Phillips of the City Studios, Wells. Permission to copy the engraving which hangs in the Deanery was kindly given by the Dean of Wells.

Only the fringe of a fascinating story has been lifted. The full story may be told in some future volume, but that cannot be till sufficient funds are in hand to pay for the somewhat heavy expenses which such a work would entail.

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INTRODUCTION

PART I. WELLS CITY CHARTERS

(i) PRINTED AUTHORITIES

A LEARNED and polemical dissertation on the legal effects of the early charters granted to the city of Wells is to be found in the introduction to the Year Book of 16 Edward III, vol. 1, pp. xxiv-xcix, edited by the late Mr. L. O. Pike. We are, however, not concerned here with a legal discussion of the exact point of time at which incorporation can be held to have occurred.

The early Wells Charters are also analysed by Mr. A. Ballard in his *British Borough Charters*.

A great amount of valuable material is to be found in the Report of the Historical Manuscripts Commission on Manuscripts of Wells Cathedral, published in 1885, and in the Calendar of Manuscripts of the Dean and Chapter of Wells, in two volumes, published by the same body in 1907 and 1914.

The late Canon C. M. Church dealt with the early borough charters in his *Chapters in the Early History of the Church of Wells* (1894). Wells and Glastonbury, by the late Chancellor Holmes (1908), also contains valuable information as to the early chapters of borough history.

(ii) DATE OF EARLIEST CHARTER

It has generally been assumed that Wells was made a borough by charter of bishop Reginald between 1174 and 1180. From the internal evidence of the charters, however,

there is little doubt that the first grant was made by his predecessor bishop Robert, between 1135 and 1166; this view was held by Professor Freeman.

Unfortunately, no original charter of Robert is to be found amongst the city muniments, but in the cathedral library there is a copy of one, by which he ordained that the three fairs, held on the festivals of the Invention of the Holy Cross (May 3), St. Kalixtus (October 14), and St. Andrew (November 30), should be held in the town, and not in the church or churchporch as in the past; and that persons attending the fairs should be free from toll on those days and their eves.

This charter of Robert was confirmed by Reginald, who, at the same time, granted freedom from toll on the morrows of the three festivals.¹

The next charter of Reginald (No. 1) is extremely interesting, for, while adding further privileges to the borough, he granted with the tenor of a charter of Robert his predecessor, that the town of Wells should be a borough by the bounds by which it was defined in the same charter.

In an old manuscript volume containing extracts from the Convocation books of the borough, in the possession of Mr. Sidney Goodall of Wells, there is a somewhat faulty transcript of a third charter of Reginald, the original of which has been lost. A better copy has however been found in the Convocation book, Vol. II, p. 86, a full transcript of which appears later. In this charter it is recited that "considering and diligently noting the honourable and very praiseworthy intention which our venerable predecessor, the late Robert, bishop of Bath, is known to have had concerning the improvement of the status of the town of Wells and its advance towards freedom, [and] inspired by his authentic examples, putting aside delay hereon, we have with full consideration appointed the same town with more ample bounds of buildings, and with the same emblems of freedom which it had before."

Savaric, between 1199 and 1201, granted, in accordance

with the example of his *predecessors*, to the borough, all the liberties and free customs of burgesses.

Further, on II June 1493, the Corporation say they have divers grants of Robert, Reginald and Savaric, copies of which they sent to the Bishop and were prepared to produce the

originals if required.

Thus, from the above, it seems obvious that the original charter making Wells a borough was granted by Robert, for in his missing charter, mentioned in Reginald's second charter (No. 1), the bounds of the borough were defined. In Reginald's third charter we find him inspired by Robert's example, granting more ample bounds, and the same emblems of freedom which it had before. Again, if Reginald had created the borough, Savaric would have spoken of his *predecessor*, not of his *predecessors*. And lastly in 1493 a charter or charters of Robert were in the possession of the borough. It is clear, therefore, that the history of Wells as a borough dates back at least to the time of bishop Robert, 1135 to 1166.

(iii) BISHOP REGINALD'S THIRD CHARTER

The third charter of Reginald, already referred to, appears to have escaped the notice of Wells historians, and a full transcript is therefore given:—

BISHOP REGINALD'S GRANT

Universis et fidelibus ad quos presens carta pervenerit, Rainaudus Dei gratia Bathoniensis episcopus salutem a Domino. Considerantes et diligenter attendentes honestam et plurimum laudabilem intencionem quam venerabilis [pre]decessor noster bone memorie Robertus Bathoniensis Episcopus circa statum ville Wellensis meliorandum & in libertatem provehendum habuisse dinoscitur auctenticis ipsius informati exemplis villam eandem amplioribus edificiorum terminis et eisdem libertatis insignibus que prius habuit dilatione posthabita super hoc pleniore deliberacione disposuimus Statuimus ergo ut totum territorium quod inter subscriptos terminos continetur, Burgus sit imperpetuum, scilicet ab angulo virgulti nostri per quoddam vetus fossatum usque ad pratum de Hela, a prato illo per quendam rivulum usque ad pontem de Kiward, a ponte illo sicut aqua de Wellis defluit usque ad pontem qui est in ingressu ville prope capellam Beati Thome Martiris. Concedimus itaque ut omnes qui intra prescriptas metas messuagia

[MS. masagii] habuerint liberam habeant potestatem commorandi. recedendi, domosque suas impignerandi [et] vendendi, plenamque habeant facultatem eas in quemcunque [modum] eis placuerit transferendi preterquam domibus religiosis, quod non poterunt facere sine licencia nostra aut successorum nostrorum, integro jure reddituum nostrorum retento, scilicet de singulis messuagiis xiid annuis. cessimus preterea ut omnes tam mercatores quam alii qui ad anniversariam diem dedicationis capelle Beati Thome Martiris, que dies est Crastina Nativitatis Sancti Johannis Baptiste, quacumque negociationis causa convenerint, liberi sint triduo ab omni consuetudine [et] exactione, scilicet die nativitatis Sancti Johannis in crastino [et] tertia die que est dies sanctorum Johannis et Pauli, salva in omnibus iusticia nostra. Volumus eciam ut si lis aliqua forte dampnosa inter ambitum messuagii alicujus eorum emerserit, liberam habeant potestatem ut adinvicem concordes fiant justicia nostra nullam inde exigente consuetudinem vel emendationem donec Burgenses in justicia defecerint nisi mortale vulnus vel dampnum perpetuum corpori inflictum fuerit vel eciam nisi alteruter litigantium justicie nostre querimoniam faciat, salva in omnibus justicia Regis et dignitate. Inhibemus autem ne aliquis in eodem Burgo pelles crudas aut coria cruda emere presumat nisi fuerit in lima et laga Burgensium Wellensium. Hiis testibus Jocelino Sarisburiensi Episcopo, Savarico Archidiacono North', Ricardo Constanciensi Archidiacono, Waltero Priore de Bokeland, Willelmo Precentore Wellensi, Magistro Radulpho de Lechelade, Jocelino capellano, Willelmo de Sancta Fide, Gervado filio Tebaldi, Willelmo Giffard, Gaufrido de Sancto Georgio, Alano de Sancto Georgio, Reginaldo Ruffo, Ricardo camerario Sarisburiensis Episcopi, Nicholao Pincerna, Galfrido Ruffo, Radulpho Cusin, Petro fratre Jocelini, Petro de Chambeham, Roberto de Raget, Willelmo Pywyne, Petro et Adelardo camerariis, Petro de Forde, Hugone de Lincoln, &c.

