

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INTRODUCTION

THE second section of the Register of Bishop Bekynton deals exclusively with matters connected with the election of certain ecclesiastical officers in the diocese of Bath and Wells. Inasmuch as the entries are not in strict chronological order, it must be regarded as an early transcript rather than as a contemporary record. The proceedings are in most cases set out at prodigious length, and many documents of a purely formal character are given in extenso, the episcopal notaries being evidently anxious to show that all the necessary formalities had been duly observed.¹

It will be seen that the elections were made sometimes by 'inspiration' or acclamation, sometimes by 'scrutiny' or ballot, and sometimes by delegation. A prior of Bath, a prior of Worspring, and a master of St. John's hospital at Wells, were appointed by Bishop Bekynton acting as delegate of the persons in whom the right of election was vested. The monks of Glastonbury delegated the choice of an abbot to a committee of seven of their number. A curious feature in several of the elections was the public announcement of the name of the person chosen some hours before his acceptance of the proffered honour.

Two monks of Bath, one of them an obstinate offender, two canons of Bruton, three brethren of the hospital at Bridgwater, two monks of Athelney, and four of Muchelney, are stated to have abandoned the religious life and gone away. Four or five canons of Keynsham who were absent in 1456 may also have been apostates.

It will be observed that many of the monks mentioned in this section of the Register bore surnames evidently derived from the towns or villages in which they had been respectively born.

Some of the information contained in it may be supplemented from other sources now accessible in print. For instance, while recording the procedure at the election of a dean of Wells, in 1446, the official Register says little about a remarkable controversy on the subject, which must have caused the bishop much anxiety. Most of the facts must be gleaned elsewhere.

All the trouble was due to the ambitious character of John de la Bere, a man of good family, who is described by a contemporary canon of Wells as 'very worldly and carnal' and almost ignorant of the rudiments of Latin. He was nevertheless a bachelor of canon law. After obtaining various lucrative appointments, civil and ecclesiastical, including the office of almoner of the royal household and canonries of Salisbury and Wells, this schemer had got from Eugenius IV. in January 1442, a bull reserving for him one or two benefices in the gift of the bishops or chapters of Winchester, Lincoln, or Exeter, and appointing three commissioners to give effect to it at the proper time.² In May 1443, the pope had substituted the bishop and the chapter of Wells for those of Winchester, and had furthermore issued a very elaborate and forcible bull specifically sanctioning the appointment of De la Bere to a deanery or other major dignity at Wells, Lincoln, or Exeter, and suspending any statutes or privileges of the church of Wells that might militate against his admission there.³ No vacancy, however, occurred in either of these three deaneries for some time.

John Forest, dean of Wells and archdeacon of Surrey, was so decrepit and blind as to need the appointment of a coadjutor, in the autumn of 1444, and he died on the 25th of March 1446.4 Four days later, the king wrote to Bekynton, reminding him of a promise to try to obtain the deanery of Wells for De la Bere

whensoever it should become vacant, and urging him to use his influence with the canons for this purpose. We do not know what Bekynton said in reply, but it seems clear that he did not support De la Bere's candidature. At any rate, he, on the 1st of April, gave formal licence to the canons to proceed to an election.

The principal members of the chapter accordingly assembled on the 8th to make the necessary arrangements. As the royal wishes, so definitely expressed, could not be altogether ignored, they resolved to temporise, postponing the date for the election of a new dean for more than four months, until the 22nd of August.²

Thereupon, the prior of St. Mary's, Southwark, one of the three papal mandatories, pronounced sentence of excommunication on all who had attended the meeting, that is to say the subdean, the precentor, the chancellor, the archdeacon, the succentor, the provost, six other canons, and two vicars choral, and he forbade them to hold an election. His envoy was, however, forcibly prevented from affixing notices to the doors of the cathedral church, and, according to one account, actually arrested.³ It would even appear that the celebration of divine service there was suspended 'for fere of execution' of the bull of provision.⁴

On the 30th of May, John de la Bere, still influential at Court, obtained royal pardon for himself and his counsellors for suing, accepting, and executing the pope's 'provision' to him of the deanery of Wells, and further letters patent were issued in his favour on the 16th of July.⁵

In the meanwhile, five canons residentiary of Wells had addressed a respectful but very spirited protest to the king, saying that De la Bere's suit to the pope was 'directly contrary to the custumes, lawes, liberties, inheritances, franchises and statutes' of the realm, as also to their own privileges, and claiming the right of free election. This was referred to the lords of the Council, and, on the 11th of July, the archbishop of Canterbury, lord chancellor, sitting with the bishops of Salisbury and Bath and Wells,

and the Marquess of Suffolk, delivered a gracious message from the king, to the effect that he was, and would continue to be. the 'protectour and defendour of the churche of Welles,' its rights, customs, liberties, and franchises, and that the canons might proceed to elect a dean, any 'provision' made by the pope notwithstanding.¹ It is worthy of remark that the three prelates who thus encouraged the canons to disregard the authority of the Roman pontiff owed their own positions to papal bulls

The canons accordingly met on the appointed day, the 22nd of August, and, after mass in the chapel of Our Lady by the cloister, adjourned to the chapter-house. Twenty-eight of them were present in person, and eleven were represented by their attorneys. Eleven others who showed their prudence by ignoring the summonses were pronounced contumacious, De la Bere being one of them. The abbot of Bec and another canon were not in England. In the presence of four notaries-public and four vicars choral, the canons proceeded to elect a dean. Their unanimous choice fell upon Nicholas Carent, a licentiate in civil law, who had been prebendary of Combe XV, for about seven years. He is described as a man of 'noble,' that is to say gentle, birth, being a son of William Carent of Toomer, a prominent landowner in Somerset. More important was the fact that he was secretary to Queen Margaret.²
A full account of the election was communicated to the bishop

at Wookey, and seven witnesses appeared before him there to testify to Carent's character and fitness. The final stage was fixed for the 27th, and, as no objector ventured to appear, the bishop then confirmed the election. Carent made his profession of canonical obedience, and an order was issued for his installation in the choir of the cathedral church.

Some six months later, Bekynton, having been charged with disregarding the 'provision' of De la Bere to the deanery of Wells, thought fit to issue a formal defence of his own conduct in the matter. While we are bound to accept his statement that no

bull of Eugenius IV. 'providing' De la Bere to the deanery had so far been brought to his notice, it is very difficult to believe that he was altogether unaware of the facts of the case. A little later, he went out of his way to commend the courage of the canons of Wells in disregarding the prayers and the threats of most powerful persons and maintaining their right of free election.

De la Bere had, in the previous July (1446), obtained another bull more specifically 'providing' him to the deanery of Wells, but it can hardly have reached England before the election. After this, Eugenius IV. in one of the later months of his pontificate, appointed one of his chaplains to hear the suits which De la Bere had brought against the bishop of Bath and Wells, the chapter of Wells, and Nicholas Carent, as also the appeals of the chapter. Sentences of excommunication are stated to have been pronounced against the chapter and Carent.³ The pope furthermore, in November 1446, issued peremptory orders to Carent to give up possession of the deanery and all fruits received, and to the subdean and chapter to receive De la Bere as their dean, within six days of the delivery of the bull, under pain of suspension, excommunication, deprivation, and interdict.⁴

We are not told whether De la Bere ventured to publish these latest bulls in England. Having, it is said, spent no less than 1430 marks in his endeavour to obtain the deanery of Wells, he eventually agreed with Carent to avoid all further expense by referring the questions at issue to the arbitration of Queen Margaret. Her decision in favour of her own secretary was virtually confirmed by the new pope, Nicholas V., in July 1447.⁵ Nevertheless, De la Bere was styled dean of Wells in a bull 'providing' him to the bishopric of St. Davids, in September.⁶

On hearing of the death of William Southbroke, Benedictine prior of Bath, in June 1447, Bishop Bekynton lost no time in

issuing to the sub-prior and convent a licence to elect a new prior. He must have had some reason to fear that they would be sub-jected to external pressure, for, a week later, he wrote to them in very forcible language, adjuring them to disregard all prayers or threats of the most powerful persons. The recipients seem to have been somewhat perplexed and nervous, for, when they met in the chapter-house, on the 5th of July, they unanimously resolved to delegate their right of election to the bishop himself. Nothing further was done in the matter until the 16th of September, when Bekynton, being at Bath, nominated Thomas Lacok, prior of the cell at Dunster, to the vacant office. The formalities were concluded nine days later.¹

