodies, then, notwithstanding that such allowance was not formerly sued out, you shall cause the same Nicholas to have reasonable allowance for the aforesaid payments and expenses. Witness myself at Westminster the 25th [day] of March in the 17th year of our reign."

And, after the hearing of the account of the aforesaid Nicholas of the issues of the aforesaid abbey, that is to say from the 21st day of November in the 16th year until the 12th day of March next following, the same Nicholas, at the end of his account, craved that there should be allowed to him 175*l.* 19*s.*, which he says that he paid out of the issues of the abbey aforesaid to the Prior himself and fifty-nine monks of the same abbey for their maintenance during the aforesaid time, the Prior receiving 6*d.* a day, and each of the said monks 3*d.* a day, and also to divers men taking corrodies in the aforesaid abbey granted to them by charters, etc. during the same time.

Which allowance the Barons deferred (*supersederunt*) to make until they should be informed by search of the rolls, that is to say, whether such allowance was made to other guardians in like voidances of the aforesaid house in times past, etc. After search as to this, in pursuance of these commands, it was found in the second roll of King Edward, father of the present King, in the account of William de Gaugeto of the issues of the aforesaid abbey, from the 10th day of September in the same 2nd year until the 20th day of

March in the 3rd year, that the same William accounts as paid to the Prior and Convent of the aforesaid abbey for their kitchen during the same time $27l.$ by the King's writ.¹ It was also found in the fourth roll of the same King Edward the father in the account of Geoffrey Foliot, then guardian of the aforesaid abbey from the 5th day of April in the 2nd year aforesaid until the feast of St. Matthew the Apostle next following, that is to say for twenty-four weeks, that the same Geoffrey accounts as paid to the Prior and Convent of the said abbey for their kitchen for the same time $24l.$, taking by the week $20s.$ ² And because it does not distinctly appear by the search aforesaid that such allowance has hitherto been made to the guardians in other previous voidances, nor also whether or not any manors, rents, or any churches appropriated to the said abbey have of old been assigned to the maintenance of the said monks, ministers, servants and others receiving corrodies, in time of such vacancies, it seemed to the Barons expedient that enquiry should be made thereof for the King.

And thereupon Master Robert of Haselshagh, Provost of Wells, Nicholas de Cheigny and Richard of Wocton, or two of them of whom Master Robert shall be one, etc. are assigned to enquire upon the premises.

Which Master Robert and Richard enquired upon the premises and sent here the inquisition, etc. which is among the *Brevia* of this year, by which it was found that there are not any manors, lands, tenements, or rents pertaining to the abbey of Glastonbury save those for which Nicholas of Wedergrave, late guardian of the temporalties of the aforesaid abbey, void and in the King's hand, accounted at the Exchequer of the said lord the King, except the manor of Melles in the county of Somerset, which is worth $20l.$ by the year in all issues; and that it is unknown whether or not the said Nicholas accounted for the issues of the said manor of Melles, and also except the manors of Moneketon, in the same county

of Somerset, and Deverel in the county of Wilts, which are worth 60*l.* by the year in all issues according to their true value, which manors have from time out of mind been hitherto assigned to the Chamber of the monks of the aforesaid abbey, and have never been in the hand of the lord the King by reason of any voidance of the abbey aforesaid, and that no manors, lands, tenements, or rents have in times of voidance of the said abbey been hitherto set apart for the maintenance of the monks, servants, and other ministers of the same abbey, or of those receiving corrodies in the same; and that the churches were appropriated to the abbey aforesaid for doing alms and hospitality and other charges of the kind, but not by the lord the King or his predecessors, and not for the maintenance of the monks, servants, ministers, or the aforesaid persons receiving corrodies. And because in the commission made to the aforesaid Master Robert and his fellows it is contained that they should enquire what corn (*blada*) was found by the same Nicholas in the granges of the same abbey, and of what value, it was found by the said inquisition that the aforesaid Nicholas of Wedergrave found in the granges of the abbey aforesaid corn to the value of only 40 marks beyond charges and expenses incurred for sowing the land during the time of the aforesaid voidance in the manors of the abbey aforesaid.

And the aforesaid inquisition having been seen and examined by the Barons, it appears that it had not been sufficiently examined, etc. Wherefore the Barons decreed that the jurors should come here to certify more fully, etc. at the quinzaine of St. John the Baptist next.

On which day Nicholas came, and the jurors did not come. And because the Treasurer is about to set out for those parts, it seems to the court expedient for the King that he should make enquiry upon the premises. And on this, Nicholas was told to await his day in the country before the Treasurer upon notice, etc. on this side of the feast of St. Michael, and here at the octave of St. Michael. And this process is sent to the Treasurer under the seal (*sub pede sigilli*) of this

Exchequer to enquire, etc. And the Sheriff has been ordered to make the jurors aforesaid come at a certain day and place which the Treasurer shall notify to him, to certify, etc. and to warn the aforesaid Nicholas to be present at the taking of the aforesaid inquisition if he shall think fit. And the particulars of the account of the said Nicholas, together with other evidences extracted from the accounts of guardians of the abbey aforesaid during other voidances, are delivered to Master Robert of Haselshagh, clerk of the same Treasurer, on the 18th day of July, to be taken to the same Treasurer for greater evidence and fuller information at the enquiry, etc. And be it remembered that the said particulars comprise seven pieces, and the other evidences one piece.

On which day the aforesaid Bishop¹ Treasurer delivered here the particulars aforesaid, and says that he could not attend to the business aforesaid, because of divers affairs of the King with which he was occupied. And the aforesaid Nicholas being called did not come, and the inquisition is delayed (*capit dilacionem*) for want of jurors until the morrow of St. Hilary. Therefore the Sheriff was again ordered to distrain the jurors so that, etc. at the same day, and the aforesaid Nicholas to hear the verdict of the inquisition aforesaid.

Afterwards this process is continued by adjournment (*per continuacionem dierum*) for want of jurors until the quinzaine of St. John the Baptist in the 1st year of King Edward son of this King.² On which day, the Sheriff was ordered, as often, to distrain the jurors by their lands, etc. so that he have them here on the quinzaine of St. Michael in the 2nd year of the said King Edward the son, or before any one of the Barons who shall first, etc.

Afterwards, William of Everdon, Baron, etc. went to the parts of the counties of Somerset and Dorset, Wilts, Berks, and Devon, and made enquiry upon the premises, and delivered

here now on the said quinzaine five inquisitions upon the premises taken before him, that is to say one taken at Somerton on Tuesday the Morrow of the Exaltation of Holy Cross, the aforesaid Nicholas of Wedergrave being present by Stephen of Pulton, his attorney, by the oath of Richard de Gyvernay, knight, and other jurors whose names are noted in the writ and the panel returned by the Sheriff of Somerset to the writ attached.

And they say upon their oath that during the time of the last voidance of the abbey aforesaid there were not any lands or any tenements, pensions, or other temporal receipts (*percepciones*) in the county of Somerset pertaining to the abbey of Glastonbury and the monks of the same house except the manors of Glastonbury, Strete, Buddecleye,¹ Walton, Ayshcote, Shapewyk, Greynton, Sowy, Moneketon, Hammie,² Mere, Godeny, Bekery,³ Wythies,⁴ Brente, Wryngton, Merkesbury, Melles, Batecombe, Dultyng, Pulton, Dychesyate,⁵ Pennard, Middleton, and Baltonesburgh, and the hundreds of Wyston and Whytele, and that the monks of Glastonbury have to their own uses (*habent in proprios usus*) the churches of Shapewyk, Estbrent and Pennard, and no others in the county aforesaid, and that no manors or churches of the said manors, or churches whatsoever, were assigned to the maintenance of the monks or ministers during any time of voidance of the abbey aforesaid. It was, however, found that the aforesaid manor of Moneketon was always hitherto from time out of mind, both during the time of the voidance of the abbey aforesaid and during the time of occupancy (*tempore sedis plene*) there, set apart and assigned for clothing (*vesturam*) and other necessaries pertaining to the churches of the said monks, at the disposal of the Chamberlain there. And that the aforesaid churches of Estbrente and Pennard, both during time of voidance of the abbey aforesaid and during time of occupancy, were always, from the time of the appropriation

thereof, assigned for necessaries pertaining to the service (*ministerium*) in the same church, at the disposal of the Sacrist there, and nothing thence otherwise for the maintenance of the monks or servants, or other ministers, or of those receiving corrodies in the same. And that the church of Shapewyk, from the time of the appropriation thereof, both during time of voidance and during time of occupancy there, was assigned for the Almonry there at the disposal of the Almoner, and not for any maintenance otherwise. It was moreover found by the inquisition aforesaid that the monks of Glastonbury and the ministers serving during the same times of voidances, have hitherto been wont to be maintained in food and drink (*in esculentis et poculentis*) out of the temporalties pertaining to the abbey aforesaid, that is to say during time of occupancy at the disposal of the Abbot, and during time of voidance at the disposal of the guardian of the temporalties of the abbey aforesaid. It was also found by the inquisition aforesaid that the said Nicholas found in the granges of the manors pertaining to the portion of the said Abbot corn (*blada*) to the value of 40 marks after the sowing, and that the said Nicholas supplied (*invenit*) to the said monks and to the ministers serving them during the time of the said voidance their maintenance, as in food and drink, up to the number of sixty monks for the whole time of the said voidance, and to the necessary ministers serving in the same abbey suitable maintenance as in food and drink, and also to those taking corrodies in the same abbey their receipts (*percepciones*) as they were wont to have them during time of occupancy there. But the jurors know nothing in detail (*distincte*) as to the names or the number of such ministers or of those who receive corrodies.

And another inquisition taken before the same at Brodwyndesor in the county of Dorset on Thursday after the Exaltation of Holy Cross in the 1st year, Nicholas of Wedergrave being present by his attorney aforesaid, by the oath of Robert atte More and other jurors, as appears in the panel attached to the same inquisition, who say upon their oath

that during the time of the voidance of the abbey aforesaid, there were not any lands or any tenements, pensions, or other temporal revenues in the county of Dorset pertaining to the abbey aforesaid and the monks there, other than the manors of Neuton and Boclond with the appurtenances, and that no churches were appropriated to the abbey aforesaid in the county of Dorset except the church of Sturminster, whose fruits and income from the time of the appropriation thereof were assigned for the offices of the Sacrist and the Almoner in equal portions to be allocated (*disponendis*) according to their discretion, both during time of voidance of the same abbey and during time of occupancy there, and nothing thence otherwise for the maintenance of the monks aforesaid, or of the servants, or of those receiving corrodies in the same, and that the monks and the ministers of the same house, and those who receive corrodies in the same, were hitherto wont to be maintained out of the temporalties pertaining to the abbey aforesaid, that is to say during time of occupancy there at the disposal of the Abbot, and during time of voidance at the disposal of the guardian. And that the said Nicholas found no corn in the granges of the manors aforesaid.

And a third inquisition taken before the same at Thorncoumbe in the county of Devon¹ on Thursday next after the Exaltation of Holy Cross in the 1st year, Nicholas of Wedergrave being present by his attorney, as has been said, by the oath of Richard of Careswell and other jurors named in the panel attached to the same inquisition, who say upon their oath that, during the time of voidance of the abbey aforesaid, there were not any lands or any tenements, pensions, or other temporal revenues in the county aforesaid pertaining to the abbey of Glastonbury and the monks there other than the manor of Uplym with the appurtenances, and no spiritualties, etc. And that the monks and the ministers of the same house, and those who received corrodies in the same, were hitherto wont to be maintained out of the temporalties

pertaining to the abbey aforesaid, that is to say during time of occupancy there at the disposal of the Abbot, and during time of voidance at the disposal of the guardian of the same house. And that the said Nicholas found no corn in the granges of the manor aforesaid.

And a fourth inquisition taken before the same William of Everdon at Bysshopeston in the county of Wilts¹ on Monday the feast of St. Matthew the Apostle in the 1st year, Nicholas of Wedergrave being present by Stephen of Pulton his attorney, by the oath of Walter of Thacham and other jurors whose names are noted in the panel attached to the same inquisition, who say upon their oath that during the time of the last voidance of the abbey of Glastonbury there were not any lands or any tenements, pensions, or other temporal revenues in the county of Wilts pertaining to the abbey aforesaid and the monks there other than the manors of Netlyngton, Grittelyngton, Kyngton, Cristemaleford, Wynterborne, Baddebury, Idemeston, Domerham, and Deverel by Werminstre, with the appurtenances, and no spiritualties save the church of Domerham, whose fruits and income, from the time of the appropriation thereof, were assigned for keeping hospitality in the abbey aforesaid, and not to any other maintenance otherwise. And that the aforesaid manor of Deverel always hitherto from time out of mind, both during time of voidance of the abbey aforesaid and during time of occupancy there, was set apart and assigned for clothing and other necessaries pertaining to the Chamber of the said monks at the disposal of the Chamberlain there, and not to any other maintenance otherwise. And that the monks and the ministers of the same house, and those who received corrodies in the same, were hitherto wont to be maintained out of the temporalties pertaining to the abbey aforesaid, that is to say, during time of occupancy there at the disposal of the Abbot, and during time of voidance of the same house at the disposal of the guardian there. And that the said Nicholas found no corn in the granges of the manors aforesaid, because

there was such dearth (*sterilitas*) in that year that there was scarcely any corn there.

And a fifth inquisition taken before him at Edwyneston by Ayshebury¹ in the county of Berks on Monday the feast of St. Matthew the Apostle in the 1st year, Nicholas of Wegergrave being present by his attorney aforesaid, by the oath of Gilbert de la Stane, and other jurors named in the panel attached to the same inquisition, who say upon their oath that during the time of the voidance of the abbey aforesaid there were not any lands or tenements, pensions, or other temporal revenues in the county of Berks pertaining to the abbey of Glastonbury and the monks there, other than the manor of Ayshebury with the appurtenances, and no spiritualties, etc. And that the monks and the ministers of the same house and those who received corrodies in the same were hitherto wont to be maintained out of the temporalties pertaining to the abbey aforesaid, that is to say during time of occupancy there at the disposal of the Abbot, and during time of voidance of the same house at the disposal of the guardian there. And that the said Nicholas found no corn in the granges of the manor aforesaid.