The first three of these witnesses are of great interest. Jocelin, bishop of Salisbury (1142–84), was the father of bishop Reginald. Richard of Coutances, described as archdeacon, was related to Richard de Bohun, who was consecrated bishop of that diocese in 1151 and was brother of Jocelin and uncle of Reginald. Savaric, who succeeded Reginald as bishop of Bath, was a second cousin.¹

It will be seen that Reginald further granted a fair to be held on the anniversary of the dedication of the chapel of St. Thomas the martyr, being the morrow of the nativity of

St. John the Baptist, to be free from toll on that day, its eve and its morrow.

He also willed that if any suit involving damages should arise within the ambit of any of the messuages the burgesses should have power to settle the dispute between themselves, until they made default in justice, unless a mortal wound or permanent harm was inflicted, or one of the litigants made complaint to his justice. The restriction of this privilege to offences committed within the burgess's house would appear to be a survival of the primitive house-peace. From this it is obvious that there was a court, in which the burgesses could themselves settle certain of their own disputes, but its actual constitution is unknown.

(iv) BISHOP SAVARIC'S CHARTER

After the death of Robert in 1166, the see remained vacant until April 1173, when Reginald was consecrated. In 1191 he was translated to Canterbury, but died before receiving the pallium. He secured the succession to the Bishopric of Bath for his kinsman Savaric, who, at the time, was with Richard I at the crusade, and he was consecrated at Rome in 1192. Savaric can have spent but little time at Wells on account of various high offices he held both in this country and on the continent.

Savaric's charter to the borough is practically a confirmation of those of Reginald, containing no additional privileges. In it he is styled Bishop of Bath and Glastonbury, and as the union of the two churches took place in 1199, the charter must have been made between that year and King John's charter dated 7th of September 1201. Savaric's seal is attached to this, the last episcopal grant to the borough.

(v) ROYAL CHARTERS

On 7th of September 1201 Wells received from King John its first royal charter, granting that it should be a free borough, with a weekly market on Sundays as there was then, and the four fairs already mentioned. The king further granted a fair

on the feast of the translation of St. Andrew, to last for eight days, to be held in the streets of the borough at the same places as the fair of St. Andrew had been held, unless it were to the detriment of neighbouring fairs. There is, however, no reference in the charter to the incorporation of the borough.

In 1290 Edward I confirmed the charter of King John. Edward III by his charter dated the 17th of July 1341 confirmed the charters of John and Edward, and of his further grace and in consideration of 40l., the burgesses received the following privileges:—

"That they shall be quit of toll, passage, pontage, lastage, stallage, paiage, quayage, tronage, picage, keuerage, morage, murage, works of castles, houses, walls, dikes, causeways and bridges and of all other aids and royal works throughout the king's realm and power.

"That they may elect and create there from among themselves a mayor, bailiffs and constables of the peace, for the better governance of the borough and the keeping of the peace, and coroners for the attachment of pleas of the crown, when they occur within the said borough and liberty; who after making oath according to custom shall discharge the duties of their offices; and that the coroners shall answer before the justices in eyre for the attachment aforesaid and the other duties of their office.

"That there shall be a gaol in the said borough and that the burgesses shall have the keeping thereof and of all prisoners taken within

their liberty.

"That they shall have the return of all writs of the king and summonses of the exchequer in all matters touching their said borough or arising therein and the execution of the same by their mayor and other ministers; so that no sheriff or other bailiff of the king shall meddle therein to make summonses, distraints, or attachments within their liberty, nor enter their borough to do anything concerning his office save upon default of the said mayor, ministers or burgesses.

"That no one of them shall plead or be impleaded without the borough concerning lands or tenements within the bounds of the same, or concerning trespasses, contracts or agreements arising within the said borough and liberty, but that all pleas of this kind shall be held within the borough before the mayor and bailiffs thereof and there determined; and moreover that they shall not, by reason of their lands or tenements within the borough, or without, so long as they stay within the borough, be placed upon any assizes, juries, or inquisitions with any men from without, nor shall such men be so placed with them, by reason of lands or tenements of that kind, or of tres-

passes, contracts or any other matters within or without the said borough, but that assizes, juries and inquisitions about matters which arise within the same and concern only the said burgesses shall be taken only in the borough; unless the pleas or the assizes, juries or inquisitions aforesaid touch the king and his heirs or the commonalty of the borough.

"That they may enclose and fortify their said borough according to the ancient bounds thereof with a wall of mortar and stone and with dikes and may crenellate the wall and so hold the same." 1

This charter, was, however, cancelled after protracted litigation, on the ground that it was prejudicial to the King and bishop. Serious disturbances ensued, the townsmen, under John le King, banding themselves together to resist the bishop's extortions. These disturbances lasted from January 1341/2 to May 1343, when the bishop commenced an action for damages against the rioters and obtained judgment for 3,000l.² The proceedings concerning the cancellation are dealt with fully by Mr. Pike.³

It was two hundred and forty-four years before the borough obtained from Queen Elizabeth so wide an extension of their privileges; during this period there were constant quarrels between the bishops and the burgesses.

Further charters were obtained from Richard II, Henry IV, and Henry VI.

(vi) Renewed disputes between the Bishop and the Burgesses

During the reign of Henry VII, disputes between the bishop and the borough again arose, if indeed they had ever ceased, and by an order of the former, four articles of complaint were delivered to the mayor, which were entered in the Convocation book on the 15th April 1493. In the first, the bishop complains that the burgesses hold themselves to be the king's burgesses and not his. Secondly, the bishop claims the sole right to create burgesses. Thirdly, he complains that when his bailiff

makes a burgess, he is not accepted until he has been admitted by the master and commonalty, and lastly, that the burgesses use mills other than his.

To these articles the burgesses replied as follows:— To the first, that the matter had not been in argument; that they intend nothing prejudicial to the bishop's franchise, and that they had divers grants from bishops Robert, Reginald and Savaric, copies of which they sent with these answers. That since then they have received a grant from King John, and confirmations from subsequent monarchs, so that they consider themselves the king's burgesses 'and their said good lord's also.'

To the second article they say, that by virtue of the above grants they have for nearly three hundred years made burgesses as they now do in the lord's guildhall, and also for certain causes removed them from their liberty, without interruption from the bishops. That the bishop's bailiff, marshal and servants have taken the oath as other burgesses, time out of mind. That in 15 Henry VI the executors of bishop Bubwith built a new Hall for the meetings of the burgesses, by the assent of bishop Stafford.