The Register states that John Henton was elected prior of Bruton by 'inspiration', and duly confirmed as such, in 1448.² Elsewhere we learn that, some years later, he conceived an idea that his election might be considered simoniacal because his father had, without his knowledge, given some money to two 'noblemen' (or gentlemen) to intervene in his favour. On his petition to the pope, he was, in 1455, declared free from blame in the matter, and confirmed in his position as prior.³ His overzealous father, John Henton, was, it may be observed, a very notable benefactor to the church of Bruton.⁴

The confirmation of the election of a master of the hospital of St. John the Baptist at Bridgwater by the bishop's commissary, in 1449, is entered briefly.⁵

Copies of several documents relating to the elections of masters of the hospital of St. John the Baptist at Bath, before the period of Bekynton's episcopate, have found their way into the second section of his register. Two later entries on the same subject occur in the first section.⁶

It has been seen in the first section of the Register that John Stokys, the bishop's commissary, delivered a series of injunctions

for the reform of abuses in the abbey of Keynsham on the 5th of December, 1455.1 Walter Bekynsfeld, the abbot, tendered his resignation on the following day, and it was at once accepted without demur, having perhaps been pre-arranged. Ten days later, the duke of Buckingham, as patron of the abbey, gave the necessary licence for an election, and fifteen of the canons assembled in the chapter-house on the 9th of January following, to give effect to it. On the advice of their late abbot, they there unanimously chose Thomas Tyler, the prior, to be his successor. Four or five canons were absent for some reason unexplained. episcopal confirmation was not granted for more than a month; and the abbot-elect had to supplement the usual oath of canonical obedience to the bishop by an oath to observe the injunctions recently issued by his commissary.² Some months later, Walter Bekynsfeld was given a retiring pension of 10l. a year, with an allowance of food and drink equal to that of two of his fellowcanons.3

The Register gives the names of forty-eight monks who assembled in the chapter-house at Glastonbury, on the 7th of May, 1456, for the election of an abbot, in succession to Nicholas Frome, deceased, and of a committee of seven to whom they then delegated their powers. It tells us that Walter More, the sacristan, was unanimously chosen, that his election was confirmed in London by the commissary of the bishop of Bath and Wells, and that, on the last day of the month, after taking the usual oath of obedience, he received benediction and was given a pastoral staff by Bekynton himself in the palace at Wells.⁴

The lengthy account of these proceedings has been printed in full, in Latin, in Hearne's edition of *Adam of Domerham* (vol. i. pp. 123-83).

The death of Walter More within six months of his election as abbot of Glastonbury necessitated another election there, in November 1456. On this occasion, some difficulties were experienced. In the first instance, the prior and convent appointed two

monks to nominate seven others to act with them in electing an abbot, but the two so appointed failed to agree in the choice of their colleagues. After the withdrawal of a scheme for proceeding by way of scrutiny, the prior and convent empowered a committee of seven to represent them, but these nominees refused to act. Lastly, three others were appointed to collect the votes of all the brethren, with the result that forty-seven votes were found to have been cast in favour of John Selwood, the receiver, and one, Selwood's, in favour of Robert Newton. Episcopal confirmation followed, on the last day of the month.

The Register records the election of Thomas Thornbury as prior of Barlinch by the unanimous voice of the seven canons, and the confirmation of it by the bishop, in 1457.²

There was a contest for the mastership of the hospital of St. John the Baptist at Bridgwater, in 1457. John Holford, one of the two candidates, unable to vote for himself, and unwilling to support his opponent, Thomas Ile, master of the hospital of St. John the Baptist at Wells, but formerly professed at Bridgwater, gave a futile vote for Roger Cory, who had just resigned the office. Of the eight other brethren, five, including Cory, voted for Holford, and three for Ile. The former was accordingly elected, and he was in due course confirmed as master by the bishop.³

Robert Hylle, elected abbot of Athelney by acclamation, on the death of John Pederton, in 1458, was, before confirmation by the bishop, made to swear that he would observe the injunctions recently issued for the reform of abuses in that house. He had been in priest's orders little more than two years.

After the death of William Lusche, prior of Worspring, in 1458, the six canons decided, for some reason not stated, to renounce their right of electing his successor in favour of the bishop of the diocese. Bekynton made choice of John Gurman

on the 8th of April and sent his commissary to ratify the proceedings six days later.¹

Fourteen monks of Muchelney took part in the election of an abbot, in 1463, in succession to John Cherde. Thomas Pipe, their prior, was then chosen by acclamation.²

When Thomas Ile, master of the hospital of St. John the Baptist at Wells, resigned his office, in 1462, he and the other four brethren empowered the bishop to appoint a new master, and he made choice of a stranger, John Valens, titular bishop of Tenos, an Augustinian canon, who had been acting as Bekynton's suffragan since 1459.

The third section of the Register of Bishop Bekynton enumerates the persons who were ordained, as acolytes, sub-deacons, deacons, or priests, by him, by James Blakedon, bishop successively of Achonry and Bangor, or by John Valens, titular bishop of Tenos, acting on his behalf. On one occasion, he and the former of these suffragans were holding simultaneous ordinations at different places.³

The normal dates for ordinations were the Saturdays of the four Ember seasons, but ordinations were often held at other times. We may even notice the holding of ordinations on two successive days, for the convenience of the candidates.⁴

Under Bekynton's regime, persons were sometimes admitted to the ministry in spacious buildings such as the cathedral churches of Wells and Bath and the parochial churches of St. Cuthbert at Wells and St. Mary Magdalen at Taunton. Few spectators can, however, have attended when the service was performed in such places as a chapel by the cloister at Wells, in the chapel of the palace, in the 'new oratory' there, in the chapels of the episcopal manors at Wookey and Banwell, and the chapel of Our Lady by the cloister of Taunton Priory.

By licence of the bishop of Winchester, Bekynton held several ordinations in the chapel of the manor of Dogmersfield. On a few occasions, the candidates had to go to his inn in the western suburb of London.

Most of the ordinands were of course natives of the county of Somerset, and many of them figure in the first section of the Register. In view of the great number of persons ordained during Bekynton's episcopate, the entries relating to them have been considerably curtailed in the present volume. It has not been considered necessary to show here that candidates from other parts of the country brought with them 'letters dimissory' from the bishops of the diocese in which they had respectively been born, or in which they had been resident for a considerable time. It will be seen, however, that members of some religious orders and Fellows of New College and All Souls College, Oxford, enjoyed the right of being ordained by any bishop of their own choice.²

The master and brethren of the little hospital of St. John at Wells seem to have been willing to give 'titles' to almost any candidates for ordination, and those of the hospital at Bridgwater were scarcely less obliging in this respect.

From 1459 onwards, the register gives the names of the episcopal officers by whom the candidates for ordination were examined.

Mention has been already made of the fact that many incumbents did not ordinarily reside in their respective parishes. The Register shows furthermore that many clerks were instituted to benefices with cure of souls before admission to holy orders. The rectories of Alford, Babcary, Brompton Ralph, Closworth, High Ham, Hinton St. George, Hornblotton, Maperton, Norton under Hamdon, Podimore Milton, Poyntington, Street, Swainswick, Treborough, and Whitestaunton were for varying periods during Bekynton's episcopate in the possession of parsons incapable of celebrating mass or of giving absolution to penitents. The bishop himself was responsible for the collation of Henry Abyngdon, Thomas Purviour, Thomas Hope, and Robert Purviour, to

canonries of Wells when they were not even in subdeacon's orders.¹

The list of ordinations is followed by transcripts of two letters in English obviously composed by Bekynton himself. These would presumably have been entered in the first section of the Register if the compiler had known their respective dates.

It is difficult to account for the entry in this Register of an elaborate document about a visitation of Glastonbury Abbey by Archbishop Arundel more than thirty years before Bekynton's elevation to the episcopate. He may possibly have had occasion to refer to it in connexion with his own visitation of the abbey in 1445. The last folio of the Register got so damaged before the volume was bound that the writing on it is now illegible. The document is, however, entered in the archbishop's own register at Lambeth Palace, and the version of it given below in English has been completed therefrom.

ELECTIONS

DURING THE BISHOP'S EPISCOPATE.

1636. Commission to Master John Bernard, canon of Wells, 1445. to confirm, or to disallow, the election by the subprior and convent of Staverdale of Brother William Poyntyngton, canon of Staverdale, to be prior in the room of Brother John Penne. deceased; and, if he think fit to confirm the election, to induct and install the new prior, to receive his canonical obedience, and to make good any defects found in his election. The bishop's inn at London, 5 November, 1445.