And the account of the said Nicholas rendered here of the issues of the abbey aforesaid in the last voidance of the same having been viewed, it was found that the same Nicholas answers for the issues of all the manors pertaining to the abbey aforesaid and named in the inquisitions aforesaid, except the manor of Monketon in the county of Somerset and the manor of Deverel in the county of Wilts, which from time out of mind were set apart and assigned for clothing and other necessaries pertaining to the Chamber of the said monks, both during time of voidance of the abbey aforesaid and during time of occupancy, at the disposal of the Chamberlain there, and not to any other maintenance otherwise, as more fully appears in the inquisitions aforesaid. And because, after search elsewhere as to the allowances made to other guardians

of the abbey aforesaid in other voidances, it was found that William de Gaugeto and Geoffrey Foliot, sometime guardians of the abbey aforesaid in times of voidances, etc. accounted as paid to the Prior and monks of Glastonbury 20s. to their kitchen in each of the weeks in which they had the keeping of the house aforesaid in times of voidances, etc. as appears more fully above in this process, regard being paid to the King's commands enrolled above in this process, whereby the King orders the Barons here that if it appear to them that certain manors or rents had not been set apart for the maintenance of the said monks, servants and ministers, and of others having corrodies in times of such voidances, then, notwithstanding that such allowance had not been previously made, they should cause due allowance to be made to the same Nicholas for the charges and expenses aforesaid, it was decided that there should be allowed to the said Nicholas in that which he owes to the King here of the remainder of his account aforesaid, 6d. a day for the Prior and 3d. a day for each of the fifty-nine monks aforesaid, whereof the total (*summa*) for the time aforesaid is 84*l.* 12*s.* 9*d.* And that nothing be done with regard to corrodies or liveries until, etc. because the same Nicholas had not yet shown an order to the court for the payment of certain corrodies or liveries specifically (*in specie*), nor for the maintenance of the ministers and servants of the abbey aforesaid in kind, nor is there any mention in the process aforesaid or in the inquisitions aforesaid of any detailed (*distincta*) payment made to the aforesaid persons having corrodies (*corrodariis*), servants or ministers of that abbey, etc. or of the names or number of those ministers.

Afterwards the lord Edward the King, son of this King, sent here his writ of his great seal, which is among the *Communia* of the 6th year of the same King Edward the son, the tenure of which is entered in the roll next following:—

“ Edward, etc. (as before). Whereas the lord Edward late King of England, our father, on the 16th day of December in the 16th year of his reign, gave order by his

writ to Nicholas of Wedergrave, now deceased, then guardian of the temporalties of the abbey of Glastonbury, which were in the hand of the same our father, that out of the issues of the same temporalties he should, during the voidance aforesaid, cause the monks, ministers, and other servants of the abbey aforesaid, to have due maintenance and the accustomed yearly liveries, and the men who had corrodies in that abbey to have such corrodies according to reason, and although you, after hearing the account of the same Nicholas of the issues of the temporalties aforesaid for the time during which he had the keeping of the same by reason of the voidance aforesaid, allowed to the same Nicholas in the account aforesaid at the Exchequer aforesaid that which he paid to the monks aforesaid for their maintenance, yet divers sums of money which the same Nicholas paid to the ministers and servants of the abbey aforesaid for their maintenance, and the liveries and corrodies which he paid (*liberavit*) to divers men in pursuance (*pretextu*) of the command of our father aforesaid, have not thus far been allowed to the same Nicholas, as has been shown to us on behalf of the executors of the will of the aforesaid Nicholas, we, desiring that what is just and reasonable (*consonum racioni*) be done in this matter, command you that, after viewing (*viso*) the account aforesaid, you cause the aforesaid executors to have due allowance of those sums of money which it shall appear to you that the same Nicholas [paid] to the ministers and servants aforesaid, and of the liveries and corrodies which the same Nicholas caused the aforesaid men to have in reason in pursuance of the order of our father aforesaid, receiving from them the writ aforesaid and also an indenture made in this matter. Witness myself at Waltham on the 20th day of February in the 6th year of our reign."

And afterwards the same lord the King the son sent here his writ, which is among the *Communia* of the 9th year of the same King Edward the son, reciting the writ aforesaid

with this [additional] clause "or signify the cause to us."

And thereupon Andrew of Welles and John Danyel who are the executors of the will of the aforesaid Nicholas, as is contained in the Great Roll of the 7th year in "Item, Somerseta, Dorseta," and in the *Memoranda* of the 6th year among the mainprises of Easter term, came here by William Donekan, their attorney, and exhibited here in court the King's writ concerning the payment of the liveries and corrodies in these words :—

"Edward, etc. (as before). To our beloved clerk Nicholas of Wedergrave, guardian of the temporalties of the abbey of Glastonbury, in our hand, greeting. We command you that, out of the issues of the same temporalties, you cause to have to the monks, ministers and other servants of the abbey aforesaid due maintenance and the accustomed yearly liveries, and to the men who have corrodies in the same abbey such corrodies in reason, during the voidance aforesaid. And we will cause you to have due allowance thereof in your account at our Exchequer. Witness myself at Hathelesay the 16th day of December in the 16th year of our reign."¹

In pursuance of which writ the same executors say that the same Nicholas paid and delivered during the time of the voidance of the abbey aforesaid the following liveries and corrodies, that is to say :

To twenty brethren of the same house for their maintenance from the 21st day of November in the said 16th year until the 12th day of March next following for a hundred and eleven days, 13*l.* 17*s.* 6*d.*, that is to say to each of the brethren aforesaid 1*l* $\frac{1}{2}$ *d.* by the day. And to sixty ministers of the same house for their like maintenance during the same time, that is to say to a porter and his groom (*garcioni*) at the outer gate, to a porter and his groom at the lower gate, to a hosteler

(*hostilario*),¹ to three men [and] a groom serving in the cellar, to a hooper (*circulatori*) hooping (*circulanti*) and mending the necessary vessels (*vasa*) there, to a man serving the cellarer, to two cooks and a groom serving in the kitchen of the Abbot's hall, to three cooks and a groom serving in the conventional kitchen, to a man in the garner (*gerentario*), to three bakers, to five brewers, to two millers serving in two mills in the abbey aforesaid, to a porter at the gate towards the brew-house, the bakehouse, and the mill, to two smiths with a groom serving in the smithy (*fabrica*) of the same abbey, to six carters fetching brushwood (*buscam*) necessary for the said abbey and carrying dung (*fimos*) from the court of the same abbey, to a wheelwright (*rotario*), to a stableman (*stabulario*) with his groom, to two serving in the infirmary, to two men serving in the refectory, to two men serving in the almonry, to four clerks serving in the conventional church, to a clerk serving in the chapel of Our Lady (*in capella Beate Marie*), to two men serving the Precentor (*cantori*), to four men serving the Chamberlain in his office (*in officio camerarie*), and to a servant in the monks' guesthouse (*hostilaria*), during the same time, 42*l.* (*rectius 41*l.**) 12*s.* 6*d.*, that is to say to each of the ministers aforesaid 1*½d.* by the day.

And to divers men receiving divers corrodies in the abbey aforesaid during the time aforesaid 35*l.* 12*s.* 3*d.*, that is to say to Master Robert Lengynnour, taking by the year 12 marks, by the day 5*¼d.*, to Thomas Cokerel, taking by the year 10*l.* by the day 6*½d.*, to Robert le Usher, taking by the year 10*os.* by the day 3*¼d.*, to Richard Polruweyn, taking by the year 10 marks, by the day 4*½d.*, to Henry atte Oke, taking by the year 10*os.* by the day 3*¼d.*, to John son of the same Henry, taking by the year 10*os.* by the day 3*¼d.*, to Richard of Lughtburgh, taking by the year 10*l.* by the day 6*½d.*, to Adam de la Wyle, taking by the year 10*os.* by the day 3*¼d.*, to Peter le Prynce, taking by the year 10*os.* by the day 3*¼d.*, to Richard

le Mygnour, taking by the year 100s. by the day 3½d., to John de la Fosse, taking by the year 10l. by the day 6½d., to William Pasturel, taking by the year 10l. by the day 6½d., to Godfrey of Sowy, taking by the year 10l. by the day 6½d., to Thomas of Reymes, taking by the year 100s. by the day 3½d., to Robert of Standysch, taking by the year 100s. by the day 3½d., to Geoffrey of Hakenye, taking by the year, at the instance of the lord the King, 5 marks, by the day 2½d., to William of Hodycote, taking 40s. by the year, at the instance of the same lord the King, by the day 1½d., to John of Leygrave, taking by the year 5 marks, at the instance of the lady the Queen, by the day 2½d., to Isambert de St. Blimont (*de Sancto Blymundo*), taking by the year 40s., at the instance of the same lady the Queen, by the day 1½d.

And they show thereof certain letters patent indented and sealed with the seal of the convent of that place, dated at Glastonbury on the 24th day of December in the said 16th year¹ testifying the payments and liveries of the corrodies and liveries aforesaid in the form aforesaid. And they crave allowance to be made to them thereof according to the tenour of the royal writs aforesaid.

And because the court wishes to be more fully informed before further, etc. what and what sorts of corrodies and liveries were severally due in the abbey aforesaid before the time of the voidance of the same, to what persons, by the deeds or grants of which abbots of the same place or other persons, at what times, how and in what manner, and likewise what corrodies and liveries of this sort the aforesaid Nicholas thus paid while he was guardian there, to whom in detail (*distincte*), for what length of time, and how, and also what and what sort of other ministers and servants he necessarily retained there during the time aforesaid, in what services or offices severally, and how much he found or paid to each of them by the day for their maintenance, it was

agreed that enquiry should be made therein, etc. And Master John of Hildesle, Chancellor of this Exchequer, and William of Stowe, are assigned to enquire therein, etc. so that they, or one of them if not both, etc. shall take that inquisition, and shall have it here so soon, etc.

Afterwards, that is to say on the quinzaine of St. Michael in the said 9th year of King Edward the son of this King, then ending, the aforesaid Master John of Hildesle and William of Stowe delivered here a certain inquisition on the premises taken before them at Somerton on Wednesday next before the feast of the Nativity of Our Lady in the said year, by the oath of William le Eyr, Thomas of Halle, Richard Maunsel, Roger of Mucheldevere and others whose names are noted in the inquisition aforesaid, which is among the writs executed for the King of the 10th year of the same King Edward the son in the custody of this Remembrancer. Which jurors say on their oath that 19 corrodies and liveries or pensions were due in the abbey of Glastonbury before the 21st day of November in the 16th year of King Edward son of King Edward, on which day the voidance of the same abbey began by the death of Geoffrey Fromund, late Abbot there, to divers persons by deeds and grants of the same Geoffrey and the convent of the place aforesaid, the names of which persons agree with the names of the persons receiving corrodies contained in the said letters patent indented, and the same names and the causes of the same grants are noted in a certain schedule attached to the said inquisition, a transcript whereof is attached to this roll.

They say also that Nicholas of Wedergrave, guardian of the temporalties of the same abbey in the time of the same voidance, paid to the same persons in money by tale from the same 21st day of November until the 12th day of March next following, for 111 days, including the first day, according to the rate of the portion pertaining to the several persons of corrodies and liveries or pensions noted in the same schedule, as a certain indenture sealed with the seal of the convent of the abbey aforesaid testifies, which indenture is attached

to the same inquisition, and is identical with the letters patent indented of which mention is made above in the process.

The same jurors say likewise that the aforesaid Nicholas paid to twenty brethren of the place aforesaid for their maintenance during the time aforesaid, that is to say to each of them $1\frac{1}{2}d.$ by the day, as is contained in the same indenture. And that he retained, and necessarily had to retain, in the same abbey 60 ministers and servants for doing hospitality and other kindly services in the same abbey, whereof [there were] 52 master ministers and 8 grooms, whose names and offices, and the names of the said brethren, are noted in the said schedule. And that he paid during the time aforesaid to each of the said master ministers $1\frac{1}{2}d.$ by the day, and to each of the said grooms $1d.$ by the day.

Upon deliberation thereon, etc. it was decided that out of the sums thus paid by the aforesaid Nicholas to persons having corrodies (*corrodariis*), to pensioners, to brethren, to ministers, and to other persons aforesaid, whereof the sum total is 88*l.* 2*s.* $1\frac{1}{2}d.$, allowance be made in the debts claimed from the same Nicholas of the remainder of his account of the issues of the temporalities of the abbey aforesaid during the time aforesaid in pursuance of the writ, the inquisition, and the other premises. And be it remembered that the aforesaid letters patent indented, the schedule, the inquisition, and the commission are allowed.

Corrodies and liveries in the abbey of Glastonbury due in the time of Geoffrey Fromond, late Abbot there on the day of the death of the same :

Robert Lengynour, master mason (*magister cementarius*), was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of Sir Geoffrey the Abbot and the convent on Thursday next before St. Dunstan in the 2nd year of King Edward the father of the King who now is. And he received yearly a robe of the suit of the esquires, of the price of 20*s.*, and on every day throughout the year $5\frac{1}{4}d.$ for himself, that is to say in bread, ale and kitchen, and for his horse yearly four waggon-loads (*plaestrata*)

of hay, of the price of 10s. For surveying and directing the works of the church.¹

Thomas Cokerel, at the request of the lord King Edward, father of the King who now is, was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the said Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on Thursday next after St. Peter's Chains in the 9th year of the same King Edward the father. And he received yearly 10l., that is to say 5½d. by the day. At the request of the lord the King.

Robert le Ussher, at the request of the lord King Edward the father, was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the said Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on Monday next before Easter in the said 9th year of King Edward the father. And he received yearly 100s., that is to say 3½d. by the day. At the request of the lord the King.

Richard Polruwan was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the said Abbot Geoffrey [and] the convent on Thursday next before St. John the Baptist in the 12th year of the said King Edward the father. And he received every day two conventional loaves, and two conventional pots (*justas*)² of ale, two dishes of meat or fish according to the character of the day, to the value of 10 marks by the year, that is to say 4½d. by the day.

Henry atte Oke was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the feast of the Translation of St. Thomas the Martyr in the 14th year of the same King [Edward] the father. And he received every day one conventional loaf and one loaf which is called 'smalwh[it]', and one pot of conventional ale, and one gallon of the second ale,³ and 20s. [by the year] for his kitchen, and a robe of eight yards of the suit of the principal

clerks with fur. And they are worth by the year 100s., that is to say by the day 3*½d.*

John atte Oke was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the aforesaid feast of the Translation of St. Thomas the Martyr in the said 14th year. And he receives just as the aforesaid Henry 100s., that is to say by the day 3*½d.*

Sir Richard of Lughtburgh was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the morrow of St. Clement in the said 14th year of the same King [Edward] the father. And he received yearly every day two white loaves and one loaf which is called 'bastard,' and two gallons of good ale, and the maintenance of a groom in the Abbot's hall, with kitchen suitable *cum coquina pro dieta competenti*, and two yearly robes with fur and suitable linen (*sindone*). And they are worth by the year 10*l.*, that is to say 6*½d.* by the day.

Adam de la Wyle was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the eve of the Purification of Our Lady in the 23rd year of King Edward the grandfather of the King who now is. And he received yearly 100s., that is to say 3*½d.* by the day.

Peter Prynce was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey [and] the convent on the feast of St. Catherine the Virgin in the 15th year of the said King Edward the father. And he receives by the year just as the aforesaid.

Richard le Mynour was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the feast of St. John the Baptist in the 9th year of the same King Edward the father. And he receives by the year just as the aforesaid. To all these [seven persons] corrodies were sold in relief of the debts with which the monastery (*ecclesia*) had previously been burdened.