To the third, that the lord's bailiffs have not made more

than 23 or 24 burgesses.

To the fourth, that being free burgesses, they cannot think how they can be bound by any custom to the suit of the lord's mill. That they use the other mills for their own ease and no other cause.

Finally, the burgesses say that the matters of the articles would not hurt the bishop 'a penny in a thousand years,' and they trust to find him 'no less good and loving as his predecessors.'

At the same time the following letters passed between the bishop and the burgesses concerning the same matters:—

'Righte Reverende fader in God and our al[toget]her synguler good lorde we recommaunde us unto your good lordeshipp in as humble wyse as we can or may suffice mekely bysechynge yor good lordeshipp not to yeve hasty credence to eny synystere informacon yeven ayenst

yor saide Cyte for unfeynyngely ye shall fynde yor saide Cite of as good and feythfull disposicon toward yor saide lordeship after their power as they can thenke to be For they thenke in ther mynds that they have as grete a tresour of yor lordeshipp as yor saide Cyte had of eny lorde Bysshop at eny tyme sith yor honorable See biganne there yor noble excellente wysedome and high discrecon remembred. And good lorde wee have made Ansuere under yor Correccon accordynge to your Commaundemente unto yor Bylle mynystred unto us in yor behalf by our good maister the Deane of Welles as symple wytted men wt oute lernynge prayinge yor good lordeship to accepte it wt favor and to take our entents and good lorde we thenke in our minds that oon of yor Articles concernyth the Amovynge of Robert Broke from our company of burgesses. We send you wt our bill of Ansuere the copy of the Acte made avenste him in that behalf. By which it appereth, if he wolde have payde the summe of his dutye he nedyd not to have be amoved for he had receyved the saide money and xxs more. As it was sufficiently proved afore us. And we deme that he sterith yor lordeshipp for the Mylles also sayenge that he can not bere the Ferme in lesse than yor Burgeisses be compelled &c. Good lorde if he and his felawe wull leve the Mylles we shull fynde ij other to take it at the same Rente and fynde good sufficiente suertees withoute such maner of Trowble. No more but Almyghty Ihu ever preserve yor righte Honorable astate with encrece From yor Cite of Welles the xxijth day of Apryll, &c.'

'Where as by yor writing sente and delyverd unto me by yor comburgeys this berer Ye desyre me to yeve no hasty credence avenste you Affermynge yor disposicon unto me as good as ye can thinke. Neighbours I have yeve you no cause to thenke that I am lighten of credence, for I neyther have condempned ne sued nor Vexed you upon eny matter that I have not first caused you to be Spoke wt and herde at lengthe nor yet at this tyme am I so disposed to do how be it ye make me suche answere upon my firste Article that ye yeve me righte good cause to sue you. And as for your good disposicon towarde me I have yeve you no other cause nor shall do wtoute yor greate deservynge I know it is my dutye to love and cherisshe you and so wull I do as ferre as I may wtoute doynge my Churche and successors wronge I thenke also it shall be yor wysdome to owe me yor good herts for I thanke God and the King it lith in my power to do you good and plesour. As so suerly I was determined to have do. And namely in Such things as some of you have sued in tyme passed. pray you neighbours sette Aparte all wilfulnesse and haultesse. be contente to lyve under the righte of the Churche accordynge to your dutye And er ye appoynte to stryve wt the same loke uppon yor neyghbours how they have spedde in case lyke. Loth would I be

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that all the londe shulde mokke bothe you and me to stryve for yor name. How be it that it toucheth me moche nere then it doth you. Seynge that it cowde not be litull prejudice to me stonding yor lorde and lorde of the Burgh to suffre you to calle yor selfe the Kings Burgeisses, which claymeth no thynge on you more then the dutye of yor Allegennce nor noughte ye have nor holde of hym within that Burgh nor on non of hys predecessors. Excepte ye wull byde by the graunt of Kinge John. Which I trowe at lengthe ye wull refuse Neighbours yor Ansueres specially upon this Article accordith to no lawe nor reason nor they be not those wherw ye shulde desyre me to holde me contented for thei be nevther clere certevne ne resonable And therefore as ye wull that this matter take an ende bitwixte us a parte by mutuell coicacon wtoute fallyng to the sute in the lawe I pray you sende me assone as ye goodely may oon of the beste of yor Comburgeisses & a man Lerned in the lawe furnysshed wt such evvdences as ye have. And er they departe fro me I trust either partie shall better knowe the righte of the other, wherewt of reason he shulde holde hym contente As so ye shall be sure I wull furthwith do when I shall be enfourmed that yor righte is better than myne trustynge to fynde Semblable disposicon in you for yor partye. And thus fare ye well. At Warrewycke the xxvijth Day of Aprill.'

The disputes, however, were in no way abated, for on 9th June 1540 the burgesses presented to the master the following list of complaints against the bishop:—

Hit is compleyned by the hole burgeys of the Citie of Welles unto the maister of the seide Cite that the privileges fredoms and libertees whiche hath ben graunted by Kyngs & confermed by Bushopps cannot be usid & enjoyed accordyng to theyre Charters to them graunted for the Bailly of the Bushoppes for certeyn wronges & enjuryes by hym dayly don as hereafter foloweth—

Inprimis the seide Burgeys cannot be fre in fayres or merkettes within the seide Towne withoute paying yerely a Certeyn sum of money

to the seide Bailly.

Itm the Bakers cannot bake no brede to Sale without paying yerely a certeyn sum of money.

Itm the Bruers there cannot brue withoute paying yerely a certeyn Sum of money.

Itm the Fishers cannot be suffred to sell theyr fishe without that they do pay yerely a Certeyn Sum of Money.

Itm the seide Burgeys & others be grevously amerced in the Bushoppes Courte & never affered by the affuras.

Itm that no Inholder can sett up any Syne but that he paith yerely a certeyn Sum of Money.

Itm that no Burgeys shalbe suffered to sell any ale or sett up any ale stake but that the Baily do take of them yerely a certeyn Sum of money.

Itm that no Fermor of the Bushoppes milles can kepe any of the seide milles but that he do pay yerely a certeyn sum of Money.

Itm that no Bouchers can sell any vitalles but that they do pay

verely in lykewyse.

Itm that no Burgeys can bryng any manner of grayne or other Smale thyng to the seide merket but the seide Bailly do take Tolle of them which is contry to the liberties of the seide Towne for the Towne of Welles is a fre Borugh for all the burgers to buy and sell without payng any manner of Tolle or Custome.

(vii) QUEEN ELIZABETH'S CHARTERS

The next Charter of importance is that of Queen Elizabeth dated 5th March 1574, by which the burgesses received certain additional privileges, almost identical with those set out in her later charters of 1589.