1637. Process of confirmation of the election of Master Nicholas Carent as dean of Wells: an election by the form of inspiration.

Notarial instrument setting forth the said process as follows:— 1446.

On 23 August, 1446, Master John Bernard, succentor and residentiary canon of Wells, proctor of John Raynold, subdean, and the chapter of Wells, appeared before the bishop sitting judicially in the chapel in Woky manor, exhibited his letters of procuration of the same date (recited), notified the bishop of the election by the subdean and chapter of Master Nicholas Carent, licentiate in laws, canon and prebendary of Wells, to be dean in the room of Sir John Forest, deceased, and prayed the bishop to confirm the same. Thereupon the bishop appointed the following Saturday, 27 August, for the process of confirming, or of disallowing, the election, and decreed that all opponents thereof should be cited to appear on that day. Present, Master William Langton, Master Benet ap Howell, and John Machon, clerks, notaries-public, of the dioceses of York, Llandaff and Worcester,

On the following day, the said proctor produced the deanelect in person and presented him to the bishop, praying his

1446. patronal assent to the election, which the bishop granted. Witnesses as above.

On Saturday, 27 August, the subdean and chapter, by their said proctor, and the dean-elect in person, appeared before the bishop in the same chapel, and the proctor produced and handed in the decree made on the said election, signed and subscribed by Master Thomas Been, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, and Master Benet ap Howell, of the diocese of Llandaff, notariespublic, testifying that, on the death of the late dean on 25 March, 1446, the subdean and chapter, after obtaining the bishop's licence to elect a successor, met in the chapter-house on 9 April and fixed the following 22 August as the date of the election, ordering all absent canons to be summoned to attend on that day; that on this latter date, after celebrating mass in the chapel of the Virgin Mary by the cloister and chanting the hymn Veni Creator, they repaired to the chapter-house, elected Master William Langton, Master Thomas Been, Master John Tregodek, and Master Benet ap Howell, notaries-public, and Sir John Pedewell, Sir John Bekyngton, Sir Robert Catour and Sir Thomas Chiew, perpetual vicars of the cathedral, to be witnesses of the election, verified that all the canons had been duly cited to be present, and caused their names to be cried aloud at the south and north doors of the cathedral and the door of the chapter-house, whereupon the following were found to be present in person, to wit John Raynold, subdean, William Stevenes, precentor, Thomas Bubwith, archdeacon of Wells, John Storthwait, chancellor, John Bernard, succentor, Richard Hoore, provost, Stephen Morpath, William Byconyll, Nicholas Upton, John Shelford, Brother John Pederton, abbot of Athelney, John Cherd, abbot of Muchelney, John Lane, John Wansford, William Crowton, John Stopyngton, John de Opizis, Walter Fold, Richard Cordon, John Arnold, John Burdett, Gilbert Kemer, Nicholas Carent, Thomas Aysshdale, William Fulford, John Pederton, John Trevenaunt and John Cowngge, canons and prebendaries, the following were found to be present by their attorneys, to wit Andrew Holes by Master John Reynold, Peter Stucle, treasurer, and Thomas Chicleley by Master John Storthwaite, Robert Parfitt, Nicholas Sturgeon, John Birkhede,

John Stevenes and Robert Aysscogh by Master William Byconyll, 1446. William Hoper and William Skelton by Master John Bernard, and Walter Shiryngton by Master Richard Hoor, and the following were found to be absent and were pronounced contumacious. to wit Richard Leyot, John Mackworth, Fulk Bernyngeham, John Sparhauke, Thomas Circestre, William Toly, Vincent Clement, Lewis Reede, Richard Pettworth, John Delabere and John Arundell; that thereupon those present, forming a chapter. decided to proceed in the election without waiting for the aforesaid absentees, or for the abbot of Bec Hellouin and Master William Greye, canons and prebendaries, who were absent from the realm, and, after Master John Storthwait, chancellor, had admonished all suspended, excommunicated and interdicted persons to withdraw from the chapter-house, and after the constitution Quia propter 1 had been read and the forms thereof declared by the chancellor, straightway the whole chapter, without holding any discussion as to the person to be elected, there and then, by the inspiration of the Holy Ghost, as they firmly believe, unanimously and with one voice, (with the exception of Master Nicholas Carent himself), elected Master Nicholas Carent, licentiate in laws, canon and prebendary of Wells, a man well qualified by birth, age, orders, character and learning, to be their dean, and then, chanting the Te Deum, bore him in procession to the high altar, and caused his election to be announced to the multitude by Master Richard Cordon, doctor of laws, canon of Wells, and to be notified to the elect himself by Master John Storthwait, chancellor, and Master John Bernard, succentor; and that a little before dusk on the same day the dean-elect assented to his election: and praying the bishop to confirm the election and do what belongs to his pastoral office in that behalf.

After the said decree had been read, Master John Bernard, proctor, produced and delivered to the bishop a certificate by John Combe, chaplain, under the seal of the official of the archdeacon of Wells, dated at Wells, 26 August, testifying that the bishop's mandate for the citation of all opponents of the election had been duly carried out, but that no opponents had appeared.

1446. When this had been read, and after Thomas Warreyn, literate, the bishop's apparitor-general, had repeatedly made proclamation, first before the bishop on his judgement seat and then at the doors of the chapel, citing opponents to appear, but with no result, the bishop precluded all opponents from making any further allegations or objections, and decreed that the business of confirming, or disallowing, the election should proceed.

Thereupon Master John Bernard, proctor, handed in a petition and certain articles extracted from the decree of election, and offered to prove the same, praying the bishop, on receipt of such proof, to declare the election canonical. (The articles are sixteen in number, and give seriatim the various stages of the election as set out in the decree of election.) In proof of these articles the proctor produced seven documents:—(1) the petition of the subdean and chapter for licence to elect, dated 28 March; (2) the bishop's licence to elect, dated at Woky, I April; (3) the citation of the canons to attend the election, dated o April: (4) the letter authorising Master John Storthwait to admonish all suspended, excommunicated and interdicted persons to withdraw, dated 22 August; (5) the letter authorising Master Richard Cordon to announce the election to the people, dated 22 August; (6) the letter authorising Master John Storthwait and Master John Bernard to request the dean-elect to give his assent to the election, dated 22 August; and (7) the bishop's notification of his patronal assent to the election, dated 24 August. The proctor also produced seven witnesses to prove the articles, to wit Alexander Hody, esquire, John Godewyn, gentleman, Thomas Lyte, gentleman, and Sir John Pedewell, Sir John Bekyngton, Sir Thomas Chiewe, and Sir John Haydour, priests, vicars in Wells cathedral. The testimony of these witnesses was as follows:—

Alexander Hody, esquire, aged forty-three years and more, could testify only by public report as to the proceedings leading up to the election. As to the birth and age of Master Nicholas Carent he testified that since he came to years of discretion he had well known William Carent and Alice his wife, then of Tamer in the county of Somerset, who to his knowledge produced between them in true marriage the said Master Nicholas about

thirty-two years ago. He also testified as to the general qualifica- 1446. tions of Master Nicholas.

John Godewyn, gentleman, of Wells, aged sixty years and

more, agreed in all respects with the foregoing.

Thomas Lyte, gentleman, of Littescary, aged thirty-six years and more, agreed generally with the first witness, stating that Master Nicholas was born in lawful marriage of free and 'noble' parents.

Sir John Pedewell, aged forty-four years, testified specifically as to the proceedings leading up to and following the election, and generally as to the qualifications of Master Nicholas.

Sir John Bekyngton, aged fifty-four years, agreed with the

last witness.

Sir Thomas Chiewe, aged thirty-four years, and Sir John

Haydour, aged forty years, also agreed.

Thereupon, after the whole process of the election had been diligently scrutinised, and after prolonged discussion as to the merits of the election between Master Richard Cordon, doctor of laws, as defender thereof, and the bishop and his assessors learned in the law, the bishop found that the election had been duly and lawfully celebrated in all respects, and accordingly confirmed the same, committed the rule and administration of the spiritualities and temporalities of the deanery to Master Nicholas, and decreed that he should be inducted and installed according to custom. Thereupon the dean-elect took the oath of canonical obedience, and swore to reside continually and in person on his deanery, and to support the charges incumbent thereon; and the bishop admitted him to a kiss, and gave orders for his induction and installation.