John de la Fosse was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on Thursday next after the Circumcision of the Lord in the 6th

year of the said King [Edward] the father. And he received yearly two robes with fur of the suit of the principal clerks, and maintenance for himself, two grooms and two horses, and 10l. of silver, that is to say $6\frac{1}{2}d.$ by the day. In order that he should be of counsel of the Abbot and convent.

William Pasturel was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the feast of the Commemoration of St. Paul in the 10th year of the said King [Edward] the father. And he received yearly 10l. of silver and two robes of the suit of the esquires and half a mark for hose (*calciatura*), and every day two white loaves and a gallon and a half of ale, and two dishes of meat [or] of fish according to the character of the day, and on alternate days three loaves and a dish of meat or of fish for his groom, that is to say $6\frac{1}{2}d.$ by the day.

Godfrey of Sowy was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on Wednesday next after St. Faith the Virgin in the said 10th year of King [Edward] the father. And he received yearly two robes and 10l. , that is to say $6\frac{1}{2}d.$ by the day. They were sold to these [two] for lands bought from them.

Thomas Reymes was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the feast of St. Mark the Evangelist in the 14th year of King [Edward] the father. And he received every day one conventional loaf and one loaf which is called 'smalwhit,' and one pot of conventional ale, and one dish of meat or of fish according to the character of the day, and one robe of the suit of the principal clerks with fur. And they are worth by the year 100*s.*, that is to say $3\frac{1}{4}d.$ by the day.

Robert of Standish was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on the morrow of All Saints in the 12th year of the same King [Edward] the father. And he received yearly one robe of the suit of the esquires, and all other things just as the aforesaid Thomas Reymes, that is to say $3\frac{1}{4}d.$ by the day. They were sold to these [two] in relief of the debts of the church.

Geoffrey Hakeneye was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent at the request of the lord King Edward, father of the King who now is, on the day of St. Alphege in the — year of the said King [Edward] the father. And he receives yearly 5 marks, that is to say $2\frac{1}{4}d.$ by the day. At the King's request.

William of Hodecote was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid [Abbot Geoffrey] and the convent at the request of the lord King on Wednesday next after the Purification of Our Lady in the 15th year of the said King [Edward] the father. And he received every day two white loaves and one gallon of ale, [and one] dish of meat or of fish according to the character of the day. And they are worth by the year 40s., that is to say $1\frac{1}{4}d.$ by the day. At the King's request.

John of Leygrave was enfeoffed for the term of his life by deed of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and the convent on Thursday next before SS. Perpetua and Felicitas in the — year [of King Edward] the father at the request of the lady Isabel the Queen. And he received a yearly robe and [5 marks], that is to say $2\frac{1}{4}d.$ by the day. At the Queen's request.

Isambert de St. Blimont (*de Sancto Blymundo*) was enfeoffed for the term of his life [by deed] of the aforesaid Abbot Geoffrey and convent, at the request of the aforesaid Queen, on Saturday next — the feast of All Saints in the 9th year of the said King [Edward] the father. And he received yearly 40s., that is to say $1\frac{1}{4}d.$ by the day. At the Queen's request.

The Account of Nicholas of Wedergrave, late guardian of the temporalties of the abbey of Glastonbury void by the death of Geoffrey Fromond, late Abbot of that place, and being in the King's hand from the 21st day of November in the 16th year of King Edward, son of King Edward, on which day the same Geoffrey died, by the King's writ patent dated the 14th day of December in the same year, until the 12th day of March next following, before he delivered the temporalties of the abbey aforesaid to brother Adam of Sobbur', a monk of the same house, elected as Abbot of that place, and confirmed by the Bishop of Bath and Wells, by another writ patent of the King dated the said 12th day of March.

The same renders account of 98*l.* 16*s.* 8*½d.* from rents of assise of free tenants and customers of the manors of Buddeleye, Strete, Walton, Greynton, Ayshcote, Shapewike, Sowy, Hamme, Middelton, Brente, Wryngton, Pulton, Doultynge,

Dychesyate, Batcombe, Pennard, Baltonesbergh, Merkesbury, Melles, Glastonbury, Mere, Godeneye, Bekery and Wythies in the county of Somerset, Newton and Boeland in the county of Dorset, Kyngton, Netelyngton, Grutelyngton, Cristemaleford, Winterburn, Baddebury, Idemeston and Domerham in the county of Wilts, Uplym in the county of Devon, and Ayshesbury in the county of Berks, which are the temporalities of the said abbey, that is to say for Christmas term, as is contained in a roll of particulars which he delivered into the Treasury. And of 50*l.* 15*s.* 8*d.* from the works of ploughing and carrying of the same customers during the same time sold, as is contained therein. And of 111*l.* 2*s.* from the recognisances of the same customers at the time of the King's primer seisin, as is contained therein. And of 11*l.* 9*s.* 9*d.* from the pasture and the underwood in the aforesaid manors during the same time sold, as is contained therein. And of 4*l.* 6*d.* from the easements of the houses in the aforesaid manors during the same time, as is contained therein. And of 9*l.* 14*s.* 4*d.* from mills and fisheries thus let to farm in the aforesaid manors during the same time, as is contained therein. And of 26*l.* 14*s.* from 133½ acres sown with wheat, the price of the acre 4*s.*, in the aforesaid manors, sold during the same time, as is contained therein. And of 68*l.* 8*s.* 6*d.* from 759 acres sown with oats, the price of the acre 18*d.*, and 100 acres sown with beans, the price of the acre 2*s.*, in the aforesaid manors, sold during the same time, as is contained therein. And of 53*l.* 5*s.* 6½*d.* from the pleas and perquisites of the courts in the aforesaid manors with heriots sold during the same time, as is contained therein. And of 10*s.* from a cow of felons' chattels thus sold, as is contained therein. He renders account of the same debt. In the Treasury, 6s. 8d. And he owes 200l. 14s. 1d. (*rectius 200l. 13s. 11d.*). And he answers in 'Item Somerset.'

Nicholas of Wedergrave renders account of 200l. 14s. 1d. of the remainder of his account of the issue of the temporalties of the abbey of Glastonbury when void, as is contained in the principal roll. But Thomas of Marleberge the Sheriff ought to be charged for the same Nicholas 24l. 15s. 1d. by decision of the Barons noted in the *Memoranda* of the 19th year among the *Recorda*, etc. of Trinity term, which he levied from the same Nicholas by divers writs of the King, as is contained in the *Memoranda* aforesaid. And he answers below. And he owes 175l. 19s.

In the Treasury nothing. And in the maintenance of the Prior and fifty-nine monks of the same abbey during the same time, 84*l.* 12*s.* 9*d.*, that is to say to the Prior 6*d.* and to each of the monks aforesaid 3*d.* by the day, by writ of the said King the father enrolled in the *Memoranda* of the 17th year of the said King in Hilary term, and by another writ of the same King the father enrolled in the same *Memoranda* dated the 12th (*sic*) day of March in the said 17th year among the '*Adhuc Communia*' of the same year, wherein it is contained, etc. (*as above*, pp. 6, 7). And by inquisitions taken thereon and decisions of the Barons noted in the *Memoranda* aforesaid among the *Recorda* of the said Hilary term, and by writ of this King among the *Communia* of this year concerning the allowance of similar writs of the King the father. And he owes 91*l.* 6*s.* 3*d.* *And he answers in 'Item Somerset.'* [Pipe Roll, 172. Somerset, Dorset.]

John de Say, William Homond and William of Hynton, of the county of Somerset, and Richard of Kyngton, of the county of Wilts, came here before the Barons now on the 30th day of May in this year, and became sureties for Andrew of Welles, John Danyel, and John of Uppehull, executors of the will of Nicholas of Wedergrave deceased, to satisfy the lord the King of all debts which the same Nicholas owed to the King on the day of his death, so far as the goods and chattels which were of the same Nicholas on that day, and which were sequestrated by the Bishop of Bath and Wells in his diocese to the value of 50*l.* by a writ of this Exchequer directed in this

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matter to the same Bishop and returned here on the quinzaine of the Purification of Our Lady in this 6th year, suffice. And in pursuance of the mainprise aforesaid, it was granted to the aforesaid executors that they should have administration of all the goods and chattels aforesaid to satisfy the King thereof in the form aforesaid. And order was given to the aforesaid Bishop to deliver the goods and chattels aforesaid to the aforesaid executors, etc.¹

Afterwards by search of the rolls it was found that 9*l.* 6*s.* 3*d.* are claimed from Nicholas of Wedergrave, clerk, of the remainder of his account of the issues of the temporalties of the abbey of Glastonbury lately void, that is to say, from the 21st day of November in the 16th year of King Edward, the father of the King who now is, until the 12th day of March next following, as is contained in the great roll of the 4th year of this King in Somerset. Whereupon order was given to the Sheriff of Somerset and Dorset to levy (*fieri fac'*) 5*l.* of the aforesaid debt out of the lands and chattels of the said executors and sureties, and to levy the remainder of the debt aforesaid out of the lands and tenements which were of the same Nicholas of Wedergrave in fee on the aforesaid 21st day of November in the 16th year and afterwards. So that, etc. on the quinzaine of the day of St. John the Baptist.

Nicholas of Wedergrave owes 50*l.* of the remainder of 91*l.* 6*s.* 3*d.* of the remainder of his account of the issues of the temporalties of the abbey of Glastonbury when void, as is contained in the principal roll and in the first roll, that is to say, by the mainprise of Andrew of Welles, John Danyel, and John of Uphull, executors of the will of the aforesaid Nicholas deceased, and of John de Say, William Homond, and William of Hyнетон, of the county of Somerset, and Richard of Kyngton, of the county of Wilts, sureties of the same executors, for the aforesaid 50*l.*, as is contained in the *Memoranda* of the 6th year among the mainprises of Easter term. Whereof the Sheriff answers above for 33*s.* 4*d.* And he owes 48*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* *And he answers in 'Adhuc Residuum Somerset.'*

Sum, 87*l.* 12*s.* 11*d.* In the Treasury 50*s.* by the Bishop of Bath, on behalf of Andrew of Welles, executor of the will of the aforesaid Nicholas. And he owes 85*l.* 2*s.* 11*d.* The same renders account of the same debt. In the Treasury nothing. And to the ministers and servants of the abbey aforesaid, that is to say, to 20 brethren of the same place and to 60 ministers and servants of whom 52 are officers (*officiarii*) and 8 are grooms serving in the abbey aforesaid and whom he had necessarily to retain for doing hospitality and other kindly services there during the time of the voidance aforesaid, to wit for 111 days including the first day, 53*l.* 13*s.*, to wit to each of the said brethren and officers 1½*d.* by the day, and to each of the said grooms 1*d.* by the day, by the King's writ directed to the Treasurer and Barons for the executors of the will of the aforesaid Nicholas now deceased, enrolled in the *Memoranda* of the 6th year in Hilary term, wherein it is contained that the

said King Edward the father lately gave order to the said Nicholas that, out of the issues of the temporalties of the abbey aforesaid, he should cause the monks, the ministers and the other servants of the same abbey to have due maintenance and the accustomed yearly liveries, and the men who had corrodies in that abbey to have such corrodies during the voidance aforesaid. And although the Barons of the Exchequer allowed to the same Nicholas in his account of the issues of the temporalties aforesaid that which he paid to the monks aforesaid for their maintenance, yet divers sums of money which the same Nicholas paid to the ministers and the servants of the abbey aforesaid for their maintenance, and the liveries and corrodies which, in pursuance of the order aforesaid, he delivered to divers men, were not allowed to the same Nicholas, and by which writ the King gave order to the Barons that of those sums of money which it can be shown that the same Nicholas had paid to the ministers and the servants aforesaid, and of the liveries and corrodies which it can similarly be shown that he had caused the aforesaid men to have, they should cause the aforesaid executors to have due allowance, and by letters patent indented sealed with the seal of the convent of the place aforesaid and testifying that payment, and by inquisition taken on the premises and likewise noted to the Barons in the *Memoranda* of the 17th year of the said King the father among the *Recorda* of Hilary term. And to 19 men receiving divers corrodies and yearly liveries due to them in the abbey aforesaid before the time of the voidance of the same in money by tale paid to the same by the aforesaid Nicholas during the time aforesaid, besides clothes and hose and other petty necessaries due to certain of them, whereof they received nothing during the same time, 34*l.* 9*s.* 1*½d.* by the same writ and by the letters, inquisitions and decisions aforesaid. GLASTONBURY ABBEY AND THE CHURCH OF WEST PENNARD.

THE document printed below was brought to my notice by the Rev. E. S. C. Lock, Vicar of West Pennard, who found it in a tin box in the vicarage. It is, as will appear, an award by William Wareham, or Warham, Archbishop of Canterbury 1504-1532, between the Abbot of Glastonbury and the churchwardens and people of West Pennard, who were at odds on the question of the repair of the chancel of the church of West Pennard. This is the 'churchwardens' copy of the award, and it must have remained in their custody. It is clear from the terms of the document that the church of West Pennard was a chapel of St. John's of Northbin in Glastonbury, which church itself belonged to the abbey (cf. Warner, *History of the Abbey of Glaston*, 1826, p. 247, note): The chancel of the church had apparently fallen into disrepair and the question had arisen as to the responsibility for its restoration. The abbey was in the position of rector or proprietor of the church, and thus would normally have the responsibility of the maintenance of the fabric of the chancel. But the award puts this responsibility on the churchwardens and people of West Pennard. The law in cases of this kind is thus laid down by Phillimore, *Law of the Church*, p. 1415 :

" By the canon law the repair of the church belongs to him who receives this fourth part [i.e. of the tithes; which fourth part was to be applied to the repair of the church], that is, to the rector, and not to the parishioners. But custom (that is, the common law) transferred the burden of reparation, at least

of the nave of the church, upon the parishioners, and likewise sometimes of the chancel, as particularly in the city of London in many churches there, and this custom the parishioners will be compelled to observe where such custom is. Where there is no such custom the parson is to repair the chancel."

The terms of our document would perhaps be best explained by supposing that there had been some dispute as to the custom between the parties and that the archbishop's court had found in favour of the abbey. The award was made on the 4th of October, 1528. It will be seen that the notary calls attention to the fact that certain words in the 19th line are written over an erasure and duly authenticates the words in question. But in ll. 8, 9 a later hand has struck through the date by induction and pontificate in which the name of Pope Clement VII appears. Such erasures are common in documents of pre-Reformation date. It is clear that the churchwardens, when the Reformation came, felt it safer to comply with the times and to obliterate the dangerous name of the pope. In this connection it is interesting to note that one of the witnesses to the award is Thomas Bedyll, Warham's secretary, who after the death of the archbishop in 1532 went into the King's service and took an active part in the divorce of Queen Katharine and the changes in ecclesiastical policy which followed. About 1536 he presided over a commission appointed to examine papal bulls and briefs conferring privileges on churches and dignities in England with a view to their confirmation or abolition. And he revised the "book" that was circulated through England as a basis for sermons on the futility of the pope's claims to authority in England.