But in the meantime still further disputes concerning the rights of the burgesses arose between the bishop and the town, the bishop's articles of complaint, entered in the Convocation book on the 11th of March 1566, were as follows:—

"Fyrst My Lord Bushopp sayeth that we ought nott to kepe anie three weken Courte for the burgesses of anie actions brought betwene burges and Burges accordinge to our old custome.

"Item that my Lord Bushopp sayeth that we ought nott to take bande of the Taylers that are burgesses within this Towne for the reformacon of Apparell and makinge of great hoses accordinge to the

tenure of the statute and proclemacon.

"Item more whereas the Maister of the Towne with the residewe of his bretherne hath accustomed heretofore to sytt at the highe Crosse when any Proclemacon shalbe proclaymed there and the baylyfe to reade the same: My Lord Bushopp allegeth that we ought nott to be there at suche tyme accordinge to oure olde custome."

To these articles it was decided 'with the hole asent of the Burgesses that they meane nott to lease anie orders that hath ben heretofore accustomed within this Towne.'

The fact that the Queen granted the additional privileges did not, however, ease matters, as will be seen from various entries in the Convocation books.

On the 20th of March 1574, fifteen days after the date of the charter, it was agreed that if the bishop desired to see the charter, the mayor and certain masters should show him a copy only, and that they shall bring it away with them, and on no account leave it with him, while on the 3rd of August following, it was agreed that the mayor and others should exhibit a supplication to the Queen concerning the misdemeanours of the bishop against the town.

In October of the same year, Sir Maurice Berkeley, Sir George Rogers, Sir Hugh Portman, and Hugh Smith, Esq., justices of the peace for the county, were in Wells, and the matters in dispute were placed before them. The bishop demanded that the mayor should cease to have the maces carried before him within the borough until the dispute had been tried at law or was otherwise determined. The mayor, after consulting his brethren, answered that what they did was by virtue of the Queen's letters patent, which he was bound by oath to put into execution. It was further revealed that by an order of the Lord Treasurer, the case was to be heard at the next term by the Queen's council.

The bishop caused a *scire facias* to be directed to the mayor, who on the 16th of February 1575 put in a plea. The outcome was that the burgesses lost their case, and, for the second time in their history, a newly obtained charter was ordered to be returned and cancelled.

Undeterred by this blow, the burgesses immediately set about obtaining another charter, and on the 10th of November 1577 Henry Newton, Thomas Leigh and Richard Godwyn were given authority to procure it, and this they did in the following year, but it is merely a confirmation of the ancient charters, without the grant of any new privileges.

The burgesses were, however, not satisfied with this, for, in November 1581, letters were directed to the Queen's attorney with a view to obtaining a new charter, and also the fee farm of the borough, promising him, and such others as obtained it, two hundred marks and all costs and charges. On the 12th of the same month, Leonard Cross, one of the constables, and

John Colles, were sent to London to see the Queen's attorney, with instructions that if they could not get the fee farm of the borough, they were to proceed with a new charter of incorporation only. Their journey evidently proved successful, for on the 5th of March following Colles was given a grant of his house in Priston—i.e. Preist's—Row for fifty years and 5l., and Crosse 5l., for their pains in obtaining a concession of their liberties and privileges.

Despite this apparent success, they did not get their charter, for, in November 1586, Colles was sent again to London to confer with the bishop and council concerning the new charter granted to the borough, and at what cost for the whole liberties, according to articles already drawn up, or for a mean

charter for the better government of the town.

It would appear that the bishop was the stumbling-block, for on the 1st of March 1588 it was agreed that in consideration of a new charter, 'for the good will of the bishop' (Thomas Godwin), 100l. should be given to Mr. Thomas Godwyn at the latter end of May, and 10l. a year for three years. There was, however, a condition, viz. that the money was to be returned if the charter was not obtained. To this sum the masters of various crafts and private persons subscribed, on the understanding that they should be repaid out of the revenues of the borough if unsuccessful.

The 'gift' evidently had the desired result, for, on the 20th of April 1588, the bishop assented to the corporation receiving not only a renewal of their ancient liberties, but a new grant of other liberties and franchise (see No. 28A, page 122). These privileges were contained in the two charters of Elizabeth, dated the 19th and 23rd of July 1589 (Nos. 29, 30).¹

(viii) Later Royal Charters

There are only two later royal charters amongst the city archives, those of Charles II and James II. The following

interesting extract, relating to the latter, is printed in the London Gazette of 21 January 1683:—

'On Monday last was brought hither the New Charter which His Majesty hath been graciously pleased to Grant unto this Corporation. The Mayor, with several Gentlemen of Quality, and the most considerable inhabitants of this place, making together 300 Horse, went several miles out of Town to receive it: And about half a mile from hence the Lord Bishop of this Diocese, being attended with all the Clergy, was pleased to meet this Company in his Coach, and to accompany them to the Town Hall, where the Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen were sworn; after which they returned to their several homes, the People expressing their Joy and Satisfaction, with repeated Shouts and Acclamations, and the whole Corporation manifesting the sense they have of His Majesty's Grace and Goodness towards them.'

All the charters are in good condition, much care having been taken of them, especially by the present town clerk, Mr. Edward P. Foster, who some years ago had a metal case with shelves specially made so that they could lie flat. They have recently been cleaned and repaired at the Public Record Office.

(ix) TITLE DEEDS

Wells is possessed of a very fine series of title deeds concerning lands belonging to the corporation, dating from the first half of the thirteenth century. The situation of the properties is so clearly defined that, in conjunction with the plan at end of volume, their respective positions can be traced.

From these documents a substantial list of freemen can be compiled, for all parties and witnesses must have been burgesses. They also form an exceptionally good collection of seals of early inhabitants of the city, particulars of which appear at the foot of each extract.

(x) The Borough Seal

The earliest impression of the borough seal amongst the documents now in the possession of the city is appended to the quit-claim dated 1335 of Edmund son of John Chamberleyn of Wokyhole, 'as the seal of the said Edmund to many is

unknown, the seal of the borough of Wells is hereunto set' (see below, p. 48). According to an article in Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries (Vol. XIII, p. 1) an impression of 1315 was known, but it is not now to be found. The old seal, dating from the early part of the thirteenth century, is still in use. It is thus described in The Corporate Plate and Insignia of Office of the Cities and Corporate Towns of England and Wales, Vol. II, pp. 298-9:—

'The common seal of the city of Wells is a fine double circular one, $2\frac{1}{8}$ inches in diameter, of early thirteenth century date. The matrices are of copper gilt, and are each provided with three keys to insure their fitting properly together. The obverse bears a conventional representation of the front of the cathedral church, with three great gables, and a door at each end, the whole rising above the city. In base is a three arched bridge, and in chief a half-effigy of our Lord in the clouds between the sun and the moon. Legend:—

SIGILLVM: COMMUNE: BVRGI: WELLIE

'The reverse bears a great tree with birds in the branches, and in base the springs of St. Andrew issuing from under the trunk. Other birds are on the ground or flying down and a large stork is dragging a huge pike out of the water. Legend:—

₩ ANDREA: FAMVLOS: MORE: TVERE: TVOS.