The following were present at all the above acts and proceedings, to wit Master William Langton, notary-public, Master John Raynold and Master William Fulford, canons of Wells, John Stokys, Robert Tarry, Thomas Bromehale and William North, bachelors in both laws, Benet ap Howell, John Machon and Thomas Been, notaries-public, of the dioceses of Bath and Wells, York, Salisbury, Llandaff and Worcester, and many others.

Notarial subscription by William Langton, clerk of the diocese of York, notary-public, scribe of the bishop and of the acts of the said election or the confirmation thereof

1638. Protest by the bishop,—in view of malicious reports I447. by his enemies that he has confirmed the election of Master Nicholas Carent as dean of Wells in contravention of a provision of the said deanery made by Pope Eugenius IV. to Master John Delaber alias Dalberd, the king's grand almoner,—that he has always been, as he will always be, an obedient son of the said pope and his predecessors, that until this day no apostolic grace, provision, or rescript touching the deanery of Wells has ever been exhibited, presented, or intimated to him on behalf of the said Master John, and that whatever he did in the matter of the confirmation of the election of Master Nicholas was done lawfully and in ignorance of any apostolic provision or other special right to the contrary, after the requisite citations and proclamations had been made and no opponent of the election had appeared.

The above protest was read and made by the bishop in his lower chamber in his inn at London on 17 March, 1446[-7], in the presence of Master Vincent Clement, S.T.P., canon of Wells, Master John Stopyndon, archdeacon of Dorchester in the church of Salisbury, Master Drew (*Droco*) Malefurinte (*sic*), canon of Salisbury, Master Robert Stillyngton, canon of St. Davids, and John Machon and William Langton, notaries-public.

1639. Election of Brother Thomas Lacok as prior of Bath; an election by the form of delegation.

Petition to the bishop from the subprior and chapter of Bath for licence to elect a prior in the room of Brother William Southbroke, deceased. 12 June, 1447.

The above petition was presented to the bishop in his inn at London on 16 June, 1447, by Brother William Saltford, in the presence of Master John Moreton, Master Thomas Bromehale, Sir John Trevenant, and William Langton, notary-public.

Thereupon the bishop issued the following three letters:—

- (1) A licence for the subprior and convent to elect a prior. The bishop's inn at London, 16 June, 1447.
 - (2) A commission to Master William Langton, the bishop's

registrar, to be guardian of the priory during the present voidance. 1447. Date as above.

(3) A letter to the chapter of Bath. The bishop's regret at the death of the late prior is in no small measure mitigated by the knowledge that they still have among them many upright and capable men like the deceased. In electing the next prior he exhorts them to show themselves upright and religious men fearing God rather than man, and with pure minds, sincere judgement and a clear consciousness of their freedom of election to choose a suitable prior from among themselves, acting as it were suddenly by the inspiration of the Holy Ghost. For it is not right that men of religion should give way to the prayers or threats of the powerful in such a sacred matter, or put gain, or the fear or favour of the people, before the fear and will of God. If these considerations do not move them, let them at any rate take courage from the example of the canons of the sister church of Wells, who, during the recent election of a dean, refused to be moved from the straight path by the prayers or threats of even the most powerful persons, and bravely and honourably maintained the liberty of the church and their liberty of election, choosing a dean by their own free discretion and absolute judgement. The bishop entreats the chapter of Bath to do likewise. London, 23 June.

On 10 July, Brother Richard Whalley and Brother John Lacok, monks of Bath, proctors of the subprior and convent, appeared before the bishop in his inn at London and presented to him the following instrument:-

Notification to the bishop by William Hampton, subprior, and the chapter or convent of Bath, that on the death of William Southbroke, the late prior, on 7 June, 1447, and after the bishop's licence to elect a successor had been obtained, the following monks and brethren of Bath cathedral, to wit the subprior, Stephen Glastenbury, Robert Bach, precentor, Robert Chiewe, third prior, John Lynde, William Saltford, sacristan, cellarer, keeper of the chapel of the Blessed Virgin, and hosteler, John Wydecombe, William Pensford, sub-sacristan and fourth prior, Richard Whityng, chamberlain, Richard Walleigh, kitchen steward (coquinarius), John Lacok, infirmarer, pittancer, and 1447. keeper of the refectory, William Welles, John Saresbury, subalmoner, John Keynesham, Thomas Bath, Robert Butteller, Thomas Bradford, Peter Twiverton and John Norton, assembled in the chapter-house on 24 June and fixed Wednesday after SS. Peter and Paul as the day for celebrating the election, ordering all the absent brethren within the realm to be cited to be present on that day; that on the said Wednesday, to wit 5 July. after mass in the choir, they assembled in the chapter-house, where, after chanting the hymn Veni Creator and verifying the licence to elect and the citation of all the monks, they caused the names of all those cited to be cried aloud at the door of the chapter-house and then repeatedly in the chapter-house itself, whereupon William Hampton, subprior, and the other monks and brethren mentioned above, William Bristowe, who was studying in the university of Oxford when the date of election was fixed, Thomas Lacok, prior or warden of the cell of Dunster, and John Beryngton, William Bouer and Richard Hoper, sojourners in the said cell, were found to be present in person, and John Norton, the elder, also a sojourner there, was present by John Beryngton, his proctor, there being no other persons who ought to have a voice in the election, since Robert Vyse and John Appleby, monks professed in the said church, were disqualified both by failure to answer the general citation and because long ago they left the church and by their apostasy excluded themselves from any right to take part in the election; that thereupon those present decided to proceed in the election without waiting for the said absentees, and, after the customary admonitions had been made on their behalf by John Lacok, and after the constitution Quia propter had been read, decided unanimously to proceed by the form of delegation (compromissi). and named the bishop as their delegate (compromissarium), granting to him, for this turn only, full power to elect one of themselves as prior. Witnesses, Master John Sparhauke, bachelor in laws, Sir Roger Byrde, chaplain, and others [5 July, 1447]. Subscriptions by William Langton, clerk, of the diocese of York, and Benet ap Howell, clerk, of the diocese of Llandaff, notariespublic.

On 16 September, the bishop, as delegate, celebrated the

election in the chapter-house of Bath in the presence of the 1447. subprior and convent, and chose the above-named Thomas Lacok to be prior; and after the prior-elect had consented to his election, Brother John Lacok, monk of the said church, as proctor of the subprior and convent, presented the elect to the bishop in the chamber called the prior's chamber, whereupon the bishop imparted his patronal consent and favour, and then fixed Monday after St. Matthew next, to wit 25 September, as the day for proceeding in the matter of the election in the chapel in Banwell manor. On the same day, letters issued to Thomas Warreyn, the bishop's apparitor-general, ordering him to cite all opponents of the election to be present at the said day and place.

On Monday, 25 September, the said John Lacok, proctor, appeared before the bishop sitting judicially in the said chapel, deposited his letters of procuration, presented the prior-elect to the bishop, and handed in the decree of election, as follows:—

Decree of election, reciting the appointment of the bishop as delegate, the publication of the election by the bishop, and the assent of the prior-elect. Subscriptions of William North, clerk, of the diocese of Salisbury, and William Langton, clerk, of the diocese of York, notaries-public.

After the above decree had been read, as well as a certificate by Thomas Warreyn testifying that all objectors had been cited to appear, the bishop caused further proclamations of citation to be made and then precluded all objectors from propounding objections in future. Thereupon Brother John Lacok handed in a petition and certain articles extracted from the decree of election, and produced divers muniments and witnesses to prove the same; and after the muniments and the depositions of the witnesses had been published, and copies thereof had been decreed to all concerned, the bishop, after closely scrutinising the whole process of the election, declared the election canonical and pronounced sentence of confirmation (recited). The priorelect then took the oath of canonical obedience (recited).

On the same day, the bishop ordered Master John Bernard, official of the consistory of Wells, to induct and install the priorelect and confirmed; and ordered the subprior and convent to obey him.

The following were present at all the above proceedings on 25 September, to wit Master John Bernard, Master John Moreton and Master Thomas Bromehale, canons of Wells, Master William North, Master Walter Roche, Master John Stokys, and Master John Sparhauke, bachelors in both laws, and many others, as well as William Langton, the bishop's registrar.

Henton as prior of Bruton: an election by the form of inspiration.