The following summary of the award will perhaps serve to elicit the material points from the cumbrous verbiage of the ecclesiastical lawyers.

Letters testimonial of William [Warham], Archbishop of Canterbury (1504-1532), notifying an award in a suit between Richard [Whityng], Abbot, and the Convent of Glastonbury on the one part and the wardens and inhabitants of the precinct of the chapel of West Pennard appertaining to the church of

St. John of Northbin in Glastonbury on the other part, concerning the repair of the chancel of the chapel of West Pennard and the restoration of the sacrament of the Eucharist on the high altar of the chapel. The abbot on the one part and Richard Tanner, warden, and John Honygood, John Donkerton, William Whyte and Walter Bevyll, inhabitants, on the other part, having committed the decision to the Archbishop, he makes the award as follows. The wardens and inhabitants and their successors are to repair and maintain at their own expense the chapel and its choir, its "roof, timbers, walls, foundations, doors, windows, glass, etc.," and the abbot and convent are to be free of the charge. The decree to this effect is to be read in the chapel during divine service before Christmas next on a Sunday or feast-day in the presence of a majority of the inhabitants by the clerk there serving or some other learned man from the pulpit, and explained in the vulgar tongue in a loud and clear voice, and immediately after divine service the wardens and inhabitants or a majority of them shall accept and ratify the decree before a notary and witnesses in the chapel and cause the notary to draw up an instrument or instruments with witnesses to testify such acceptance and ratification. And within eight days of such ratification the sacrament of the Eucharist is to be restored and to be suspended over any convenient altar until the chancel shall be sufficiently repaired. And the wardens and inhabitants shall repair the chancel at their own expense before Michaelmas and shall cause the sacrament to be suspended over the high altar by the archdeacon of that place or another priest by his authority. And with regard to the provision of a priest to celebrate divine service, formerly provided by the abbot and convent, and the provision of bread, wine, and wax for the priest to use in celebration at the altar, and the rendering of all archidiaconal dues, ordinary and extraordinary, to the archdeacon of that place or other ordinary, nothing is to be altered, but former custom is to be followed, the abbot and convent and the wardens and inhabitants performing what they have been accustomed respectively to perform.

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All questions arising out of the present award are reserved for the decision of the archbishop and his successors. In witness whereof these indented letters testimonial have been drawn up, one part to remain with the abbot and convent, the other with the wardens and inhabitants. Dated 4 October, 1528.

Witnesses : John Cockes, LL.D., auditor and vicar-general ; Oliver Godfrey, M.A., almoner ; and Thomas Bedyll, LL.B., secretary.

At the foot is the notarial attestation by John Heryng, who authenticates the writing of the words *atque sic consentientium et submittentium* over an erasure. To the left of this is his notarial sign : a knot on a pedestal, on the two steps of which is written "iustum deduxit dominus per vias rectas" (Wisdom, x. 10).

Appended is an impression in red wax broken at sides, top and bottom, of the second seal of Archbishop Warham. The devices on the seal are still visible, and may be described as follows after Birch's descriptions of the examples in the British Museum of this seal :—

Pointed oval : the Trinity in a fine gothic niche. Overhead, the Virgin and Child between two angels. In niches on the left and right hand, Archbishops holding up the right hand in benediction. In base, the Archbishop kneeling in prayer between two shields of arms : *left*, the See of Canterbury impaling a chevron betw. three Cornish choughs, for Henry Deane, the previous Archbishop ; *right*, a fesse, in chief a goat's head erased, in base three escallops, for Warham.

As the neighbouring church of Pilton was held by the precentor of Wells in virtue of his office, it will not be out of place to quote here an extract from a paper on the *Correspondence of Bishop Oliver King and Sir Reginald Bray*, by the Dean of Wells (Dr. Armitage Robinson), printed in *Somersetshire Archaeological and Natural History Society's Proceedings* for 1914 (vol. lx, pt. ii, pp. 1-10) :

"The third letter is of a more formal character, and was probably intended to be shewn to the king. The precentorship of Wells had fallen vacant owing to the promotion of the

precentor to the bishopric of London, from which he presently passed on to the archbishopric of Canterbury. William Warham was a great scholar and a friend of Erasmus, but at Wells we know him as the first precentor who neglected his duty of continuous residence : his house was dilapidated, and the services of the Cathedral Church were slovenly through his neglect. He had [in 1493] succeeded Thomas Overay, an active man who has left his mark on the church of Pilton which belonged to the precentorship : and he was followed by Thomas Cornish, the suffragan bishop, who was a resident canon and lies buried in the Cathedral.

" It would appear that Bishop Oliver King on his translation from Exeter to Wells in 1495 had promised the king to accept his nominations to the chief appointments in the diocese ; in this letter he shews in detail that he had not forgotten his obligation. But he was determined that he would not have on his conscience another absentee precentor. Accordingly he wrote as follows to Sir Reginald Bray :—

" " 3. [Westminster Abbey Muniments, 16,044.]

" " After due Recommendation. Soo it ys I cam hider as on thursday last. And amonges other thinges I have loked uppon the qwere and uppon the dyvyne services doon daily in this my Chirche of Wellys and finde therein many enormties by the absence of the chanter, for it ys that dignite that al the good ordre of dyvyne service dependeth uppon.

" " I have enquired also of the condition of that dignite. And finde that except maister Warham ther hath not been as eny man here can Remembre eny chanter but that he hath kept personel Residence. The Revenewe therof excedeth not yerely the value of xxxvj ti. When it ys best Repayred. And yit xij ti therof standeth in candel Rent that ys for nowe almoost in an extreme decay. And the place of his inhabitation ys fowle to loke to and overgrownen almoost like a wildernesse.

" " And where as ye say that I forgete my promes to the king. Nay Nay, I thinke wel uppon it and have the said dignite in myn handes ungeven.

" " Trouth it ys that I nevir said nay unto the kinges grace

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neither in the archedeconery of Wellys that ys wel worth viij^{xx} £. and more nor yit in the archedeconery of Tanton worth iij^{xxxij} £. Nor in the prebend of Yatton worth an C. markes that Mr baptist brother hath nor in the benefice Aisbury worth fiftj marks and a vicary endueth that Mr Urswik hath. And for the denery I compowned with his grace as ye knowe wel. But and I had geven theym of my self. suche personaiges shuld have had theym as I am sure shuld have kept daily Residence. Wherby God shuld have been far the bettre served and my chirche sett in farre gretter honoure by the same.

"At my palais of Wellys. the xj day of June.

"As Warham was elected Bishop of London in Oct. 1501, and the precentorship was held by Bishop Thomas Cornish on 4 Sept. 1502, this letter must be dated 11 June 1502."

THE HISTORIA MINOR AND THE HISTORIA MAJOR, FROM THE WELLS LIBER ALBUS II.

THREE ancient narratives recount the history of the bishops of Wells, of Bath, and of Bath and Wells. The earliest is found in a Bath chartulary, now preserved in the library of Lincoln's Inn: the other two are in the great Wells register called the *Liber Albus II* (ff. 297–302). These last were known to Wharton, who in 1691 printed the greater part of them in his *Anglia Sacra* (I 553 ff.). But Wharton, observing that one of them partly depended on the other, unfortunately chose to combine them into a single narrative, thus making it impossible to tell how far the tradition had been modified during the forty years which lay between them. The former he had called *Historia Minor*, the latter *Historia Major*. Accordingly when Joseph Hunter found the yet earlier narrative in the Bath chartulary, and printed it for the Camden Society in 1840 (*Ecclesiastical Documents*, No. I), he gave it to the world under the name of *Historiola*.

As the *Historiola* has been used by the writer of the *Historia Minor*, and this in its turn by the writer of the *Historia Major*, it is necessary for critical purposes that the two latter narratives should be printed in full. The *Historiola* ends with the consecration of Bishop Reginald in 1174, and was probably written soon after that date. The *Historia Minor* ends with the accession of Bishop Harewell in 1367; and the *Historia Major* with Bishop Bubwith's translation to

Wells in 1408. A brief account of each of the three narratives is added here.

I. The *Historiola* opens with a fanciful legend of King Ina, which is absurdly at variance with the facts of history. The bishop who celebrates his marriage at Cideston (or Wells),¹ and obtains permission to remove his see from Congresbury to Wells, is also a pure figment of the imagination. His name of Daniel may have been suggested by the historical Daniel, bishop of Winchester, 705–744, the wise and sympathetic correspondent of the missionary St Boniface. After the mythical Daniel we go on at once to Sigar, whose true date is 975–997.² The list of bishops after this is very confused: it has been copied by the writer of the *Historia Minor*. It is strange that neither of the writers had recourse either to the early episcopal lists or to the *Gesta Pontificum* of William of Malmesbury, where more accurate information could have been found. With Dudoc, who was appointed by King Cnut in 1033, our author reaches firm ground. He draws his information from a document written by Bishop Giso, Dudoc's

immediate successor (1061–1088), which fortunately he transcribes at length. This valuable document is a kind of charter, similar to that which Bishop Robert afterwards drew up to record his work at Wells and to serve as a confirmation of the gifts which he had made to the dean and chapter.¹ The removal of the see to Bath on the accession of Bishop John of Tours (1088–1122) next occupies our author, who has much to say of the melancholy plight of Wells and its canons. Things were not mended under Bishop Godfrey (1123–1135); but when Robert, a Cluniac monk of Lewes, succeeded through the influence of Bishop Henry of Winchester, the brother of King Stephen, a new day dawned for Wells. Following the model of Bishop Osmund's foundation at Old Sarum, Bishop Robert refounded the chapter and placed a dean at its head (c. 1140). He recovered alienated properties and added new endowments; and the rest of the *Historiola* is taken up with an account, derived in part from known charters, of the labours of the bishop in this behalf. Bishop Robert died in 1166, and then, owing to the struggle between King Henry II and Archbishop Thomas, the see was left vacant for several years: the *Historiola* ends with the consecration of Bishop Reginald, which took place abroad in 1174.

II. The writer of the *Historia Minor* recounts the bishops in the briefest possible summary, derived entirely from the *Historiola*, as far as the point to which that narrative extends. Of Bishop Reginald he has nothing to say, but that he ruled for twenty-seven years; and he is equally brief in regard to Bishop Savary. Of Bishop Joscelin he knows more: he dedicated the church of Bath; in his first year he established a daily service of the Blessed Virgin at Wells; the church there he built in large part, especially at the western end, and he endowed it with the manor and advowson of Winscombe; he built a chapel and a *camera* at Wells and also at Wookey. Of the next bishops, Roger, William Bitton I,

Walter Giffard and William Bitton II, he can only tell the number of years during which they ruled the see. Robert Burnell, he says, built the hall at Wells, and secured the property of the see by royal charters. William de Marchia sat ten years; Walter Haselshaw seven; John Drockensford nineteen. The writer's real interest is in Ralph of Shrewsbury, to whom the remaining half of his narrative is devoted. Here he writes with a free hand. He calls him "pater mitissimus," using the epithet constantly employed for the patron of the church, St Andrew ("mitissimus apostolorum"). He first tells how he constructed houses for the vicars, endowing them with ten pounds a year and the manor of Wellesley: also a house for the choristers, who were to receive ten marks annually from the vicar of Chew Magna, who was further to provide five marks for the bishop's obit. He built a wall and a fosse round the palace. His gifts of vestments to the church of Wells are described at full length. He built a chapel at Winscombe, a court at Claverton and a *camera* at Evercreech: and he obtained the disafforestation of the manor of Cheddar. After thirty-four years of rule he died at Wivelscombe, on the vigil of the Assumption in 1363; and he lies buried in the presbytery at Wells before the high altar: his monument of alabaster is surmounted by a figure which is very like him: indulgences reward those who pray for him at his tomb. He has been succeeded first by Bishop Barnet, who however has quickly moved on to Ely, and now by Bishop Harewell ("reverendus pater dominus"), the chancellor of Prince Edward in Gascony.

We cannot mistake the personal touch of this description of the good Bishop Ralph of Shrewsbury. The writer may have been one of his canons, or more probably one of the vicars choral, who enjoyed his bounty and took an interest in the vestments and other treasures of the church.

III. The *Historia Major* does not attempt to carry back the story of the Somerset bishopric into the legendary times of King Ina. It is based at the outset on William of Malmes-

bury, whose writings at one point it definitely names. It tells, as he does, the tale about Pope Formosus, and the pressure which that pontiff was fabled to have brought to bear on King Edward the Elder and Archbishop Plegmund to fill the vacant sees of Wessex.¹ It records the division of dioceses, which led to the establishment of a bishop in the already existing church of Wells. The list of bishops, beginning with Athelm, follows that of William of Malmesbury, though with strange mis-spellings here and there.² But the writer inserts, as the ninth bishop, one who is unknown to history, but whose name, Burwoldus, he has found in the Wells martyrology and on his tomb in the church.³

For Bishop Reginald and the succeeding bishops the writer makes some use of the slender information conveyed in the *Historia Minor*; and he is able to add much besides, especially as to properties given to the church of Wells, and as to the conflict with the monks of Bath in the matter of elections to the see. But again and again his information proves to be not only very incomplete, but also seriously misleading. Much that he says is interesting and valuable, though his statements must be used with caution. It is quite untrue, for example, to say that Bishop Joscelin found the church at Wells in ruin and rebuilt it from the ground: the *Historia Minor* gives at this point a more trustworthy account. On the other hand his testimony is of value when he speaks of the "matin altar" in the nave, and of the "gradus chori"; and we could wish that the "martilogium," or book of commemorations, to which he refers, had come down to us. We may note also his statement that in his day miracles were still going on at William Bitton II's tomb in the south aisle of the choir, whereas those wrought at William de Marchia's tomb were a story of the past. He is evidently a canon of

Wells, and has no love for the monastic chapter at Bath ; and he is tempted to judge the bishops by the way in which they treated his own church and chapter : it is curious in this connexion to note how a friendly bishop fell asleep in the Lord (" obdormivit in domino "), while a less friendly one merely died (" obiit ").

It is instructive to compare in detail the account which he gives of Bishop Ralph of Shrewsbury with the long appreciation of his work given in the *Historia Minor* : though the items mentioned are to a large extent the same, the angle from which this episcopate is looked at is characteristically different. The later writer is as warmly attached to the memory of Ralph Erghum as the earlier writer was to the memory of Ralph of Shrewsbury. After enlarging upon John Harewell and recording among other benefactions his gift of a hundred marks for the glass of the west window, he briefly mentions Walter Skirlaw ; and then he treats fully Ralph Erghum, who gave Pucklechurch to the dean and chapter, and also " the George " : moreover his executors built the dwellings for fourteen chaplains in " la Mounterye." He deals briefly with Henry Bowet, and ends by recording Nicholas Bubwith's translation from London first to Salisbury and then (1408) to Wells. He declares that he writes out of reverence to the memory of Bishop Ralph Erghum.