There is another seal of great interest, that of the mayor, and of like antiquity, of which, according to the article in Somerset and Dorset Notes and Queries, there was in 1913 an impression appended to a grant dated 1316 in the city archives. This document is now missing, or the seal has been lost, for the earliest specimen extant is attached to a charter dated 1398 (No. 195). It is thus described in the same work:—

'The old mayor's seal, contemporary with the common seal, is a round one, I is inch in diameter, and of silver, with a chain attached to it. The device represents a large tree with birds in the branches, rising out of a pool. In the water lies a large fish which two crows are busily attacking. On one side is the head of St. Andrew and his cross saltire, and on the other the head of St. Peter and his two keys.

The legend is:

S'OFFICII SENESCALLI COMVNITATIS BVRGI WELLIE

'The present mayor's seal, which was given by a Mr. Joyce about ten years before it came regularly into use in 1763, is an oval one of silver, 14 inch long. It bears an ornate shield of the city arms, with the legend:—

HOC FONTE DERIVATA COPIA IN PATRIAM POPULUMQUE FLUIT'

In the Convocation book for 1494 there are rough drawings of the two seals, and a note, that by an order the inscription on that of the mayor's was to be as follows:—

SIGILLUM SENESCALLI BURGI WELLIE.

No impression of a seal with this legend has, however, been found.

PART II. FREEMEN OF THE BOROUGH

(i) Source of the List

The admissions to the freedom of the borough are entered in the convocation or court books, from which all those before 1600 have been extracted. These entries are contained in the first three volumes, the first of which covers the years 1377 to 1450, commencing at page 3; the second 1450 to 1553; and the third 1553 to 1623.

When the volumes were re-bound some years ago, a number of pages in the first volume were misplaced. The following list may prove of use to those consulting the records:

(ii) THE EARLIEST FREEMEN

In the answer of the burgesses to certain articles of the bishop in 1493, already referred to, it is stated that freemen

had been made nigh on 300 years. This takes us back to the charter of King John of 1201, which is slightly less than 300 years, and it is probable that the first freemen were made in that year. Previously, the making of a burgess was the

prerogative of the bishop.

The first freedom recorded in the Convocation books is that of William Pynchyn, cook, in 1377. The names of a number of earlier burgesses may be obtained, however, from the lists of pledges, all of whom must have been freemen. Also all the parties and witnesses mentioned in the title deeds would have been admitted to the freedom.

(iii) Means of Acquiring the Freedom

There were five means by which the freedom could be obtained, viz. patrimony, fine, marriage with the widow of a burgess, marriage with the daughter of a burgess, and apprenticeship or marriage with an apprentice. A burgess, on admittance, had to pay a fine which varied according to the nature of his claim to the freedom, as will be seen by the following examples, which are full translations:—

PATRIMONY

1380. On which day John Thurelewynd came and gave to the master and commonalty of Wells, drink, gloves and wax for having freedom within the said borough. And nothing for a fine because he

is the son of a burgess.

1547. To this hall or convocation came John Gregory the younger and prayed to have and enjoy the freedom of this borough. And gave to the master and burgesses for entry and having the freedom of the city, wine, wax and gloves, and for a fine nothing, because he is the son of John Gregory the elder. And so he is admitted into the freedom aforesaid. Pledges, Morgan Gytto and Edward Neget.

FINE

1379. Thomas Duk comes and gives to the master and commonalty of Wells for having the freedom of the said borough, 10s., 12 pairs of gloves and a pottle of wine, viz. 4 gallons, to be paid on the feasts of the Annunciation of Our Lady and the apostles Philip and James, by pledges Thomas Halyete and Thomas Clu.

MARRIAGE WITH THE WIDOW OF A BURGESS

1487. To this court came Thomas Bethome and prayed to have the freedom of the borough aforesaid and gave to the master and commonalty, wine, wax and gloves and nothing for a fine, because he married the wife of a burgess, namely Roger Coryngdon, and so he is admitted to the freedom aforesaid, by pledges master Richard Burnell and Nicholas Pole.

MARRIAGE WITH THE DAUGHTER OF A BURGESS

1527. To this court came John Bell and prayed to have and enjoy the freedom of the borough, and gave to the master and commonalty for entry and having the freedom of the city, wine, wax and gloves, and for a fine nothing, because he married the daughter of Richard Knight, burgess. And so he is admitted to the freedom aforesaid. Pledges John Deverell and Richard Knyght.

APPRENTICESHIP

1485. To this convocation came John Wyne and prayed to have the freedom of this place, for having which freedom he gave to the master and commonalty, wine, wax and gloves, and nothing for a fine, because he was apprentice of John Stowell, mason. And so he is admitted to the same freedom, by pledges Thomas Sewarde and John Blacman.

Marriage with an Apprentice

1487. To this court came William Selman to have the freedom of this place, and gave to the master and commonalty, wine, wax and gloves and nothing for a fine, because his wife was apprenticed with Richard Burnell. And so he is admitted, by pledges Robert Draper and Thomas Fleminge.

In the Convocation books there are numerous orders concerning the freedom, but generally speaking they merely confirm previous orders. In 1466, however, there is an order as to the admission of apprentices on the same footing as sons of burgesses, that is, by giving wine, wax and gloves.

(iv) Fines paid upon Admission

The usual fine for the admission of strangers to the freedom was 10s., wine and gloves. This was subsequently raised to 15s., with wine, gloves and wax. By an order of 30 September 1563, a stranger had to pay 40s. with gloves and wine. Of this sum, half was to be given to the master for diet, and the other

half to the common livelihood. By the same order those marrying the widows or the daughters of burgesses were to pay 10s., gloves and wine, the money being divided as above, in place of two gallons of wine, one dozen gloves and for wax 2s. By another order of 31st of December 1572 the above order was rescinded, and the fine payable was to be the same as before.

As to what became of the wine, there can be little doubt. The question of the gloves, however, is somewhat obscure. There are numerous references to their distribution, but it is difficult to decide to whom they were given.

In 1381 we find 'Here remain two dozen gloves to be distributed, whereof one dozen W. Halyete has from W. Bewill, viz. by surety.' Similar entries to this, with varying numbers, appear throughout the books. From an entry in 1413 it appears that the gloves were in the keeping of the churchwardens.

There is a more helpful entry in 1416—'The same day is delivered by the advice of the master and commonalty one dozen gloves to the works of the council house at . . .' Two years later, 'gloves were delivered to all the commonalty of the borough being there.' In 1424 'distribution of gloves nine dozen and one dozen bought by the wardens.' In the following year, gloves were given to the masons (latham) and other workers for labour.

In 1444 we find 'Distribution of gloves this day, at which day there were remaining 14 burgesses not having gloves, because there were no more to distribute.' In 1469 there remained 17 pairs, which were distributed to 'divers men.' Thomas Purfrey, member of parliament for the borough, upon being made a burgess, gave one dozen gloves and no more. By an order of 1562 every burgess was obliged to give pointed gloves on admission to the freedom.