On 10 October, 1448, in the chapel in Woky manor, Brother Robert Cammel, canon of Bruton and proctor of the subprior and convent thereof, appeared before the bishop sitting there judicially, deposited his letters of procuration, presented the prior-elect to the bishop, and produced a certificate of Thomas Warreyn, apparitor-general, under the seal of the official of the archdeacon of Wells, witnessing that the necessary citations of

opponents of the election had been duly made, and the following

decree of election:—

Decree of election by Robert Goldesmyth, subprior, and the convent of Bruton, subscribed by William Langton, clerk, of the diocese of York, notary-public, testifying that, on the death of Brother Richard Glastenbury, the late prior, on 24 September last, and after his burial on 26 September, the subprior and the following canons, to wit Robert Cammell, John Dygon, infirmarer, John Penford, John Henton, sacristan, third prior and chamberlain, Robert Baryngton, James Wyke, precentor and refectorer, Thomas Walter, John Olyver, cellarer, John Stowell, succentor, John Sharp, subcellarer, John Stokton, Thomas Vax and Thomas Kyngesdon, assembled in the chapterhouse on Tuesday, I October, and fixed the following Friday, 4 October, as the date of the election, there being no other persons with claims to a voice in the election except Brother John Lamyet and Brother John Pawle, both of whom had long ago left the priory and by their apostasy excluded themselves from any right to take part in the election; that on the said 4 October, after mass of the Holy Ghost in the choir, they assembled in the chapter-house, where, after the chanting of the hymn Veni Creator and the withdrawal of all persons except those having

a voice in the election and certain other persons retained as 1448. necessary in the act of election, and after Robert Cammell had admonished all suspended, excommunicated and interdicted persons to withdraw from the chapter-house, and after Master John Stokys, bachelor in both laws, had read the constitution Ouia propter and declared the forms thereof, straightway the subprior and convent, without any discussion as to the person to be elected, there and then, by divine grace from above and the inspiration of the Holy Ghost, as they firmly believe, unanimously and with one voice assumed and elected John Henton, their fellow-canon, a man well qualified by birth, age, orders, character and learning, to be their prior, and then, chanting the Te Deum, bore him in procession to the high altar, and caused his election to be published to the multitude in the church by the said Robert Cammell, and to be notified to the prior-elect by the same Robert and John Dygon in a lower chamber in the priory which had been built by the prior-elect and was commonly called his chamber; and that, on the same day, the prior-elect assented to his election: and praying the bishop to confirm the election and do what belongs to his pastoral office in that behalf.

Then the said Robert Cammell exhibited and handed to the bishop letters (recited) dated 6 October, 1448, whereby James Luterell, esquire, lord of Dunster and founder and patron of the priory, assented to the election.

After the above-mentioned certificate, decree of election and notification of assent had been read, and after proclamation had been made citing all objectors to appear, the bishop precluded all further objections and decreed that the business of the election should proceed. Thereupon the said Robert Cammell handed in a summary article or petition and produced divers muniments and witnesses to prove the same; and after the muniments and the depositions of the witnesses had been published, and copies thereof had been decreed to all concerned, the bishop, after closely scrutinising the whole process of the election, proceeded to confirm the same (sentence of confirmation recited). Then the prior-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience (recited), and the bishop issued letters (recited) notifying the king of his confirmation of the election.

Subsequently, on 30 October at Dogmersfeld, the bishop 1448. issued letters ordering the archdeacon of Wells or his official to induct and install the prior-elect, and the subprior and convent to obey him.1

1641. Confirmation of the election of Roger Cory as master of the hospital of St. John the Baptist, Bruggewater.

On 4 November, 1449, in the parish church of Bruggewater, 1449. Master John Bernard, precentor of Wells, the bishop's commissary in this behalf, after hearing and examining the merits and circumstances of the election of Roger Cory, brother of the hospital of St. John the Baptist, Bruggewater, as master thereof, found that the election had been duly and canonically celebrated, and pronounced sentence of confirmation accordingly (recited).

Thereupon the master-elect took the oath of canonical obedience in the presence of Master John Stokes, canon of Wells, Master Walter Roche, Master Richard Towker, Master John Towker, son of the said Richard, Master William North, clerk, of the diocese of Salisbury, notary-public, and many others. Afterwards he received from the said commissary letters of confirmation of his election, and letters of induction and installation directed to the archdeacon of Taunton or his official.

Exemplification and authentication by the official of 1402. the peculiar jurisdiction of Poterne, Devys' and Marleborugh of the following documents; made in the presence of Richard Cars alias Cosham, notary-public, Sir John Pere, vicar of Cosham, and Sir John Jackes, chaplain, of the diocese of Salisbury, in the dwelling-house of the said vicar of Cosham, 4 March, 1402[-3].

(a) Licence by Ralph, bishop of Bath and Wells, for the brethren of the hospital of St. John the Baptist, Bath, of which the bishop is founder and patron, to proceed to the election of a master in the room of John Asshewike, deceased. Wyvelescombe manor, 5 March, 1398[-9].

(b) Confirmation by the same of the election of John Shaftesbury, priest, brother of the hospital, as master. Wyvelescombe manor, 29 March, 1309.

hospital, to induct the new master. Date as above.

(d) Certificate by Thomas Sodbury of the induction of the new master on 5 April. Sealed with the seal of the deanery of Bath on 8 April, 1399.

1642A, Documents exhibited before the bishop at Woky on 1451. 21 September, 1451, by Brother Richard Williams of the hospital of St. John the Baptist, Bath, as proctor of the master thereof:—

(a) Commitment by John, bishop of Bath and Wells, to Peter 1428. Byryman, chaplain, of the guardianship of the said hospital, vacant by the resignation of John Shaftesbury, the last master or warden thereof, pending a decision between the bishop and the prior of Bath as to the right of patronage. Dogmersfeld, 28 May, 1428.

(b) Commitment by William Southbroke, prior of Bath, to Peter Byryman, priest, brother of the said hospital, of the cure, rule and administration thereof, which is void and belongs to the prior's disposition or provision; and appointment of him as

master or warden. Bath, 28 September, 1428.

(c) Certificate by Brother William Saltford, monk of the 1429. cathedral church of Bath, that he has inducted Peter Byryman as master of the said hospital in pursuance of a commission from the prior of Bath to him and William Cary, his fellow-monk, dated at Bath, 28 September, 1428. Sealed with the seal of the deanery of Bath, 27 January, 1428[-9].

1643. Process of the election of Thomas Tyler as abbot of Keynesham and of the confirmation thereof.

On 16 February, 1455[-6], Master Thomas Merssh, bachelor 1456. in both laws, proctor of William Goodman, subprior, and the convent of Keynesham, appeared before the bishop sitting judicially in the chapel in Woky manor, and handed in his letter of procuration (recited), dated 15 January, 1455[-6].

After this had been read, the said proctor presented to the bishop Sir Thomas Tyler, the abbot-elect, and then handed in the decree of election and a certificate of the execution of the

bishop's order as to citation, as follows:-

(1) Decree of election by the subprior and convent, dated 6 February, 1455[-6], subscribed by John Touker, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notary-public, testifying that, on the resignation of Sir Walter Bekynsfeld, the late abbot, and after licence to elect a new abbot had been obtained from Humphrey, duke of Bukingham, founder and patron of the monastery. the following canons of the abbey, to wit Thomas Tyler, prior, William Goodman, subprior, Walter Bekynsfeld, John Yate, William Norton, William West, hosteler, William Rompney, keeper of the chapel of St. Anne, John Spaldyng, precentor, John Ledbury, sacristan, John Coterell, almoner, Robert Row, sartarius, Roger Hobbys, infirmarer, William Wodeward, refectorer, Thomas Montagu and John Graunt, assembled in the chapter-house on Saturday, 3 January, 1455[-6], and debated the date of the election; that at last Thomas Tyler, prior, with the assent of the convent, fixed the following Friday, o January, and decreed that William Chiew and all the other absent canons should be cited to attend on that day; that thereupon the said prior and convent caused Nicholas Poye, John Kyngton, Richard Marchal and the said William Chiew, absent canons. to be publicly cited in the stalls of the choir and at the door of the chapter-house by John Spaldyng, their fellow-canon; that on the following Friday, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost in the choir, those present on the former occasion assembled in the chapter-house, where the word of God was publicly propounded by Master John Pope, S.T.P., the hymn Veni Creator was sung, and the cause of their assembling was declared by Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws; that thereupon the names of the canons were read, after which the said Master Hugh caused John Lovekok, Nicholas Poye, John Kyngton, Richard Marchall and William Chiew, who were not present. to be summoned by proclamation at the door of the chapterhouse, and on their non-appearance decreed that the election should proceed; that thereupon the licence to elect was read and the prior publicly admonished all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons, as well as all others who ought not to be present, to withdraw, after which no one remained beyond those who were present on the first occasion, except the