HOUSEHOLD ROLL OF BISHOP RALPH OF SHREWSBURY (1337-8).

IN the Library of Lambeth Palace there are preserved three fragments of a household roll which from the places mentioned in it can at once be seen to have belonged to a bishop of Bath and Wells. The writing is of the fourteenth century. Fortunately the days of the week are given as well as the days of the month, and thus we can mark off certain years as alone possible. A further clue is given by the names of the manors at which the bishop was residing on certain days. Thus we are told in the roll that on Tuesday, 11 November, he was at Evercreech ; on Friday, 19 November, at Wells ; on Wednesday, 24 November, and Wednesday, 3 December, at Evercreech again ; whereas on Sunday, 1 March, he was in London. Now we have proof that on these days Bishop Ralph of Shrewsbury was at these particular places at the end of 1337 and the beginning of 1338. For we learn from his register (vol. 9 of this series, p. 312) that on 11 November, 1337, he wrote from Evercreech to the archbishop to give his consent to the consecration of Robert de Stratford, the archbishop's brother, to the see of Chichester, and to excuse himself for not being present on the occasion. On 19 November the register (p. 314) shows us that the bishop was at Wells ; on 24 November and 3 December he was at Evercreech (pp. 313, 341), and on 1 March, 1338 (apparently) he was in London (p. 318).

These coincidences show that we are dealing with a roll which, when it was complete, contained the household accounts of Bishop Ralph for the year which ran from Michaelmas

1337, to Michaelmas 1338. Our further study of the roll will fully bear out this conclusion.

The first fragment of the roll contains entries from 2 November to 5 December, 1337; the second carries us on from 29 December to 10 January, 1338; and the third runs from 13 February to 9 March. As regards localities the roll shows us that the bishop was at Evercreech from 5–11 November; on the 10th he seems to have gone to Cheddar to meet the Justices of the Forest. On the 12th he was at Somerton, and the next day he dined at Curry Rivel, and returned to sup at Somerton; he was back at Evercreech on the 14th, and remained there till the 18th, when he went to Wells. He returned to Evercreech on the 20th, and was still there on 5 December. On 30 December we find him at Banwell, where he remained till 10 January. But from 13 February to 4 March he was in London. On 4 March he dined at Braynford¹ and supped at Egham. The next day he reached his manor of Dogmersfield in North Hants, where he stayed till 9 March, at which date the last fragment of our roll breaks off.

At one point there is an unfortunate slip in dating, which evidently has arisen in the course of compiling the roll from partial accounts which did not always give the day of the month as well as the day of the week. The first date given in the third fragment is “Saturday 13 Feb.”; for the date of the previous day’s account is missing. But 13 February was a Friday in 1338. The mistake once made is carried on for a week, till we reach “Saturday 20 Feb.” Then we get right again with “Sunday 22 Feb.”, and so forth, till the fragment breaks off on Monday, 9 March. Had the scribe not put his dates right again, we might have been led to assign this fragment to some other year, such as 1333 or 1339.

It would be beyond my competence to attempt any commentary on the economic features of the roll. Its fulness of detail is matched by no other contemporary roll of which I

have knowledge, excepting the fragment of a roll of Archbishop John de Stratford which I came across many years ago at Westminster (Munim. 9222, 3). If that also were printed in full, a valuable study might be made of prices in England during the period immediately before the Black Death. We are indebted to Dr. Hamilton Thompson for a careful note on the somewhat earlier roll (1289-90) of Bishop Swinfield of Hereford, which was elaborately edited for the Camden Society by the Reverend John Webb in 1853 and 1854.

There are two topics incidentally referred to in the roll which deserve a particular treatment. One is the disafforestation of the bishop's manor of Cheddar; the other is the funeral of a lady of importance in the county.

THE DISAFFORESTATION OF CHEDDAR.

Among the chief services rendered by Bishop Ralph of Shrewsbury the writer of the *Historia Minor* mentions the disafforestation of the manor of Cheddar, which he procured by immense efforts and at no small expense.¹ The author of the *Historia Major* is yet more enthusiastic on this topic, and gives us fuller details :

He obtained of the king the disafforestation of the manors of Cheddar and Axbridge, which at that time were within the forest of Mendip. And that disafforestation of the manors was plainly set out in the perambulation by certain metes and bounds set between the forest and the said manors. Moreover with the king's consent he hunted and destroyed all the game of the said forest, and so an end was put to the outrageous action of the foresters by which they were wont to oppress the common people.²

Our present roll contains some references which throw an interesting side-light on the bishop's action in this matter; and in order to elucidate them it will be necessary to give a brief account of the forest legislation which plays no small part in the development of English constitutional history, and

which specially affected the county of Somerset with its five great forests of Selwood, Neroche, Exmoor, Mendip and North Pederton.

A royal forest was by no means confined to wood and waste : it extended over a whole region, including many a manor and village. All who lived within its bounds were subject to forest law with its own courts and officers, and an administration of justice which knew nothing of the common law or the ordinary jurisdiction of the land. The forest officers were continually extending their claims and enlarging the bounds of the forest. Encroachment was too much to the king's personal satisfaction and to the increase of his revenue from fines to be easily resisted even by the most powerful ; and the life of those who were reckoned as within the forest was rendered almost intolerable by the petty tyranny of an army of officials.

At every political crisis kings had promised a reform of the forest legislation, but their promises had never been kept. It was only under a pressure which he counted as the greatest humiliation of his reign that Edward I at last consented to make the long-promised perambulations, which should settle the bounds of the forests once for all, and free all such lands as had been included by encroachment since the first year of Henry II.

The perambulation of the Mendip forest was made in 1298, and the verdict of the jurors shows how monstrous the encroachments had been since the coronation of King Henry in 1154 ; Chewton, Priddy, Stoke Giffard (i.e. Rodney Stoke), Compton, Loxton, Uphill, Worle, Winscombe, Shiphams, Rowberrow, Burrington, Blagdon, Ubley, West Harptree and East Harptree—all these had been included and were now to be set free. The old forest, according to this verdict, included little more than the parishes of Cheddar and Axbridge.

The king was eventually constrained in the Parliaments of 1300 and 1301 to accept the reforms, which involved a limitation of the rights of officers and their restriction within the limits of the forest as thus defined. But in practice this was hard to carry out, and violent disputes frequently arose.

The manor of Cheddar had been granted by King John to Hugh of Wells, archdeacon of Wells, while he was still in the royal chancery and was not yet bishop of Lincoln. Hugh gave it to his brother Bishop Jocelin, who thereafter held it of the king for an annual rent; and who obtained from Henry III certain exemptions from the forest regulations. Presently the manor of Axbridge came to be held by the bishop of the king on like terms.¹

Bishop Ralph's register shows us how disputable and insecure these liberties had proved to be. On 1 August, 1332, the bishop wrote to Robert de Cotes, the vicar of Cheddar, informing him of the constitution of the legate Ottobon and Archbishop Meopham (1328) against the violation of ecclesiastical property, and bidding him solemnly pronounce in the parish church the excommunication of recent offenders and institute an inquiry as to their names.

Cotes writes on 25 August that he has done this, and finds that John atte Boure, Thomas Gylemyn, John Champyon and John their servant are under grave suspicion.² In reply to a further mandate of the bishop (6 November), Cotes certifies on 13 November that he has found Matthew Pecche and Robert Boxe guilty by report of robbing the manors of Axbridge and Cheddar, and John Champyon, John Knight and Simon le Forester guilty in the fact: he has cited them, as required, for 13 November. The same day, as they failed to appear, the bishop writes to the rectors of Shiphэм, Rowberrow and Axbridge, and the vicars of Winscombe, Compton and Cheddar, informing them that John Champyon, John Knight and Clement (*sic*) le Forester are excommunicate for contumacy in not appearing: they, with Pecche and Boxe, are to be cited afresh to appear before the bishop or his commissary on the first law day after 30 November, 1332.³

It is to be noted that Matthew Pecche, who has thus come

under suspicion, was the hereditary forester-in-fee for the whole of Somerset, having succeeded to Sabina Pecche who held the office when the perambulations of 1298 were made.

On 24 November, a week before the time appointed, Pecche and Boxe as well as the three excommunicated offenders appeared before the bishop at Banwell, and took an oath to obey the commands of the Church. The bishop had no legal officer with him, and he appointed 3 February for the sentencing of Matthew Pecche, and the same day as before for that of the three excommunicates, whom however, as they had now submitted, he at once absolved.¹ Meantime the head forester on this side Trent, Robert de Ufford, issued through Matthew Pecche a summons to all concerned to attend his court to be held at Axbridge on 13 December.² The next we hear is that on 30 January, 1333, a few days before Matthew Pecche was due to appear before him, the following royal writ was issued to the bishop :

Whereas it is contained in a certain statute issued at Westminster in the first year of our reign, that every man having a wood within a forest may take husbote and haibote in his wood without attachment of the officers of the forest, as long as he does it by the view of the foresters : And now we have understood that you, because Matthew Pecche, forester-in-fee of our forest in the county of Somerset, and certain other foresters and officers of our forest there, attached certain of your men and servants, who by your command cut divers oaks and other trees in the wood of Cheddre, within our forest of Menydep, pertaining to the manor of Cheddre which is of the ancient demesne of the crown of England, and (which) you hold at fee farm, without the view of the foresters and officers, and against the assize of the forest, you caused our said foresters and officers to be cited to answer before you, and because they did not appear before you, you fulminated the sentence of excommunication on them in contempt of us and the right

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of our crown. We prohibit that you attempt anything which may turn to the prejudice of us or of our crown, and if anything has been unduly attempted by you or yours we will cause it to be revoked without delay.

Witness ourself at York, 30 Jan., in the 7th year of our reign (1333).

Be it remembered that on the 13th day of March A.D. 1332(-3), John, clerk of Matthew Pecche, living at Pedertone, before the bishop of Bath and Wells, at Wyvelescombe, being interrogated, confessed that he had obtained this royal prohibition to the bishop presented by the said John there.¹

This incident would seem to be now closed. The bishop, however, was determined to free himself once and for all from the interference of the foresters, and on 1 September, 1337, he obtained from the king the following charter :

Grant, after a pious preamble and out of affection for Ralph, bishop of Bath and Wells, and of special grace, that the manor of Cheddre, co. Somerset, which is part of the temporalities of that see and within the forest of Menedep and part of the ancient demesne of the crown, shall in future be disafforested of vert and venison and all other matters pertaining to the forest and foresters and other ministers of the forest ; and that the bishop and his successors may at their will enclose the woods belonging to the said manor and hold them as a park ; and may assart the wastes, lawns and other lands (*placeas*) of that manor as they will, and till the assarts so made, and hold them to them and their successors ; and that they may give, sell, take and fell of their woods as they will, and remove the same with free passage without the bounds of the woods ; and that the woods and the park made thereof shall be quit of waste and regard and view of foresters, verderers, regarders and all other ministers of the forest ; with further grant that the said bishop and his successors and their men and tenants of the said manor and other dwellers there or in other places belonging to the manor and disafforested with it shall not in future be troubled by the king or his ministers of the forest touching matters belonging to their jurisdiction ; and that they shall be quit of suits and pleas of the forest, summonses, plaints and all other actions, belonging to the king or the forest or the justices or other ministers of the forest, and of the lawing (*expeditatione*) of their dogs, and the feeding (*putura*) of foresters and other ministers of the forest, and of all other claims and exactions ;

and that the bishops and their successors for themselves and all their tenants of the manor shall hold the said manor with woods, park and assarts and the foregoing liberties in frank almoyn without impediment of the king, the justices of the forest, verderers, regarders and other ministers, saving to the king the fee farm due from the bishop and his successors for that and other neighbouring manors, which are held of the king ; moreover if the bishop or his successors or the men and tenants of the said manor of Cheddre commit any trespass without the precincts of that manor and the places disafforested, they shall be held to answer for it before the ministers of the forest according to the custom of the realm and of the forest.¹

There was, however, still trouble at Cheddar, the foresters being evidently unwilling to recognize the terms of the charter. Accordingly on 3 October, 1337, a special commission was issued as follows :

Appointment, pursuant to the statute of Northampton, of Thomas de Berkele, Richard Lovel, Walter de Rodeneye, Joceus de Bayous and Hildebrand de London, to go in person to the manor of Cheddre, co. Somerset, and make proclamation in the king's name inhibiting all persons under a heavy penalty from doing anything in contravention of the statute ; made under the following circumstances. The king lately by charter granted to Ralph, bishop of Bath and Wells, that the said manor which is of the temporalities of the see and within the metes of the forest should be disafforested and that he and his successors might at their will impark the woods pertaining to the manor, bring the wastes, lawns and other plots of the manor into cultivation, and grant, sell or cut down and carry the same without the bounds of the said woods with liberty of chuminage, and that the assarts when made should be quit of waste and regard, as well as of view of foresters, verderers or other ministers of the forest ; but certain persons striving to hinder the effect of such charter daily go and ride armed there and threaten the bishop and his servants and assault many persons there, imprisoning some until they make fines and ransoms with them, and carrying the goods of others.²

At this point the first fragment of the Household Roll of Bishop Ralph comes to our assistance, and helps to carry on the story. On Monday, 10 November, 1337, after the day's account at Evercreech, which is smaller than usual, there is

appended a further account headed thus: "On the same day, 10 Nov., at Cheddar for the Justices of the Forest and others." We cannot be sure that this refers to the arrival of the special commissioners; but on Wednesday, 19 November, at Wells, we have an entry for "hay of the manor of Woky for eleven horses of the lord of Berkeley which spent the night there"; and another entry for "loaves for the horses of the lords T. and M. Berkeley, W. Rodeneye, T. Gurneye, T. Marlebarewe, E. Clyvedon, S. Bristoll, R. Midelneye, P. Wellesleye, R. Somerton."

Moreover, it would seem that the bishop must have given a banquet in the great hall at Wells in honour of Thomas Lord Berkeley¹ and his brother Maurice, a distinguished soldier of the day. Two hundred and sixty-eight persons were provided for, and the account for the day rose to £5 10s. 7½d.; whereas at Evercreech the number of persons as a rule was from 70 to 80, and the cost from 25s. to 30s. We note that two of the special commissioners were among the guests, namely Thomas Lord Berkeley and Walter de Rodeneye.