With such disconnected entries, and in the absence of any ordinances governing the distribution of gloves, it is difficult to form any idea as to whom and why they were given. Doubtless one reason was to assist the glove industry, of which Wells

was a centre. Probably they were given to burgesses present at various ceremonies, but at all events to the mayor and commonalty at some, if not all, the convocations. We know, too, that they were given in payment of, or as rewards for, certain labour. Considering that a dozen pairs were given by every freeman, there must have been an enormous quantity at the disposal of the authorities, yet the stock was generally confined to a dozen or two pairs.

(v) Suspension or Loss of the Freedom

There are numerous cases of freemen being discommoned for various causes, especially in the sixteenth century. Suing another burgess in any other court than the mayor's court, refusing office, disrespect to the mayor, and similar offences were reasons for which a burgess might forfeit his freedom. A few examples may prove of interest.

In 1414, John Romesy was discommoned because he had caused John Galwey and John Shephard to be indicted of felony in Kent. John Colson prosecuted Richard Welyknow by the king's writ without licence of the master, and thereupon forfeited his freedom. In 1425 he prayed to be readmitted, and 'at the great instance of the venerable burgesses he was restored' thereto, paying the master 'what he wished to receive from him, viz. six gallons of wine.' Thomas Tuggell was discommoned in 1564, because of his illbearing towards the master, by exhibiting a bill of defamation to the dean against William Butler, burgess. Tuggell denied the charge, saying 'they loved him not because they were not of his religion.' He afterwards acknowledged his fault and prayed to be readmitted into the freedom, which was allowed, on payment of 6s. 8d.

William Goodman was chosen mayor in 1573, but 'contemptuouslie refused the same office,' for which offence he was discommoned, and 'dreven to leape out at A little dore in the one Syde of the Haule, which may be an ensample for ever.'

By an order of 1548 it was agreed that if a burgess dwelt out of the city for more than a year, bearing no skot or lot,

he should lose his freedom unless he obtained the licence of the mayor.

By another order of 1544, it appears that burgesses had to subscribe 1d. a quarter, or 4d. at the end of each year to the wardens of the Trinity Guild, towards the maintenance of a priest to sing daily for their good estates and the souls of their departed friends. Any one refusing to pay, except 'he be suche a fallowe in suche povertie that he is not able to pay,' was also discommoned. In the burgess's oath in the reign of Philip and Mary provision is made for this payment.

The burgess's oath in 1450 reads as follows:-

'I shal helde bere to the Kynge of Ingelond And trewe be to the Maister and to alle the Burgeyses and to alle the Communes of the sayde toun of Welles. And the Toun helpe with my body, god, and catel be my powere. And trewli the usage of this place, kepe, holde, meyntene, and susteyne, and my brothir wurshippi as he is wurthi And to the semele come whan I am sompnid and may come And also the conseyle of this place keveri and hele And also alle othir usages of Burgeyses that may come to me of knowelech here aftir susteyne and m.. teyne be my powere and buxum and obedient be to the Maister in word and in dede at alle tymes, And trewli my fyn pay at my dayes. So helpe me God and holidome.'

From 1520, the entries generally state the parentage of those admitted by patrimony, the names of widows, and the names and parentage of daughters. Also, in the case of admittance by apprenticeship, the master's name. Unfortunately room would not permit the full information to be printed.

(vi) Examples of further interesting information to be obtained from the Convocation Books

The Convocation books are full of the most interesting information concerning the government of the town, and events taking place therein. A few examples will not be out of place.

In 1569, William Everat, one of the vicars-choral of the Close, was condemned at the assizes to be hanged in chains, the execution to be in Wells, where the crime was committed. On the 28th of February an order was given for making the chains, and for the execution to take place on the 2nd of March,

at which the constables and other officers of the town were directed to be present.

At a convocation held on the 2nd of December 1540, the following schedule of the mayor's allowance was set out:—

Inprimis he that shall hereafter occupy the office of the Mr of the seide Citie of Welles shall be alowed yerely als. for his Fee

Itm yf he kepe a dynner ons in the yere for the Burges wyffes he to be allowed for the seide dynner by the comon Renter of the seide Citie

Also the seide Mr for the tyme beyng kepe a Breakefast at Cristmas for the Burges of the seide Citie he to be xxxs. allowed for the same xxxs.

It also the seide Mr for the tyme beyng shalbe alowed for his charge at the Recreation made to his Broders & others in his howse in vigill of the Nativity of Seynt John Baptist

It also yf the seid M^r for the tyme beyng kepe any potation in the som^r before his goyng forth out of his office he to be allowed for his charges

Sum vjli. xiijs. iiijd.

By an order of the mayor dated the 25th of February 1555, a list of the masters of all the crafts in the town was to be prepared for the next convocation, and the following list was supplied on the 11th of March:—

THE PRESENTMENT OF ALL THE CRAFTS WITHIN THE CITIE OF WELLES Hammermen George Wilmot & Thomas Hagat Maisters of the saide Crafte.

Cordyners . Tristram Merche & Robert ? Reve Maisters of the saide Crafte.

Bouchers . Richard Cary & Robert Heth Maisters of the Crafte of Glovers, Tanners, Chaundlers, & Bouchers.

Wevers . Mathew Stevyns & William Webbe Maisters of the seide Crafte of Wevers, Dyers & Barbours.

Towkers . Thomas Medycrafte & John Burges Maisters of the seide [Craft] of Towkers, Shermen & Cappers. Robert Avery, & John Bushop Wardens.

Mersers . William Butler & John Body Maisters of the seide Crafte of Mercers, Bakers, Bruers & Innholders.

Taillours . Morgan Gytto Maister, James Syllye & John Morgan Wardens of the seide Crafte.

At a convocation held on the 8th of July 1561, it is reported that there had been a consultation between the mayor and others and the bishop concerning the opening of the gates of the palace to the burgesses. The bishop agreed to open them on condition 'that no man being a Burges shall suffer any of his howse to carrye any kind of Rubble or other enoyance within the seid gates or eate upe his Grasse or distroy & turne upe any of his ground there Upon this payne to be amersed at this Halle to all the Brothers & to the rest that be not Burgesses to be punyshed according to ther offences By Imprysonment.'

In 1571, a house had lately fallen into the town's hands, and at a convocation held on the 21st of October, it was agreed that this house should be made a Linen Hall, and that Edward Beavell should hold it for his life at a rent of 5l. 6s. 8d. and also the rent due to the vicars of the Close, on condition that he should treat merchants resorting there reasonably, and should set up a 'signe at the Streat doore of the Quenes Armes and the Armes of the towne on every side and wryte under the arms, This is A Haule for Linnen Cloth.'

Such entries as the foregoing bring the past vividly before our eyes. The history of the lives of our people in the towns and villages throughout the country forms the background of our national history, and it is to be hoped that one day these Convocation books will be transcribed and printed. They certainly form one of the most interesting series of such records in existence, not lessened by the references to constant disputes with the bishops, who, until after the end of the sixteenth century, maintained rigorously their privileges as lords of the borough.