following, to wit Master Hugh Sugar to direct the convent and 1456. inform them as to the ways of election, John Touker to reduce the acts of the election to writing and draw up the necessary instruments, and Master John Pope, Sir Richard Whitwode, perpetual vicar of the parish church of Keynesham, John Dygon, Robert Hurst and Nicholas Collys, clerks, to bear witness to what should be done at the election; that thereupon, after the chapter Quia propter had been read and expounded by Master Hugh Sugar, and the several ways and forms described therein had been declared, straightway the said Walter Bekynsfeld, without any intervening discussion as to the person to be elected, nominated as abbot Thomas Tyler, the prior, a man well qualified by birth, age, orders, character and learning, whereupon, without any interval, the remainder of the canons then present unani-mously and, as they firmly believe, by the inspiration of the Holy Ghost, elected the said Thomas as abbot and empowered William Goodman, the subprior, to elect him in common in the name of the whole convent, which the said subprior did; that thereupon those present, chanting the Te Deum, bore the abbotelect to the high altar, and caused his election to be announced to clergy and people by the subprior, and then, returning to the chapter-house, appointed John Ledbury and John Coterell as their proctors to intimate to the abbot-elect his election, and obtain his assent thereto; and that about the twelfth hour of the day the said proctors repaired to the abbot-elect in the chapel or oratory of the chamber appointed for the use of the prior and prayed his consent, which, after an interval for deliberation, he granted about the third hour of the day.

(2) Certificate by Hugh Garnet, literate, as to the execution of the bishop's mandate to him and to John Ingram, the bishop's apparitor, and Thomas Payne, literate, to cite all opponents of the election to appear before the bishop or his commissary in the chapel in Woky manor on 16 February.

After the said decree and certificate had been read, the said proctor (Master Thomas Merssh) prayed that all objectors to the election might be summoned by proclamation in the bishop's presence, and afterwards at the doors of the chapel, which was done by Thomas Smyth, the bishop's apparitor-general, but 1456. with no result; whereupon the bishop precluded all objectors from making any further objections or allegations, and decreed that the business of the election should proceed.

Thereupon the proctor handed in certain articles extracted from the decree of election (the articles are twenty-two in number and set out the successive stages of the election as given in the above decree) and offered to prove the same. In proof thereof he produced (1) letters of Humphrey, duke of Buckingham, earl of Hereford, Stafford and Northampton, dated 16 December, 34 Henry VI, granting to the prior and convent licence to elect an abbot; (2) letters of the same to the bishop, dated at London, 25 January, 34 Henry VI, notifying him of his patronal consent to the election of Sir Thomas Tyler as abbot; and (3) a notarial instrument signed and subscribed by John Dygon, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notary-public, testifying that on 6 December, 1455, Walter Bekynsfeld freely and absolutely resigned his abbacy into the bishop's hands, and that his resignation was admitted by Master John Stokes, the bishop's commissary-general, in the presence of Thomas Tyler, William West, William Goodman and John Spaldyng, canons of the abbey. He also produced as witnesses to the truth of the said articles John Coterell and William Rompney, canons of the abbey, Adam Brytton of Keynesham, and William Townesende of Bytton in the diocese of Worcester. The examination of these witnesses was committed by the bishop to Master John Stokys, commissary-general; and, after they had been examined, their depositions and the above muniments and letters were published.

Thereupon the bishop, after diligently scrutinising the whole process of the election, pronounced sentence of confirmation thereof (recited), and the abbot-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience (recited), including an oath to observe and secure the observance of the injunctions laid on the abbey by the bishop in his late visitation as ordinary, as well as any future injunctions which might be made by the bishop's authority.

Then the bishop admitted the abbot-elect and confirmed to a kiss, gave orders for his induction and installation (recited), and blessed him.

The abbot then took another oath of obedience and sub- 1456. jection (recited), and the bishop issued letters de intendendo to the subprior and convent (recited), and letters testimonial touching the confirmation of the election (recited). 'I. TOUKER.'

1644. Process of the election of Dan Walter More as abbot of Glastonbury.

On 10 May, 1456, in the chapel in Wells palace, Richard Touker, notary-public, proctor of Thomas Pole, prior, and the convent or chapter of Glastonbury, appeared before the bishop sitting there judicially and handed in his letters of procuration, as follows:-

Appointment by the prior and convent of William Lydford, Thomas Glastyngbury, Robert Nuton and William Frampton, their fellow-monks, Master Thomas Mark, bachelor in laws, Thomas Kenegey, proctor-general of the court of Canterbury. and Richard Touker and Thomas Hawkyns, notaries-public, as their attorneys to obtain confirmation of the election of Walter More, their fellow-monk, as abbot. The chapter-house, 9 May, 1456.

Then the said proctor notified the bishop of the election of Dan Walter More as abbot, and handed in the decree of election. as follows:-

Decree of the election by Thomas Pole, prior, and the convent of Glastonbury, subscribed by Robert Kent, bachelor in laws, of the diocese of Canterbury, Thomas Haukyn, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, and Thomas Mark, clerk, of the same diocese, notaries-public, testifying that on the death of Nicholas Frome, the late abbot, on 24 April last, and after his burial in the conventual church, the prior and convent, after obtaining the king's licence to elect a successor, met together in the chapter-house on 4 May, and fixed the following Friday, 7 May, as the date of the election, decreeing that all who had a right or interest in the election should be cited for that day; that on the said 7 May, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost at the high altar, the following brethren having a voice in the election, to wit Thomas Pole, prior, Thomas Barton, John Bradford, William Leuesham, precentor, Thomas Haselgrove, refectorer, John Kensek, John Totford, master of the 1456. school, John Codworth, almoner, David Landaff, subprior, William Ludford, steward, Thomas Elmere, medarius, Thomas Braban, John Peryton, chamberlain, Walter More, sacristan. William Innocent, infirmarer, Henry Canon, gardener, John Russel, keeper of the order, John Brygge, hosteler, William Rendall, succentor, Thomas Clerk, kitchen steward (coquinarius), Walter Nony, sub-almoner, John Wedmore, keeper of the chapel of St. Mary, Henry Bourne, Thomas Glastenbury, cellarer of the hall, William Bedmyster, Thomas Comer, William Cleve, archdeacon, Robert Newton, keeper of the anniversary, John Selwode, receiver (receptor), Thomas Gloucestre, Thomas Paulett, Thomas Dapervile, third prior, William Frampton, treasurer, John Mylverton, John Lambrok, John Crosse, John Sutton, John Wellyngton, John Congesbury, William Pederton, Thomas Toryton, John Bodmyn, Walter Rusteley, John Sant, John Tanton, Thomas Excetre, Thomas Worspryng and Edward Marche,—there being no others having a voice in the election except the under-mentioned John Grenehurst,-met together in the chapter-house and asked the following to remain with them, to wit Master Hugh Sugar, Master John Morton and Master John Lylleford, doctors of laws, as counsellors and directors, Robert Kent and Thomas Mark, bachelors in laws and notariespublic, and Thomas Haukyn, notary-public, as scribes, and Nicholas Collys, James Aas and William Skyppewith, clerks, as witnesses; that on reading the names of the brethren John Peryton appeared as proctor of John Grenehurst, who was sick in the infirmary; that, after the hymn Veni Creator had been sung and the king's licence to elect, dated 30 April, 34 Henry VI. (recited),1 had been read, the prior admonished all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons, and all others having no right to take part in the election, to withdraw; that thereupon, after Sir Nicholas Bourton, chaplain, had produced a certificate under the seal of the official of the peculiar jurisdiction of Westlydford, dated 7 May, witnessing that in pursuance of the prior and convent's orders he had personally cited all the brethren individually on 4 and 5 May to be present at the election, and after all persons claiming a voice in the election had repeatedly

been cited in the chapter-house and summoned by proclamation 1456. at the door thereof, with no result, the prior, with the assent of the chapter, decreed that the election should proceed; that thereupon, after Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, had read the constitution *Quia propter* and expounded the forms of election contained therein, the prior and convent, after deliberation, decided to proceed by the form of delegation (compromissi), and appointed nine brethren, to wit Walter More, Robert Newton, Thomas Dapervile, Thomas Haselgrove, John Totford, John Codworth, Thomas Glastonbury, John Selwode and William Frampton, as delegates, giving them power, until the hour of chapter of the following day only, to nominate, either unanimously or by a majority of votes, one of themselves or some other member of the monastery for election as abbot, and then to appoint one of their number to elect the said nominee in common, on behalf of the delegates and the whole chapter; that the said delegates thereupon withdrew to the lower part of the chapter-house, and there, after debating the matter privately, nominated Walter More as abbot, acting unanimously, except for the said Walter himself, and appointed Robert Newton to elect him in common; that they then returned whence they came, and Robert Newton elected the abbot in common on behalf of himself, the other delegates and the whole chapter; that the prior and the other brethren thereupon authorised John Crosse publicly to announce the said election to clergy and people, and then, singing the Te Deum, bore the abbot-elect to the high altar; that John Crosse then made his announcement in the vulgar tongue; that the prior and certain of the brethren then met together in the chapter-house and appointed William Leuesham and John Codworth as their proctors to intimate to the abbot-elect his election, and obtain his consent thereto; and that the said proctors thereupon repaired to him in the prior's upper chamber and prayed his consent, which, after an interval for deliberation, he granted.