Not long afterwards Matthew Pecche relinquished the office of forester-in-fee by sale, and so brought to an end a hereditary succession which had lasted from the time of William de Wrotham in the reign of Richard I. It passed rapidly through several hands to the great family of Mortimer in 1359, and thence in the next century to the Dukes of York.² Among the last acts of Matthew Pecche in this connexion was the confirmation on 14 February, 1338, of a release to Bishop Ralph and his successors "of all right in the forest, custody of the forest and forestership within the manor of Ceddre in the county of Somerset lately within the metes of the forest, but now disafforested."³ A deed to this effect was enrolled

on 17 February, and on the next day Matthew came into the chancery and acknowledged it.¹ It is therefore not without interest that we learn from the last fragment of our roll that Matthew Pecche drank wine with the bishop in London on Tuesday, 17 February, 1338.²

THE FUNERAL OF THE LADY OF CURRY RIVEL.

The bishop had hardly got back to Evercreech from his meeting with the Justices of the Forest at Cheddar, on 10 November, when he was obliged to make a progress in some state to another part of the county. On Wednesday, 12 November, he is at Somerton. Thirty-five horses and hackneys have to be fed, and the abbot of Muchelney sends him hay for the purpose, as well as litter for beds and for horses. Moreover various expenses occur on this day under the heading of the "Marshallsea"—for house-cleaning, and the felling of a tree for fuel.

On Thursday he goes on to Curry Rivel, where he has to provide a luncheon (*jantaculum*), the rector of the parish being one of his guests. Hay is provided on this day by the abbot of Muchelney for fifty-five horses and hackneys; and a quarter and two bushels of oats for the said horses is entered as "of the gift of the defunct lady." This entry is followed by another, which is significant: "Expenses of N. of the chapel (*de capella*), with the pack-horses (*sumeriis*) of the chapel and others, between Evercreech and Curry, 4d." In the evening the bishop is back again at Somerton for supper, and the next day he returns to Evercreech.

What has occasioned this brief visit to Curry Rivel? The bishop's "chapel" (that is to say, altar furniture, vessels and vestments) has been transported from Evercreech. The abbot of Muchelney, if not present, has at least shown a practical

interest in the proceedings.¹ The rector of Curry Rivel, who as we shall see had obtained leave of absence to attend the schools, is back at his post. A great lady has died. Plainly the occasion is a funeral.

Who then is the "*domina defuncta*" of our roll, the lady who is buried with so much circumstance at Curry Rivel on 13 November, 1337?

First we may note that on 7 February, 1336, the bishop admits John de Middelney, acolyte, to the parish church of Curry Rivel at the presentation of the lady Sibilla de Mohun, lady of Curry Rivel; with license to study for a year. On 15 September, he gives him letters dimissory for the order of subdeacon, and on 5 April, 1337, again grants him a dispensation to go to the schools for a year.²

Here then is a "lady of Curry Rivel," who is at the same time "the lady Sibilla de Mohun." Let us look first at this latter title, which takes us to Dunster Castle some forty years before it passed from the Mohuns to the Luttrells.

John de Mohun, the third of that name, had seven or eight sons and one daughter before his first wife Ada died in or before March, 1324. Early in 1325 we find him married to a lady named Sibilla; for Bishop Drokensford then licensed a confessor for them.³ In 1330 Sir John de Mohun died. "The dower," writes Sir H. Maxwell Lyte, "assigned by the Crown to Sibyl, Lady de Mohun, in 1330, comprised the castle and manor of Dunster. . . . In 1335 it was reported to the King at Alnwick that she was dead, and no time was lost in

disposing of the lands which she held in dower ; but the report proved false, and she was certainly living in 1337."¹

We have next to inquire into this lady's earlier history, and especially into her connexion with Curry Rivel. We are fortunate here in having for our guide the late Prebendary Bates Harbin, who wrote an exhaustive article on *The Family of De Urtiaco* in the *Somersetshire Archaeological Society's Proceedings* for 1896.² Langport and Curry Rivel came to the De Lorty family through Sabina Rivel, daughter and heiress of Richard Rivel, who was married to Henry del Ortay (de Lorty, latinized *de Urtiaco*). She died in 1254, twelve years after her husband. About the year 1292, Henry de Lorty II, who had inherited Langport and Curry Rivel from his aunt Sabina, married a lady named Sibilla. In 1310, he settled these two properties on himself and his wife Sibilla with remainder to his heirs. He died on 10 September, 1321. An effigy on the north side of the north chapel of Curry Rivel church has been supposed to represent him : as the figure is now placed, the shield is turned to the wall, but the cross of the De Lorty arms (*azure a cross or*) can easily be made out.³ More recent criticism has, however, assigned this effigy to the period 1270-80, and Preb. Bates Harbin accordingly suggested that it may represent the father or grandfather of this Henry.⁴ After an inquisition held at Langport in 1324, royal license was given to Sibilla to marry again on payment of 12 marks. Almost at once she married John de Mohun, as we have seen above.

It is plain from all this that the lady Sibilla was a person of no small importance, and we cannot doubt that she is the "domina defuncta" of Bishop Ralph's roll. We may add

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that it is probable that John de Middelney, whom she presented to Curry Rivel in 1336, had some family connexion with her. For her daughter of the earlier marriage, Elizabeth de Lorty, was married to Sir Ralph de Middelney. It has even been assumed that it was this John de Middelney who was the younger brother of Sir Ralph: see the interesting article on the latter by Preb. D. M. Ross in *Som. Arch. Soc. Proceedings*, lxi, 149. But the brother John whose arrest was ordered in 1322 can hardly be the John de Middelney who was only an acolyte when he became rector of Curry Rivel in 1336.

NOTES.

1. *Fercule*. Sometimes used for the dishes served. But in this roll it indicates the number of persons provided for: cf. p. 128.
2. The brackets <> signify that the roll is imperfect or illegible. As the entries are generally made in a set form, the missing words can often be supplied. Where numbers are supplied within brackets, the general prices have been taken as a guide.
5. *Cervisia*. Two kinds of ale occur: 'cervisia' (often with 'bona' added), entered at $\frac{1}{2}d.$, when home-brewed; and 'cervisia secunda,' entered at $\frac{1}{3}d.$.
6. *Precii*. These entries are summed daily as 'de instauro': whilst the others are for cash, and come under 'de coffris.'
13. Here 'c' stands for the long hundred (120). Our hundred is written as five-score (v^{xx}), see p. 93, l. 35.
14. *Panes minus*. These entries of 'plus' and 'minus' (loaves over and loaves short) may have been noted as a check on the baker, who produced so many loaves to the bushel: cf. the pantry entry on p. 134.
1. The 's' in 'stokfish' is throughout formed like a 'g.' But that 's' is the letter meant is shown by the occurrence of the same feature in the name of Margerie Irish on p. 127.
3. Every stick of eels should contain 25 (Assisa de pond. et mens. temp. Ed. I. *Statutes of the Realm*, p. 205).
4. The abbot was John of Breynton (1334-42).

Household Roll of Bishop Ralph.

- P. 86, l. 7. *Fenum*. Hay from the farm in the occupation of the bailiff, taken from his stock at a certain price per horse, and settled between him and the steward at the reckoning day.
- l. 11. *Prebende*. Horse corn, commonly oats and beans. The 'black loaves' seem to have been made from the same corn as that used in the pantry for human consumption. The price is the same.
- l. 19. A chantry was founded for the bishop in Shrewsbury Abbey in 1345 (Reg., p. 520). On 19 July 1349 Thomas de Calweton, the prior of Shrewsbury, arbitrates in a local dispute at Chew (p. 612).
- P. 87, l. 35. *Minutis*. Cf. p. 98, l. 3, 'menuis.' Not necessarily minnows, but any small fry.
- P. 88, l. 18. *x ferris*. Occasionally preceded by 'in'; but most frequently as here.
- P. 89, l. 28. *Radeclive*. Pope Alexander III in 1179 confirmed to Bishop Reginald among other possessions *villam de Cumton cum portu de Radeclive*. 'Ratcliffe' in Stuckey's map, on the Axe, which is navigable so far—'Ratley' in Greenwood's map, in Compton: it is 'Ripley' in Ordnance map (Church, *Early Hist. of Wells*, pp. 66 f.). See also under *Rackley* in index to *Cal. of Wells MSS.*, vol. I. In *Notes and Queries for Somerset and Dorset*, vi. 151, is an article by the late Canon Church on Portus de Radcliffe which deals with the important fisheries at or about the junction of the Axe and Yeo. Cf. p. 97, 'Cumpton.'
- l. 31. *Stokis*. A comparison of prices would suggest that this is meant for 'stockfish.'
- P. 91, l. 2. Ale purchased, as here, costs *1d.*; ale from the store *4d.*, as noted above.
- P. 92, l. 33. *Incipiente*. Cf. 'antiquo,' p. 96.
- P. 93, l. 35. *c vxx*. It would take 7 bushels (with 4 loaves over) to produce 220 loaves. The cost would be *3s. 6d.* and the total for the day would amount to *13s. 2½d.* The totals as we have them amount to £9 3s. 9½d. for the week. They are entered on

- p. 98 as £10 12s. 9½d. The incomplete Cheddar totals may be taken to account for the discrepancy of £1 9s. od.
- P. 95, l. 3. *Mersaut*. Halliwell's *Dict. of Archaic and Provincial Words* (ed. 10, 1881): 'Meresauce. Brine for pickling or soaking meat in. *Palsgrave*. See the *Ordinances and Reg.*, pp. 435, 459.'
- l. 32. *Sumpterii*: cf. p. 96, l. 18, 'sumeriis.' The word *sumpter* originally meant, not the horse, but the horse's driver: hence the modern English *sumpter-horse*, i.e. a baggage-carrier's horse, the addition of *horse* being necessary to the sense, whereas the Mid-Eng. *somer* was used alone in the same sense. In Old French *sommier* is a pack-horse, and *sommelier* its driver (Skeat, *Etymological Dictionary*).
- P. 96, l. 12. *Abbot of Mucheleneye*. See above, p. 81.
- l. 20. The differences noted above between the prices of home-brewed and bought ale apply to wine. From the store it is entered at 4d., when bought it costs 6d.
- P. 98, l. 2. *Rectoris de Dichyate*. He was Stephen de la Haye, who seems to have received more than one favour from the bishop (Reg., pp. 145, 170).
- l. 9. *Sobbare*. Cf. p. 105, 'Sudbare.' He is described as 'familiaris noster' (Reg., p. 80).
- l. 16. *Domina de Clivedon*. She may have come over from Milton Clevedon, which was held by the lord of Clevedon, Sir Edmund de Clevedon, who succeeded his father, Sir John, in 1336. For the family of Clevedon at this date see *Som. Arch. Soc. Proc.*, XII, part II, pp. 27 ff. Cf. p. 114.
- P. 102, l. 4. *John de Carleton* was the bishop's official and commissary: he became dean of Wells in 1353.
- P. 107, l. 23. *Fesanne*. These birds are of rare occurrence. Mr. Webb states that it was not until the reign of Edward III that they became sufficiently numerous to attract the depredations of poachers (Swinfield, p. 40).

Household Roll of Bishop Ralph.

- P. 107, l. 24. Richard Flory (or la Flory) occurs as presenting to Pykewell (Frome Selwood) in 1343 and again in 1349 (Reg., pp. 474, 585).
- P. 108, l. 17. *John de Middleton* (or Milton) was the bishop's commissary, c. 1332-1345. He resigned the rectory of Shepton Beauchamp and was made chancellor of Wells on Nov. 19, 1337 (Reg., p. 314). But on Dec. 9 he exchanged this office with Simon de Bristol, and so became rector of Bleadon (pp. 16, 314). He was still living in 1350. The statement of Collinson (III, 40) that an effigy in the north choir transept at Wells represents John de Middleton, chancellor of the church, who resigned office in 1337 and assumed the habit of a friar minor is not easy to explain. He at one time held a prebend in St. Paul's, but never at Wells. His brief tenure of the chancellorship was perhaps a temporary arrangement by which he obtained the rectory of Bleadon, which was in the gift of the bishop of Winchester.
- l. 18. *Furca*. Cf. p. 112, l. 22.
- l. 19. *Ferris verteribus*. New shoes would be made out of the old iron of cast shoes, not only as a matter of economy, but as providing greater toughness than new iron would. These eighteen would go into store, and so no price is given for them when they pass into use.
- P. 109, l. 3. R. *de Rode*. There is no mark of contraction in the MS.; but it looks as though R. de Rodenay may be meant.
- P. 112, l. 21. R. *Brikebek*. Roger de Brikebeke, clerk in the bishop's household, was accused with Walter Rodenay by the Archbishop of Canterbury of doing violence to his servants at the door of the chamber assigned to him during his visitation of Glastonbury Abbey in 1331. The bishop made the inquisitions demanded, but no evidence was forthcoming against him (Reg., pp. 77-81). In 1334 and 1335 he was one of the bishop's proctors at the Roman court (pp. 186, 194); and he was still in the bishop's service in 1343 (p. 472). He

appears several times in the registers of the dean and chapter (see Index to *Cal. of Wells MSS.*), and was present at the accord with the bishop reached on 30 Oct., 1338. Amongst the documents belonging to the Axbridge Town Trust is a release granted by R. Brekebec to John Langelond, of a tenement in the manor of Cheddar, which he had of the gift and feoffment of Richard de Wakelee and Alice his wife. The date is 40 Ed. III.

- P. 113, l. 33. *allecisis.* The more usual form would be ' allecibus,' but here and generally the copyist has adopted the less common forms from ' allecia.'
- P. 119, l. 25. *T. Jurdan.* He is described as ' familiaris noster ' in Reg., p. 80. His appointment as bailiff of Wiveliscombe, etc., is given in Reg., p. 112.
- P. 120, l. 1. The household is similarly set out on p. 128 below.
- P. 121, l. 1. The place omitted at the heading is Banwell, which the bishop reached on Dec. 21 (Reg., p. xxxiii).
- P. 123, l. 8. *Sarū.* We are indebted to Dr. Hamilton Thompson for the substance of the following note. It may be ' Sarñ ' for ' Sarnie ' ; but herrings were usually bought in England, and in this case most probably at Salisbury market. After noting that the usual locative form is ' Sar,' or ' Sarr,' he concludes : ' I do not remember a case of " Sarū " or " Sarum " in full before 1400, and then only as an adjective ; but in ordinary English talk the substantival use would have been a matter of course, and I see no reason why " Sarū " may not have meant Salisbury in the speech of Ralph's time. The form " Ser " (p. 132) is certainly unusual ; but it is not unlikely to have been used by a clerk who was familiar with the common pronunciation of " er " as " ar. "'
- P. 124, l. 6. *scutella* is a word of extensive application to dishes, platters, saucers or salvers : it is retained in our English ' scuttle.' The half dish of brawn may be connected with the festivities of the time.
- P. 125, l. 26. *Dicun.* This name is still frequent in the north, for Dick or Richard.