The history of Wells has still to be written. There is an immense amount of material available locally and in the Public Record Office, and it is hoped that this volume may encourage someone to undertake this interesting and valuable work.

CHARTERS AND PATENTS

I. Between 1174 and 1180. Charter of Reynald, bishop of Bath, granting with the tenor of a charter of Robert, his predecessor, that the town of Wells should be a borough by the bounds by which it was defined in the same charter, that every person then, or afterwards possessing a messuage within those bounds shall have freedom of abiding, departing from and returning to it, and likewise of pledging, selling and giving it at his will, save to houses of religion, the bishop's right to a yearly rent of 12d. of each messuage being retained. lawsuit should arise concerning any such messuage, the litigants may agree with each other without the bishop's Justice demanding any custom or correction until the burgesses fail in justice, unless a mortal wound or bodily injury should have been inflicted or unless one of the parties make complaint to the bishop's Justice. Prohibition of the purchase of raw skins or raw hides in the town unless it be in the lima and lagha of the burgesses of Wells.

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Seal—A pointed oval, with figure of a bishop fully robed, right hand raised in benediction, left hand holding a crozier. Inscription—REGINAUDUS DEI GRATIA BATHONIENSIS EPISCOPUS. Size $3\frac{7}{16}$ by 2 inches.

Counter-seal, similar figure. Inscription—RAINAUD' DEI GRATIA BATHONIENSIS EPISCOPUS. Size $\mathbf{1}_{15}^{\kappa}$ by 1 inch.

2. Between 1174 and 1192. Charter of inspeximus by Reynald, bishop of Bath, of a charter of Robert, bishop of Bath, [1135 to 1174] his predecessor, ordaining that those who come to Wells for business on the three festivals, viz.—the Invention of the Holy Cross, St. Kalixtus and St. Andrew shall conduct their business in the places of that vill and shall not presume to violate the church or church porch, and that such traders shall be free of toll on those days and their vigils.

Witnesses to the charter of Robert—Ivo, dean of Wells; Reginald, the precentor; Robert and Thomas archdeacons; Edward; Master Eustace; William de St. Faith; Ralph Martre; William de Atebā; Peter de Chiu; Walter the baker and many others.

In confirming this charter Bishop Reynald adds freedom from tolls on the morrows of the three festivals.

Witnesses: Master William, the treasurer of Wells; Robert, the sub-dean of Wells; Master Ralph de Lichelade; Jocelyn, the chaplain; William de Meleburn; John de Cumb; Thomas de Dinant; Geoffrey, the clerk; Master Roger, the doctor; Michael, the clerk; Hugh, the clerk; Henry de Armentiis; William de Erleg; Philip de Wika; Richard de Keñ; Waland de Welesleg; William de Maulesb; Reginald de Wdeford; Edward de Wells; Godfrey de Cnott; Jocelyn de Wells; William Hept'; Henry, the beadle; Hugh, the smith; William, the forester; Ralph Cade; Hubert son of Goce; Alfred the Merchant; Raynald Ruffus; Geoffrey Ruffus; Ralph Cusin; William, the cook and many others.

Seal—Small piece of green wax on red cord only remaining.

3. Between 1192 and 1205. Charter of Savaric, bishop of Bath and Glastonbury, granting, in accordance with the example of his predecessors, to the borough of Wells and to

all the burgesses dwelling within the under-mentioned bounds, all the liberties and free customs of burgesses and boroughs which have full liberties, and decreeing that the undermentioned territory may be a free borough and enjoy full liberties:—on the south side, where the water runs down from the mill and from the corner of the thicket by a certain old ditch to the meadow of Hela, from that meadow by a certain stream to the bridge of Kiward, from that bridge as the water of Wells flows down to the bridge which is at the entry of the town near the chapel of St. Thomas the Martyr; on the west side, where the cross formerly stood in the way by which one goes to Axebrugg; on the north side, where the cross formerly stood where one goes to Bristol; on the east side, from the road which stretches from the stone quarry to the hill towards Tidesput through the bishop's orchard. Also grant of liberties and prohibition of the purchase of raw hides as in No. 1, and grant to persons coming to Wells for business at the four festivals, the Invention of the Holy Cross, St. Calixtus, St. Andrew and the Anniversary of the dedication of St. Thomas the Martyr, which is the morrow of St. John the Baptist, that they may freely conduct their business in the places of that borough, but shall not presume to enter or violate the church of Wells, or the porch of the church, in order to conduct their business. All such persons coming to Wells shall be quit from toll in all the said festivals and their vigils and their morrows, so that for 3 days they shall enjoy that liberty at each of the said festivals.

Charter of King John granting and confirming that Welles in Somerset may be a free borough, and that the men of the same and their heirs may be free burgesses, and that there may be a weekly market on Sundays as there is, and free fairs as there are wont to be yearly on the feasts of St. Andrew, St. Calixtus, the Invention of the Holy Cross, the morrow of St. John the Baptist, and in addition, of the King's gift, of a fair on the feast of the translation of St. Andrew to last for eight days within the streets of the same borough in the places where the said fair of St. Andrew has been wont to be held.

and to the vicar of the said church 6d.; and every other chaplain in the same church 4d.; to three clerks of the same church for a peal of bells 2d. each; to the bedeman 2d.; and to the said master and commonalty for supervising the same 6s. 8d. Sundry provisions for securing the performance of this charter.

corder and twenty-three of the chief burgesses, being the common council, or before any two or more of them, the mayor or recorder to be one; also of a prison and gaol; and the serjeant-at-mace for the time being to be the warden of the gaol; also that no burgess shall be put on any jury outside the city; and granting that the boundaries of the borough shall be as follows—on the south, from the water running from the mill and from the corner of the thicket by a certain old ditch to the meadow of Hela, and from that meadow by a certain rivulet to the bridge of Kywarde, and from that bridge as the water of Wells flows down to the bridge which is on the entry of the vill near the chapel of St. Thomas the Martyr: and on the west side where the cross formerly stood in the road to Axebrugg; and on the north side where the cross formerly stood in the road to Bristol: and on the east side the road extending into the stone-quarries as far as the hill towards Tiddesput through the orchard of the bishop of Bath and Wells. All which shall be held together with their other ancient liberties and privileges.