After the reading of the said decree of election, the said proctor (Richard Touker) prayed that all objectors to the election might be cited to appear in the parish church of St. John the Baptist, Glastonbury, on Saturday next: which was done.

1456. Then the bishop, at the petition of the said proctor, issued a commission to Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, and Master Luke Laucok, doctor of decrees, as follows:—

Commission to them to examine and discuss the election, either in the bishop's diocese or, if necessary, in the diocese of London, after first obtaining the consent of Thomas, bishop of London, and to confirm the same, if found canonical. Wells palace, 12 May, 1456.

On 15 May, the said proctor appeared before Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, the bishop's chancellor and commissary, as he sat before the tribunal in the said parish church of St. John, and produced the decree of election and also a certificate of the execution of the citation of objectors referred to above. After the certificate had been read, the commissary caused all objectors to the election to be summoned by proclamation in the said church and at the door thereof by Thomas Smyth, his mandatory, but with no result; whereupon he precluded all objectors from raising any further objections, and decreed that the election should proceed.

Thereupon the proctor exhibited a summary petition and certain articles extracted from the decree of election (the articles are twenty-eight in number and set out the successive stages of the election as given in the decree of election), and offered to prove the same. In proof thereof he produced the king's licence to elect and six witnesses, to wit John Codworth, David Landaff and William Innocent, monks of the monastery, and Thomas More, William Haket and William Frye, laymen, of the parish of Pylton. The commissary admitted the said witnesses and caused them to be sworn on the Gospels; and then, with the consent of the said proctor, prorogued the business of the election until Thursday in Whitsun week next in the conventual church of St. Bartholomew by Smythfeld, London, having first obtained the licence of Thomas, bishop of London. Subsequently, he privately examined the six witnesses one by one, and caused their depositions to be put into writing.

On the aforesaid Thursday, to wit 20 May, the said proctor appeared before the commissary as he sat before the tribunal in the said church of St. Bartholomew, and produced the following instruments:—

(1) Licence by Thomas, bishop of London, for the business 1456. of the confirmation of the election to be carried on in the city or diocese of London. Orset, 14 May, 1456.

(2) Consent by Henry VI. to the election of Walter More as

abbot. Westminster, 13 May, 34 Hen. VI.1

After these had been read, the proctor demanded that the depositions of the witnesses should be published; which was done. Then he exhibited by word of mouth all the acts, exhibits and depositions in the business, and prayed that the matter might be brought to a conclusion; which was done. Then he demanded sentence of confirmation; and the commissary, after scrutinising the whole process of the election, pronounced sentence of confirmation in accordance with the form of a paper schedule which he held in his hand (recited). Thereupon, the abbot-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience (recited).

Subsequently, the bishop sent to the king a certificate of the confirmation of the election (recited), dated in Wells palace, 22 May, 1456.

He also sent letters patent (I) to the abbot-elect and confirmed testifying to the confirmation of his election, (2) to the archdeacon of Wells ordering the induction and installation of the abbot, and (3) to the prior and convent ordering them to obey the abbot.

Subsequently, on Sunday, 30 May, the abbot-elect and confirmed, during mass in the chapel in Wells palace, made a public profession or oath of obedience to the bishop (recited), reading from a parchment schedule which he held in his hands. He then signed the schedule with the sign of the cross and delivered it to the bishop.

Thereupon, the bishop blessed the abbot and handed him a pastoral staff, in the presence of Master Nicholas Carent, dean of Wells, John Trevenaunt, provost of Wells, John Wansford and John Morton, residentiary canons of Wells, William Lydford, David Landaff, John Russel, Robert Newton, and William Frampton, monks of Glastonbury, and many others.

1645. Process on confirmation of the election of Dan John Selwode as abbot of Glastonbury.

On 29 November, 1456, Master Thomas Merssh, canon of Wells, proctor of Thomas Pole, the prior, and the convent of Glastonbury, appeared before the bishop as he sat before the tribunal in the chapel in the manor of Wells, and exhibited his

letters of procuration and the decree of election.

Then Thomas Smyth, the bishop's apparitor-general, appeared before the bishop and handed in a certificate of the execution of the bishop's order to him and others to cite all objectors to the election. After this had been read, public proclamation was made, first in the bishop's presence and then at the doors of the chapel, calling upon all objectors to propound their objections then and there; and, as no objector appeared, the bishop precluded all persons from making any objections in future.

Then the aforesaid proctor handed in certain articles extracted from the decree of election, and offered to prove the same; and in proof thereof handed in the aforesaid decree of election

as follows:-

Decree of election by Thomas Pole, prior, and the convent or chapter of Glastonbury, dated 17 November and subscribed by Robert Kent, bachelor in laws, of the diocese of Canterbury, notary-public, testifying that on the death of Walter More, the late abbot, on 22 October last, and after his burial in the conventual church, the prior and convent, after obtaining the king's licence to elect a new abbot, met together in the chapter-house on 12 November, 1456, and fixed Saturday, 13 November, as the date for celebrating the election, and admonished all the brethren then present to appear on that day; that on the said 13 November, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost at the high altar, the following brethren, to wit Thomas Poole, prior, Thomas Barton, John Bradford, William Leuesham, precentor, Thomas Haselgrove, refectorer, John Kenseke, John Totford, subprior, John Codworth, sacristan, David Landaff, almoner, William Lydford, outer (forinsecus) cellarer, Thomas Elmor, medarius, Thomas Braban, keeper of the order, John Peryton, chamberlain, William Innocent, infirmarer, Henry Canon, gardener, John Russel, John Brygg, hosteler, William

Rendal, pittancer, Thomas Clerk, Walter Nony, John Wedmor, 1456. inner (intrinsecus) cellarer, Henry Bourne, third prior, William Bedmystre, treasurer, Thomas Comer, William Clyve, archdeacon, Robert Newton, kitchen steward, John Selwode, receiver (receptor), Robert Newton, Ritchen Steward, John Serwode, receiver (receptor), Thomas Glouceter, Thomas Paulet, succentor, Thomas Dapervile, William Frampton, John Mylverton, John Lambrok, John Crosse, John Sutton, John Welyngton, John Congesbury, William Pederton, Thomas Toryton, John Bodmyn, Walter Rustley, John Sant, John Tanton, Thomas Excetre, Thomas Worspryng, Edward Marche, Henry Langley and Robert Cammel, -there being no others having a voice in the election,-met together in the chapter-house, and, after the word of God had been expounded by John Crosse and the names of the monks had been read aloud, chose the following persons to remain with them, to wit Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, as their counsellor and director, Master Robert Kent, bachelor in laws, and Thomas Haukyn, notaries-public, as scribes, and Nicholas Collys and James Aas, clerks, as witnesses; that, after the hymn Veni Creator had been sung and the king's licence to elect dated 7 November, 35 Henry VI. (recited) 1 had been read, the prior admonished all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons, and all others having no right to take part in the election, to withdraw; that thereupon, after Master Hugh Sugar had read the constitution beginning Quia propter and expounded the forms of election contained therein, the prior and convent, after deliberation, decided to proceed by the form of simple delegation (compromissi) and appointed Robert Newton and John Selwode as delegates, giving them, and seven other brethren to be nominated by them, full power during the whole of that day to nominate one of themselves or some other member of the monastery for election as abbot; that thereupon the said Robert and John reported to the prior and chapter that they could not agree on the seven brethren to be nominated by them, and therefore resigned their powers; that the prior and convent then decided to proceed by way of scrutiny, and nominated Robert Newton, John Selwode and William Frampton as scrutators, giving them power to ascertain secretly and individually,