P. 126, l. 2. This is a delivery of corn in bulk from the manor to the pantry, the first recorded so far. It is useful (cf. p. 134), as it gives some idea of how the account was made. The baker promises to make 33 loaves to the bushel, but the total is not calculated (cf. p. 134). The price for the delivery is not entered, but is reckoned each day at 6d. per bushel. The supply lasts until Jan. 18, and in that time 2,685 loaves have been produced: ten quarters at 33 to the bushel would mean 2,640. But good measure has been allowed by the manor, for in the eight days, 81 bushels appear, priced at 40s. 6d. The extra bushel would account for 33 and the 'superplusagium' (p. 133, l. 18) for 18. So that actually the 10 quarters have given 2,635 as against the 2,640 promised. In the eight days there are entered 18 loaves plus, and 23 minus; so that by taking the excess, the 5 minus loaves away, we find that the baker has actually fulfilled his undertaking, and we could supply after 'de toto' the figures 2,640 as a correct reckoning (ii^m v^e ii^{xx}).

l. 4. *De quibus.* This seems to point to the fact that not only was the same corn used for human and animal consumption, but that the actual loaves were of the same baking.

P. 127, l. 19. *Cryalli.* This is the same as 'curalli,' above, p. 128.

l. 27. *Margerie Irish.* In 1332 the bishop granted license to Margery la Iressch to have divine service in her chapels of Middleton (Milton) and Badgworth for a year (Reg., p. 93). The wine may have been sent from Banwell to Badgworth.

l. 28. *Petro Gentilcorps* attests a charter at Banwell in 1351 (Reg., p. 681) and at Aller in 1354 (*Cal. of Wells MSS.*, I, 503).

P. 129, l. 27. *Discis garnitis.* There are not many entries of household utensils: cf. p. 155.

P. 131, l. 19. *Auca.* The Prior of Woodspring has so often been the donor of geese for the bishop's use, that we

may well conclude that his is the name omitted here.

P. 132, l. 1. *Archidiacono Tanton*. This was Robert Hareward, who entered upon the office in 1320 (Reg. Drok., p. 184).

P. 134, l. 1. *London*. In this portion of the fragment several things claim notice : the Appendix calls attention to the larger number of entries 'de coffris.' The extended choice of foods and fish is natural ; the greater frequency of fish in the daily dietary is probably due to the incidence of Lent. A comparison of country and town prices would be possible from the three fragments taken together which would be of interest to students of economics.

P. 135, l. 11. *Haberdens*. Salt cod, dried and cured at Aberdeen ; hence the name (Swinfield's Roll, p. 50).

l. 15. *Portagio*. Carriage by hand, as distinguished from 'cariagio,' which is used of horse transport.

l. 16. *Pavone*. Mr. Webb (Swin., pp. 1, cxxvi.) speaks of the peacock as 'ever confined to state banquets,' but as being kept for amusement ; this was apparently the purpose of the peacock and the swans at Fulham (p. 137).

l. 33. *Franciscis*. Swinfield's Roll, p. 68, contains an entry of 'pisce frisco.' It seems to mean 'fresh.'

P. 136, l. 16. *Capriolis*. Roebuck.

l. 18. *Flore frumenti*. Finely ground flour, suitable for pastry. Its quality may be judged from the price, *rod.* a bushel.

P. 137, l. 26. Now that corn is coming from the bishop's own manor again, the price reverts to the usual 6d. per bushel.

P. 139, l. 14. *Lampreda*, a lamprey ; *lamprenorum*, the lampern or smaller lamprey.

P. 144, l. 16. *Furmento*. Furmety occurs once in Swinfield's Roll on January 12 (p. 42). 'In lacte xii d. In fro' ad frimtatū iii d.'. It is a dish still eaten in Somerset and other parts of England : in Yorkshire and Nottingham it is one of the

special dishes eaten on Mothering Sunday. It is made of whole grains of wheat first boiled plump and soft, and then boiled in milk, sweetened and spiced (Brand's *Popular Antiquities*, I, 63).

- P. 146, l. 22. The words 'panes vi plus' appear to have been omitted at the end of the line; for $3\frac{1}{2}$ bushels would produce 112 loaves only.
- l. 24. A slight computation will supply the omission of the loaves to the bushel as 'xxxii.' The number of bushels used between the date and the next delivery at Dogmersfield is $46\frac{1}{2}$, nearly 6 quarters (see p. 156).
- P. 147, l. 8. *Mellis.* This is the only entry of honey; cf. p. 152, l. 18, for wax.
- P. 149, l. 7. . . . ch. This may stand for tench, which in Swinfield's roll (p. 5) occurs with 'menuisis.'

APPENDIX.

In 1854 the Camden Society published a Roll of the Household Expenses of Richard de Swinfield, Bishop of Hereford, during part of the years 1289 and 1290, carefully edited with elaborate notes and an appendix of illustrative documents by the Rev. John Webb, F.S.A. This was followed in 1855 by a further volume, containing Mr. Webb's exhaustive introduction to the roll under the title of "Abstracts and Illustrations," a glossary and an index.¹ Mr. Webb's transcript, as printed, is a literal reproduction of the original, with its innumerable and somewhat difficult contractions and suspensions. The result does extraordinary credit to his skill as a palæographer and his vigilance as a proof-reader; while his notes and commentary, if they incline to prolixity and occasionally slip into doubtful interpretations, are the work of an accomplished scholar, thoroughly conversant with the history and manners of the period to which the roll belongs.

The roll, consisting of ten membranes, records the daily expenses of Swinfield's household from 30 September 1289 to 23 July 1290, and was drawn up, as the note at the beginning informs us, by John of Kempsey (Kemese), one of the bishop's chaplains.² The remainder, which brought the account up to Michaelmas, no longer exists. The entries are systematically arranged, with details of time and place, and with daily, weekly, and monthly totals. A large number of miscellaneous purchases and payments, affording a great variety of particulars, are grouped together, with regard to subject rather than to chronological order, in paragraphs upon the dorse of the roll.

As will be seen presently, the endorsement furnishes an amount

of additional information to which Bishop Ralph's roll provides no parallel. Swinfield's roll, further, has two great advantages. In the first place, it is a continuous record of nearly ten months covering all the great festivals of the year and the whole of Lent as well as the normal course of daily life. In the second place, while it includes periods in which the bishop remained for many days together at one of his manor houses, it also embraces the details of a journey to and from London, and of a singularly complete visitation of his diocese, extending over more than two months, with brief intervals.

While the present roll covers a shorter period, and its continuity is broken, a comparison between the methods of account keeping is somewhat in favour of Ralph's clerk. His regular distinction between the various departments of expense, the 'marshalsea,' kitchen, pantry, buttery, and hall, each with its daily total, as well as his daily balance between cash payments from the household coffers and allowances taken from stock, shows a more systematic economy than Kempsey's undivided accounts and general totals, to which, for a complete estimate of expense, items of ordinary purchase have to be added from the summary paragraphs of the endorsement. Kempsey's method, it is true, gives us the payments in cash from day to day; but he was less particular in computing allowances for stock, and these we frequently have to reckon for ourselves upon a scale of average prices, as will be seen from the quotation of a week's account given below. His habit also was to enter large wholesale purchases for the stock on the days when they were made, which occasionally swells the weekly expenses to an abnormal figure.

On these grounds, a comparison of expenses between the two rolls is somewhat difficult, and, to be treated in any detail, would necessitate a larger space than it is possible to allow here. It would also involve a discussion of relative prices, which it is more profitable to leave to a specialist in economic history. It may be said, however, that, while the average of the expenses recorded for nine full weeks in the present roll, ranging from a maximum of £18 19s. od. to £7 18s. 0 $\frac{1}{4}$ d., is slightly over £12 19s. 2d., the average in Swinfield's roll for 42 weeks, ranging from £25 17s. 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. to as little as £2 17s. 3d., is £9 10s. 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ d.

If, at first sight, this seems to point to a somewhat stricter economy on the part of Swinfield's household, there are other circumstances which have to be taken into question. The dif-

ferences between the methods of the two rolls have been noticed already.

In general also provisions were cheaper in 1289-90 than they were some fifty years later : if the cost of various kinds of fish be compared at similar periods of the year, it is obvious that, although Swinfield bought in larger quantities, he could buy more for his money. A goose cost Ralph about $3\frac{1}{4}d.$; Swinfield could get one for $2\frac{1}{2}d.$, or for even less. It is true that the revenues of the see of Hereford were less than those of Bath and Wells, and that Ralph may have kept a larger household than Swinfield. The entries of *fercule* at the head of most of Ralph's daily accounts furnish a guide to the number of persons for whom he had to provide. While the meaning of *fercula* or *ferculum* varies somewhat according to the context, and *fercule* (*fercula*) in the sense of dishes or courses may be reckoned according to the number allowed to single persons in proportion to their importance, the analysis appended to the detail for 9 March indicates that the estimate here is of the places at table.¹ These vary extremely, according to the degree of hospitality which the bishop exercised. Thus on All Souls' day at Evercreech, the number was 127, and at Banwell, throughout the period after Christmas, it was consistently high, rising to 152 on the feast of the Epiphany. The average throughout is 83 : individual numbers fall below 60 only six times, the lowest being 42 on 30 November, St. Andrew's day, when probably many of the usual frequenters of the bishop's table at Evercreech had gone for entertainment to Wells, and the same number on 23 February in London. It is obvious that guests were continually coming and going : thus on 19 November, there is evidence of a number of guests, when for three days the figures vary from 84 to 88. The average number would thus be considerably in excess of the bishop's personal household, as the attendants of the guests would have to be reckoned in the total. Of Swinfield's household, on the other hand, we have a more exact estimate in the account of their fees for the winter and summer halves of the year endorsed upon his roll.² Following the usual gradation, the persons mentioned are in winter five, in summer six esquires (*armigeri*), in winter four-

teen, in summer thirteen yeomen of service (*valletti de ministr'*),¹ thirteen grooms (*garciones*) in both, nine pages in winter and fourteen persons whom the editor groups together as pages (*pagii*) in summer, that is in winter forty-one, in summer forty-six in all. Some of these were merely temporary helpers, such as the boy or groom employed in the kitchen during the autumn ; but it should be remembered that, in addition to the lay element, we have also to reckon the bishop's chaplains and clerks. If we compare these numbers with the information given in the entry for 9 March in Ralph's roll, we find that at Ralph's table the *libera familia* on that day consisted of sixteen persons, with whom there were seventeen officers of the household and 56 persons described as grooms. It is unfortunate that no such classification is given in Swinfield's roll. We may notice, however, as regards the officers, that the number of officers whose duties are described in the *Consuetudinarium* of St. Augustine, Canterbury, as attending upon the abbot, is precisely seventeen.² Although the identity of figures may be accidental, and the actual offices may have varied somewhat, nevertheless, considering that the Canterbury document was composed at a period which lies very close to that of Ralph's roll,³ it seems to point to a similar standard in the households of the great prelates of the age. On the other hand, it is safe to conclude that the *libera familia* and *garciones* include guests and their servants. In this case the difference in size between the household of Ralph and that of Swinfield was not appreciable.

Another point of comparison in this connection is between the number of horses for which provision is made in both rolls. Swinfield seems habitually to have kept more horses at his manors than Ralph, whose stable at Evercreech was not excessive. At Sugwas the number allowed for daily was generally over thirty, and at Bosbury it occasionally rose to still higher, in a neighbourhood where the bishop frequently went hunting. When the bishop moved from Bosbury to Prestbury, near Cheltenham, for Christmas, he had at least forty with him at each stage on his route, so that the fifty-five recorded at Prestbury on Christmas

Eve and Christmas day do not imply a great number of guests. Shortly afterwards he went to London. On such a journey the household travelled in detachments : carts with provisions went on ahead or followed, and the number with the bishop himself fluctuated from day to day. Throughout this journey and his stay in London, it seldom falls below 35, and is often much higher. On the whole, it may be said that, while travelling, he kept about 36 in constant employment. This number and 35 appear so frequently during the long visitation journey in the spring and early summer that it may be established as normal, with an occasional increase to 40. It is worth noting that at Ross, in the week after Mid-Lent Sunday, and on Easter Eve and Easter day at Colwall, there are sudden rises to 70, which obviously denote large entertainments and many guests.

Against this, the moderate number of horses and hackneys employed by Ralph at Evercreech is not imposing. But, on his short journeys, e.g. on 13 November, when he was at Curry Rivel and Somerton, and on his return the next day, he had to provide for 55 and 49 respectively, and at Wells on 18 and 19 November, for 43 and 39. The numbers at Banwell during the Christmas and Epiphany season vary: on 29 December there appear to have been as many as 80, and, after an average of 51 for the next six days, on the evening before Epiphany there were 70 horses in his stables. In London Ralph's 'marshalsea' expenses were much more moderate than Swinfield's, and he can have cut no great figure on his rides between London and Fulham; but on the eve of his departure for Dogmersfield, there is an increase from 11 to 50, and, during the few days of which we have record at his Hampshire manor, the number is quite on a level with the higher numbers reached in the earlier roll, varying between 38 and 53. If Ralph economised in this department and was unwilling to let his horses eat their heads off in his stable when he had no need of them, he at any rate spared no cost in his progresses from place to place.

The drain which a sojourn in London, with only a limited supply of stock to depend upon, made upon the household treasury, is illustrated by Ralph's experience. There is a notable difference between the two sides of the daily account at Evercreech and Banwell, and the similar items in London. In the same way Swinfield's journey to London cost him a very large sum: for the first fortnight, the amount spent came to over £41. On the other

hand, his visitation, with all the travelling incurred, was inexpensive. Perhaps the chief interest of the roll arises from the completeness of its evidence upon this point, which is not entirely financial. It was not his primary visitation, for his register indicates that he had visited part at any rate of the diocese in 1286. It seems, however, that he received at the Cistercian abbey of Dore the entertainment which was accorded to the diocesan bishop by an exempt convent only as a favour : *ratione primi adventus sui* indicates that hitherto he had made no formal visit to those parts.¹

During most of this period the weekly expenses were frequently below the average. The carts carried a stock of provisions, including wine and beer ; but the need of constant purchases as they went along was much lessened by the frequent procurations in the form of victuals furnished by the rectors of churches. Thus, on 11 March, the bishop, visiting the church of Woolaston, near Chepstow, was entertained by the abbot of Tintern, the proprietor of the rectory.² After Low Sunday (9 April) he set out from Bosbury to visit the churches in the valley of the Teme. He was entertained on successive days by one of the portioners of Bromyard, the churchwarden of Tenbury, a portioner at Burford, and the rectors of Lindridge and Rock ; and these five days cost him nothing. In fact, of £2 18s. 9d., the total for the week, £2 12s. od. was spent at his own manor of Bosbury on the Sunday. Even less extravagant was Whitsun week. On the eve of the feast he came to Leominster, visited the priory, and stayed with the monks, who apparently were his hosts on Whit-Sunday, when he visited the parish church, under the same roof as that of the convent. At Kingsland and Pembridge he stayed at the rector's expense, and at the latter place spent a second day as the guest of the widow of Sir Roger Mortimer. At Presteign the abbot of Wigmore, as rector of the place, sent them hay and oats for his horses, and a similar gift was received from the parish chaplain of Old Radnor ; but hospitality was not forthcoming, so that these two days cost £2 17s. 3d. But on Saturday, 10 May, he found a host at Kington

in Sir Philip ap Howel of Hargest, and the next day he was entertained by the rector of Almeley. Such procurations were exacted only where there was a resident rector able to bear the cost, or where, in the case of an appropriated church, the proprietors were able to offer entertainment conveniently. Most proprietors and the poorer rectors gave fodder for the horses ; and here and there, as we have seen, prominent layfolk were ready to welcome the bishop and his retinue.