I. Between 1237 and 1242. To all to whom this present writing shall come, Thomas the prior, and the convent of Bath greeting in our Lord. We have inspected the charter of the venerable father in God, Joscelin, our bishop, in these To all the faithfull in Christ to whom this present writing shall come, Joscelin, by the grace of God, bishop of Bath, greeting in our Lord. Know ye that we have granted to our beloved son in Christ, Joscelin son of Hubert, chaplain, of whose faithfulness we have had experience, all that place with the buildings and other appurtenances which lie between the house which belonged to Master Hugh our cook (coci nri) and Anne his wife in the town of Wells on the one part, and a certain burgage of the same Joscelin on the other, willing and granting for us and our successors that as the ancestors of the said Joscelin, chaplain, and he, have held the said place with the buildings and their other appurtenances, arable land in the fields and meadows, by the service of carrying the writs of the bishops of Bath to his manor beyond the Perret, so the same Toscelin and his heirs or his assigns may hold all the aforesaid by the service of rendering 2s. yearly to us and our successors for ever, to wit, at Easter 6d., at the feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist 6d., at the feast of St. Michael 6d., and at Christmas 6d. And so the said Joscelin and his heirs or his assigns by the said service of 2s. yearly is to be guit against us and our successors from the said service of carrying the writs, as is said, for all services, saving the enclosing of our park of Westbury, so much as belongs to

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a tenement of that size. In witness whereof to this present charter we have caused our seal to be set. Dated at Banewell, by the hand of Master Walter de Maydenestan, on the morrow of the Annunciation of our Lady, the 32nd year of our Pontificate [1237]. And so we to the aforesaid Joscelin. our bishop, give our assent and by this our present writing attest it.

2. c. 1240. Charter of Hugh Giwold granting to John de la Sonde one place of land with a curtilage and appurtenances in Suthovere in Wells, which lies between the messuages of the said Hugh and Richard de Bristol; and the curtilage extends on the north to the curtilage of Richard de Bruges, and contains from the corner of one house to the corner of the other 58 feet, in the middle 331 feet and at the end 38 feet. Annual rent 12d.

"Itm the said Justice Manwood thereuppon, moved the said L Busshoppe & wysshed his L no longer to protract tyme, but at that present he wolde agree, or eller this last Michaelmas terme by counsell lerned to attend and fall to agreem before the said Three Judge The L Busshoppe answered, that at that psent he colde not, because his counsell lerned were not there psent, but did faythfullie

promyse, for due accomplishm^t of yo^r L Lr̃es, that wthout fayle this last Michaelmas terme, his Sollicyto^{rs} wth his lerned Counsell shold attend the Three Judg appoynted by the subscribed articles, And sholde growe to some reasonable conclusyon for suche newe Lib[er]ties as by the said Three Judg sholde be thought meete and not hurtfull to her ma^{tie} nor to his Busshopricke And this his L did promyse faythfullie in September last As by the Lr̃es of the said Justice Manwood directed to yo^r L dated the xxjth of November 1577 maye appeere.

6. Itm althoughe yor Orators accordinge to the said subscribed Articles have given & delivered upp the said Chre of incorporacon into the Chauncery Cancelled And have procured the Chares of Sarū, Wynton, & Bathe and all other thing concerninge their tytle, And havinge her Mates consent for A newe Chre, givinge also from terme to terme their dyligent attendaunce Uppon the said Judgr for the Articles of liberties to be sett downe by them (to their great chargr) Nowe the said L Bushoppe deferreth the tyme, and will not come to any order for Articles to be sett downe by them.

The pmysses tenderlie considered Maye yt please yor honors at the humble suyte of yor orators. To direct yor Lies to the said three appoynted Judge to sett downe Articles for A newe Chie by her Mattle to be graunted accordinge to the said Articles of agreement, Or some other order as to yor honors shall be thought meete, And yor said Orators shall daylie praye for yor honorable estate longe to contynue."

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Somerset Record Society.

Report for 1931.

The year, so far as numbers of subscribers are concerned, has been rather a dark one: the losses far outnumber the gains. In several cases the reason given for resignation has been the financial straitness of the times, which affects societies no less than individuals. Through death we have lost Mr. E. D. Adams and Colonel Banks, American subscribers; Mr. E. E. Baker, F.S.A., who joined the Society in 1901, and Rev. W. Hunt, D.Litt., who was one of the original members of the Society and who up to his death remained a member of its Council. By resignation the following names disappear from our list: Mr. W. A. Cadbury, Mr. W. N. Mitchell, Mr. W. E. W. Penny and Rev. G. W. Saunders. This gives us a total loss of 8. Against the loss we have only one new subscriber to set, viz. Birmingham Free Library, which to some extent takes the place of Mr. Cadbury.

Thanks to the great generosity of Sir H. Maxwell-Lyte, we were able to distribute to members who wished to possess it the *extra series* volume, *Some Somerset Manors*, in September. A glance at the balance sheet will show that about 60 subscribers availed themselves of the offer to purchase, and the finances of the Society have accordingly benefitted.

In November, Mendip Mines and Forest Bounds, for the work on which we are indebted to Mr. J. W. Gough, was issued to the subscribers for 1930.

The Wells volume, to which this report is annexed, is being issued to subscribers for the year 1931.

Some criticisms have been made of the action of the Council in issuing two volumes that are primarily of local

rather than of general county interest. The reason has been largely financial. The Society's income is not large enough to warrant the employment of professional workers, and the Council was fortunate in securing the voluntary work of Mr. J. W. Gough upon *Mendip Mines and Forest Bounds*, and of Mr. R. Holworthy and Miss Shilton upon *Wells City Charters*. We are grateful to them all.

The production of the present volume for 1931 has been helped by a grant from funds administered by Alderman J. C. Davis, who, while mayor of Wells, gave considerable thought to the muniments of the city. From citizens and others who were interested he collected a sum of money which has enabled him to employ professional help in the repair and arrangement of the documents in the Town Hall in Wells and to make this grant to the Society towards the cost of the present volume.

The Council is anxious to be able to add to its series of Bishops' Registers; which extends from Bishop Drokensford (1309) to Bishop Stafford (1443). This last register was edited by the late Chancellor Holmes and was issued for the years 1915 and 1916. The Register of Bishop Beckington stands next in chronological order. It is a large register and covers an important period. The cost of transcription alone will be heavy, and at the moment lack of funds forbids taking the matter in hand. Reference to the balance sheet shows that very small funds will remain after providing for the cost of the present volume. It is probable, however, that the publication of so important a work as this Register would create a fresh interest in the work of S.R.S. and so in the end increase our membership and annual income.

Many of the societies engaged upon similar work to ours are finding it difficult to make both ends meet. Now that the arrears of publication, caused by the difficult years 1914 to 1918, have been made up, it is disappointing to find that we have not as yet got into easier financial circumstances. We can only do so by increasing our membership, and the surest way of achieving that will be by an extension of interest through those who are already members.

The Council is pleased to announce that it has received from Dom Maurice Bell of Downside Abbey the offer of an edition of the *Life of St. Wulfric*, which contains a great deal of information as to the village life of Somerset in the second quarter of the twelfth century. This will be issued as the volume for 1932.

Miss Bates-Harbin, Mr. T. B. Dilks and Dr. King have joined the Council of the Society, filling the vacancies caused

by death in the last three years.

Our thanks again are given to Mr. H. F. Hibberd of Lloyds Bank, Cheddar, for auditing the accounts for the year.