There are one or two casual entries which add to the interest of the accounts drawn up at this visitation. On his way through the portion of Gloucestershire which belonged to the diocese of Hereford, he halted, between Flaxley Abbey and Awre, at Newnham-on-Severn. Here a penny was spent 'in hay for the horses while my lord was preaching.' Again, on 4 and 7 May, we learn that Swinfield's visitation of the remote corner of his diocese on the edge of and extending into Montgomeryshire included the dedication of the parish churches of Alberbury and Chirbury. Thus we are enabled to reconstruct details of this journey which lie beyond the main purpose of the roll. It certainly offers a richer variety of incident than Bishop Ralph's roll, where more entries such as the note of breakfast with the rector of Curry Rivel would be welcome. In both rolls we can read between the lines with profit, and a minute analysis of the text discloses particulars which at first sight are hardly to be expected from documents of this kind, but Swinfield's roll is the more fertile. Kempsey's marginal entries are intended mainly to mark the bishop's itinerary, and so furnish more speedy reference to special items, or to call attention to noteworthy purchases or receipts. He was also careful to note baking days, on which the price of corn was entered. Now and then his notes add something to the text. Thus the entry, on 22 October, of ten sticks of eels received from Sugwas is amplified in the margin by the comment that they were the rent due from the weir upon the Wye, a customary payment which is corroborated from other sources. Or, again, on 15 November, when ten swine were delivered at Bosbury by 'R. the reeve of Ross,' the marginal note informs us that R. was Robert Crul or Kyrle, and we are reminded that among the bishop's tenants there was already the family from which, long afterwards, the famous 'Man of Ross' could trace his origin.

The endorsement of the roll, to which there is nothing parallel in Bishop Ralph's, contains a mass of miscellaneous expenses for

which the reader must be referred to Mr. Webb's running commentary.

To show the normal contents of Swinfield's roll more clearly, an English translation of the accounts for a week spent at Sugwas is appended to this note. In conclusion, we may call attention to a point raised by Mr. Webb, who noticed that the total sums of the roll and its endorsement amounted together to nearly double the revenues with which the Ecclesiastical Taxation of 1291 credits the bishop of Hereford. The discrepancy is so great that, if it was the same in other years, Swinfield would soon have gone bankrupt. Mr. Webb, however, concludes that the income returned in 1291 'was estimated rather upon a rateable than an actual value,' and mentions the possibility of accidental profits and private means by which the bishop's annual revenue was increased. We know of his property in Kent, and we may feel sure that, for purposes of taxation, his income from the episcopal manors was stated loosely and without exact attention to the figures of a particular year, but rather upon the lowest average which could reasonably be put forward as the normal profit of landed property constantly subject to the vicissitudes of bad years and unproductive harvests.

Monday following (3 October), same place. Bread, 3 sextaries of wine, ale, already reckoned. Bolted flour, 8d. Yeast, 1d. A quarter and a half of beef, a sheep, half a pig, 3 capons, 20 fowls, already reckoned. 800 eggs, 3s. Mustard, 4d. Carriage (by hand), 1d. Item, a pound of saffron, a pound of ginger, a pound of pepper, a pound of orris-root, a pound of cummin, received from the *camera* for the kitchen. An ell of hemp for bags, 3d. Hay from the manor for 24 horses. In provender for the same, 1 quarter, 5 bushels of oats already reckoned.

Sum, 4s. 5d.

Thursday following (6 October), same place. Bread, a sextary of wine, 12 sextaries of ale bought for 5s. Item, a quarter of beef, a sheep, half a pig, 5 geese, already reckoned. Item, 39 partridges *de perquisito*, and 24 partridges remain. Hay from the manor for 29 horses. In provender for the same, 2½ quarters of oats, already reckoned.

Friday following (7 October), same place. (Baking day.) Bread baked, 2 quarters of corn from the manor, bought for 5s. A sextary of wine, ale, already reckoned. Item, 125 herrings, 4 cod, 2 congers, 2½ sticks of eels, already reckoned, 200 herrings, 2s. 4d. 2 cod received, 14d. From these remain 75 herrings. Tallow, 5d. Hay from the manor for 25 horses. In provender, a quarter, 6½ bushels of oats, already reckoned.

Sum, 8s. 11d.

Saturday following (8 October), same place. Bread, a sextary of wine, ale, already reckoned. Item 75 herrings, 2 salmon, already reckoned. 200 herrings, 2s. 6d. 100 lampreys, 10d. and nothing remains. Peas, 11d. Hay from the manor for 29 horses. In provender, 2 quarters, half a bushel of oats, already reckoned.

Sum 4s. 3d.

Sum for the week, £4 3s. 10½d.

A SUMMONS OF THE GREEN WAX TO THE SHERIFF OF SOMERSET AND DORSET.

Among the archives of the Borough of Bridgwater is a parchment^a containing instructions to take certain legal proceedings and addressed "To John Brokamton undirsheryf of Somerset and Dorset, beyng in Stronde In at London." This is one of many documents, including notes of pleas, drafts of conveyances, precedents and other such legal writings, belonging to the middle and latter half of the fifteenth century, which would seem to have been the property of this same John Brokhampton. He practised as an attorney, and of the suits described—there are more than thirty of them—he appears in two-thirds as counsel either for the plaintiff or the defendant. One seems justified therefore in connecting this group of manuscripts with his name and in associating with him, as under-sheriff, the roll the text of which appears here. What his connection with Bridgwater may have been and how his documents came into the muniment chest are questions for which answers are yet to be discovered.

The roll is numbered 263 among the Bridgwater Corporation Muniments. It consists of six parchment membranes, secured together at the top, and averaging 19½ in. to 21 in. in length and about 6 in. in width, with a left-hand margin of 1¼ in. to 1½ in. These are written over on both sides, and on the dorse the script runs from bottom to top. There is no seal nor sign of any seal having been attached, from which it may be concluded that this is not the original Summons, but a copy.

The roll contains a list of fines and amercements which the Sheriff is required to pay into the Exchequer by a certain date, and may be described, if we may follow a later usage, as a *Summons of the Green Wax*. It is thus distinguished from a *Summons of the Pipe*, which was a writ from the Exchequer ordering a Sheriff to bring up the account of his administration on a specified day.

These fines and amercements have been imposed, some by the Justices of the Common Pleas, and others by the Barons of the Exchequer. It is the duty of the Exchequer to collect them through the Sheriff of the County in which the suits have had their origin. To this end the Exchequer is furnished with a list of estreats, and the summons to the Sheriff is copied from it.

We are thus able to collate the details of the *Summons*, not only with the *Placita de Banco*, the list of common pleas, but also with the Estreat Roll with which the Exchequer was provided, so far as these are extant.

Fortunately the Estreat Roll for 5 and 6 Edward IV still exists, and Sir H. Maxwell Lyte has carried out such a comparison at the Record Office, throwing light on much that would be otherwise obscure. It is due to his collation that it is possible to correct certain scribal errors, and these are shown in footnotes under letters.

Examination of the text of the roll shows us that the claims are arranged under the twelve terms of three consecutive years, from Michaelmas, 1465, to Trinity, 1468, though those for any particular term are not necessarily grouped together.

There are also two general sections which cover respectively the first four membranes and the last two. The first section consists of amercements imposed by the Justices of the Common Pleas; the second, of distraints on land imposed by the Justices of the Common Pleas or by the Barons of the Exchequer.

i. The amercements imposed by the Justices of the Common Pleas will be seen to fall into three classes.

(a) Amercements of certain persons, possibly the Sheriff's own officers, for not having collected the local juries required for the trial of particular suits. Leaving on one side for the moment one jury which belongs to the second part of the roll, there are mentioned nine such juries. In one there are only four absentees ; in another twenty-three ; while in all the others the whole twenty-four are missing. For each jury there are two men responsible for its appearance excepting the last, where there are four. The amercement against each juror's name is usually *2d.* or *3d.*, occasionally *4d.*, and even *6d.*

If such were needed, we might derive evidence from these lists to answer the question whether a jury was at this period summoned on account of the special knowledge its members had of the facts of the case. In one only, all the jurors are men whose names appear in no other ; in a second, all but four are new. On the other hand, one has only four fresh names, another seven, a third eleven. Fourteen jurors appear twice ; ten, thrice ; three, four times ; and one, five times. For three juries the two men responsible for their appearance are the same. The names of the jurors suggest men of substantial position in the counties.

(b) Amercements of "mainpernors" (*manucaptores*), or sureties, for not having produced in court the defendants for whose appearance they were responsible. The names of these mainpernors are given in the *Placita de Banco*, but without any mention of the amercements imposed upon them. It appears, however, that the clerk of the Common Pleas, who prepared the roll of Estreats for the information of the Exchequer, did not base them upon the Plea Rolls. On the one hand, he states the amount to be levied on each mainpernor mentioned as in default. On the other hand, he sometimes creates fictitious names in substitution for those named in the Plea Roll. In his list for Michaelmas term, 5 Ed. IV., the names are obviously fictitious ; e.g. John Hyll and Richard Spyll, John Herde and Richard Byrd, John Fox and Richard Dox, John Hyll and Richard Byll. Such fictitious names are also to be found in the Estreats of the Common Bench for other

counties. [Cf. *Eng. Hist. Rev.*, vol. xxxv, No. 137, p. 102, for similar names in the rolls of the Merchants' Court at Winchester.]

(c) Amercements of plaintiffs and defendants.

2. Distraints to be levied on the lands of parties who had failed to put in an appearance in court. The amounts, which are considerably greater than those of the amercements of mainpernors, are given in the Estreat Roll and also in the margin of the *Placita de Banco*. In this section is the jury summoned to try the suit of the Abbot of Ford *v.* Machen.^a There are twenty-eight jurors summoned and the distraints vary from 6d. to 1s. each. Other distraints are never less than 6d. and may be 1s., 1s. 8d., 2s., 3s., 3s. 4d., 6s. 8d., 13s. 4d. and even 20s. In the final section the names are associated chiefly with the offices of justice, receiver and sheriff, and that of John Hymerford, Constable and Receiver of the late king, appears among them.

It will be noticed that in the left-hand margin^b there are frequent references to the Abbot of Glastonbury and the Bishops of Bath, Winchester, and Salisbury, opposite some of the names. From a Pipe Roll of 9 Ed. IV. (No. 314) we seem to learn that these dignitaries accounted for the amercements of persons living in their respective liberties. The total amount which the sheriff owes is given first. Then follow the sums for which each of the four ecclesiastics is answerable. Lastly, we have the balance due from the Sheriff.

VISITATION OF RELIGIOUS HOUSES AND HOSPITALS, 1526.

The document printed here is derived from a manuscript notebook of the reign of Henry VIII recently discovered by Mr. R. Holworthy in a room over the Bishop's Registry at Wells.

The little book consists of forty-two leaves of paper, measuring $12\frac{1}{2}$ inches by 9, many of which are blank. Most of the others are occupied with financial memoranda, extending from the year 1529 to 1547. The receipts shown are those in respect of institutions to churches, chapels, and chantries, in the diocese of Bath and Wells, at the rate of 6s. 8d. apiece, those in respect of procurations from religious houses and the different deaneries, and those in respect of the probate of wills. On the other side, there are notes of a few payments to an apparitor, to a serjeant, to a registrar, and others. The notes of persons instituted furnish some names and dates supplementary to those given in Mr. Weaver's list of *Somersetshire Incumbents*.

The first few pages of the book are, however, of a different character, being the contemporary draft of the record of a visitation held by the Bishop's Vicar-General, in July and August 1526, at Wells, Glastonbury, Barrow, Bristol, Keynsham, Bruton, Muchelney, Athelney, Barlinch, Cannington, and Bridgwater. Other houses in the diocese had clearly been visited by the same officer in the same year, but the notes of his proceedings therein have not come to light. Inasmuch as his report is not entered in the Bishop's Register, it has appeared desirable to print the portion of it which has survived in draft.

The visitation seems to have begun at each place with a sermon in English, after which the head of the community established there handed in a list of its members, and they were examined one by one as to the state of affairs.

Some interest attaches to the surnames borne by the witnesses.

At Glastonbury, for instance, very few of the monks bore patronymics, such as Verney, Byssell, and Hirstane. According to a common practice, many of them were known by the names of their birthplaces or of places where they had formerly lived, such as London, Worcester, Exeter, Newport, Taunton, Cleeve, Glastonbury, Street, Wedmore, and Selwood. More of them, however, bore names derived from the history and traditions of the abbey itself. One was surnamed Joseph, and two had taken a name from Arimathaea. St. Fagan, St. Patrick, St. Benignus, St. Indract, and King Arthur—all supposed to have lived, or to have been buried, at Glastonbury—had supplied names for others. St. Benedict, the founder of the order, and St. Dunstan, the most famous of the local Abbots, had not been overlooked. Kentwine, Athelwulf, Athelstan, and Edgar, kings who figured as benefactors to Glastonbury, had given names to others again. St. John Baptist, St. Alban, St. Wilfred, St. Ceolfrid, the venerable Bede, St. Neot, St. Alphege, St. Anselm, and St. Urban, selected from a wider field, had also supplied names.

Most of the persons examined said that everything was satisfactory (*omnia bene*). It may be suggested that outspoken criticism of the administration might have had unpleasant consequences after the departure of the visitor. The record of the proceedings, however, is not without information as to the state of affairs in some houses.

At Barrow, the Prioress and four of the nuns deposed that one member of the community, who had been sent thither from another convent, was disobedient, unruly, and abusive.

At Cannington too, three nuns spoke of the arrogance of Juliana Burges, who, nevertheless, voted for the election of one of them as sub-prioress.

At Muchelney, there was some complaint against the organist, who was not one of the regular monks.

At Bruton, three of the canons complained that the ale supplied to them was watery and weak, one of them saying that oatmeal was mixed with the barley. The infirmary and the guest-house were alike stated to need repair.

At Worspring, the Prior was evidently on bad terms with the brethren, some of whom went so far as to exhibit written articles against him.

Keynsham was in a deplorable condition. The Abbot had to admit that the fabric was ruinous, and the Visitor found the choir of the church itself filthy, frequented by dogs, as if it were a kennel. There was a deficiency of books for the conduct of divine service. Water and fuel were alike scarce. None of the brethren were studying at Oxford, and the novices at the abbey were suffered to remain illiterate, although they were desirous of instruction in grammar.