1456. in the presence of a notary and witnesses, first of all the votes of themselves and then the votes of the remainder of the brethren. and to commit the said votes to writing and then announce them in the chapter-house to the prior and convent in common; that the said scrutators then withdrew to a corner of the chapterhouse, and proceeded to count the votes, but before the votes had been announced the prior and convent of their own accord withdrew from the way of scrutiny and unanimously appointed Thomas Haselgrove, John Totford, John Codworth, Thomas Elmore, William Clyve, Thomas Dapervile and John Crosse as delegates, giving them power, until the ninth hour of the following Monday, unanimously or by a majority, to nominate one of themselves or some other member of the monastery for election as abbot; that the prior and chapter then adjourned the business of the election until Monday, 15 November, at the eighth hour; that on the said Monday the seven delegates appeared before the prior and chapter and publicly stated that they had had no communication among themselves as to the person to be nominated and were unwilling to proceed further by such way of delegation; that thereupon the prior and chapter revoked the power granted to them, and debated by what way they should now proceed; that at last they unanimously decided to proceed by way of limited or determinate delegation in accordance with the chapter Cum expediat, de eleccione lib. j. vj°., and appointed William Clyve, Thomas Dapervile and William Frampton as delegates, giving them power to ascertain secretly and individually, in the presence of a notary and witnesses, first of all their own votes, and then the votes of the rest of the brethren, and to put the same in writing and announce them publicly, after which one of them should elect as abbot, in the name of the whole convent or chapter, the person receiving the majority of votes; that the said delegates then withdrew to a corner of the chapter-house and carried out their commission as follows, to wit first of all each of them in succession was adjured by his two colleagues to vote for an abbot, and each voted for John Selwode, whereupon the remaining brethren in succession were similarly adjured by the three delegates, and

all the brethren (as enumerated 1) similarly voted for John Sel- 1456. wode, except John Selwode himself, who voted for Robert Newton; that thereupon, after the votes had been put in writing, William Clyve, one of the delegates or scrutators, was commissioned by his two colleagues to announce the votes to the prior and chapter in the chapter-house and make the requisite comparison of them, and Thomas Dapervile, another delegate, was commissioned by his two colleagues to elect as abbot, on behalf of the whole chapter, that person who should receive the majority of votes; that the delegates then returned to the prior and the rest of the brethren, and William Clyve announced that of the forty-eight monks of the abbey who were present and had a voice in the election forty-seven had voted for John Selwode, whereupon Thomas Dapervile elected the said John as abbot (deed of election recited); that the prior and brethren then authorised William Frampton to announce the said election to clergy and people, after which, chanting the Te Deum, they bore the abbot-elect to the high altar; that William Frampton then made his announcement of the election; that the prior and many of the brethren then met together in the chapterhouse and appointed William Leuesham, John Totford and John Codworth as their proctors to obtain the consent of the abbot-elect to his election; and that about the eleventh hour the said proctors repaired to the abbot in a chapel in the prior's inn and prayed his consent, which, after an interval for deliberation, he granted (deed of consent recited).

The above-mentioned proctor then produced certain witnesses, who were sworn and examined and their depositions published.

Thereupon, after the proctor had exhibited all the acts etc. concerning the election, the bishop proceeded to pronounce sentence of confirmation thereof (recited).

Then the abbot elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience (recited), and the bishop admitted him to a kiss.

On the following day, 30 November, during high mass, the bishop blessed the abbot, and the abbot made a public profession

- 1456. of obedience to the bishop (recited), reading from a parchment schedule which he held in his hands and afterwards signed with the sign of the cross.¹
- 1457. 1646. Election of Thomas Thornbury as prior of Berlich.

On 19 February, 1456[-7], in the parish church of Bradford, Master John Stokes, canon of Wells, the bishop's commissary in the matter of the confirmation of the election of Thomas Thornbury, canon regular of the priory of Berlich, as prior thereof, after examining and discussing all the merits and circumstances of the election and scrutinising the whole process thereof, proceeded to pronounce sentence of confirmation (recited), reading from a paper schedule which he held in his hands.

Instruments recited:—

(I) Commission by the bishop to the prior of Taunton and Master John Stokys, the bishop's commissary-general, to examine the process of the election and confirm it if found canonical; the bishop having caused all objectors to the election to be cited to appear at a certain day and place, but being unable to proceed further in the matter in person. Banwel, 13 February,

(2) Decree of election by John Hampton, the subprior, and the convent of Berlich, dated 10 February, 1456[-7], and subscribed by John Touker, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notary-public, testifying that on the death of Thomas Bury, the late prior, on 23 January, 1456[-7], and after his burial in the conventual church on 25 January, the subprior and the following canons of the priory, to wit John Holcomb, Robert Crukern, Thomas Taunton, precentor, Thomas Thornbury, cellarer, Hugh Hunt, refectorer, and William Rede, sacristan, assembled in the chapter-house on Tuesday, I February, and fixed Saturday, 5 February, as the day for celebrating the election of a new prior, there being no others besides the above brethren who could claim any voice in the election; that on the said

Saturday, after celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost in the 1457. choir, the subprior and the above brethren met in the chapterhouse, and, after the word of God had been expounded to them in the vulgar tongue and the hymn Veni Creator had been sung, excluded all except themselves and certain persons whom they retained as necessary in the act of election, and appointed the subprior as their proctor to admonish all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons, and all others having no right to take part in the election, to withdraw, which the said subprior did (admonition recited); that thereupon, after Master John Stokes, bachelor in decrees, had read the constitution Quia propter and declared the forms thereof, the subprior and convent, without any discussion as to the person to be elected, there and then, by divine grace from above and the inspiration of the Holy Ghost, as they firmly believe, unanimously and with one voice elected Thomas Thornbury, their fellow-canon, a man well qualified by birth, age, orders, character and learning, to be their prior, and then, chanting the Te Deum, bore him to the high altar, where the customary prayers were said over him by the subprior, and then ordered Thomas Taunton to announce the election to clergy and people in the vulgar tongue; that immediately afterwards John Hampton, Robert Crukern, Hugh Hunt and William Rede assembled in chapter in the chapter-house and appointed John Holcomb and Thomas Taunton as their proctors to obtain the consent of the prior-elect to his election; and that about the eleventh hour the said proctors repaired to the prior in an upper chamber commonly called the infirmary chamber and prayed his consent, which, after an interval for deliberation, he granted about the first hour after mid-day (deed of consent recited). There were present with the subprior and brethren at the proceedings on I January (recte February) John Lewis and John Dygon, clerks, notaries-public, and at the proceedings on 5 February Master Thomas Pay, bachelor in decrees, Master Thomas Overay, bachelor in laws, the aforesaid John Lewis and John Dygon, of the dioceses of Bath and Wells and Llandaff, and John Touker, notary-public, as scribe.

Afterwards the prior-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience and received letters testimonial of his election.

1457. letters to the archdeacon of Taunton for his installation, and letters to the subprior and convent for obedience to be rendered to him. Present, the prior of Taunton, Master Thomas Overay, official of the archdeacon of Taunton, and John Touker and John Lewis, notaries-public.

1647. Confirmation of the election of John Holford as master of the hospital of St. John, Bruggewater: an election by way of scrutiny.

On Tuesday after Palm Sunday, 12 April, 1457, in the chapel in Woky manor, the bishop, on presentation to him of the election of John Holford, brother of the said hospital, as master thereof,—the said master-elect being present in person—and after the muniments, documents and proofs of the election had been produced before him, proceeded to pronounce sentence of confirmation (recited). Thereupon the master-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical subjection and obedience (recited), and then received letters of confirmation of his election, letters to the archdeacon of Taunton for his induction and installation, and letters to the president and convent of the hospital for obedience to be rendered to him.

Instruments recited:-

(1) Decree of election by Roger Cory, president, and the chapter of the hospital, dated 7 April, 1457, and subscribed by John Touker, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notary-public, testifying that on the resignation of the aforesaid Roger Cory, the last master, after licence to elect a new master had been obtained from Richard, duke of York, earl of Ulster, lord of Wigmore and Clare, and William, lord la Zouche and Saymour, founders and patrons of the hospital, John Holford, the then president of the convent and hospital, and the following brethren of the hospital, to wit Roger Cory, William Radewel, John Croyel, Edward Chauntrell, Roger Parys, Ellis Bertram, John Gyles and John Wemdon, assembled in the chapter-house on Monday, 28 March, 1457, and John Holford, with the assent of the others, fixed Monday, 4 April, as the day of the election, peremptorily admonishing all the brethren then present to attend on that day; after which the said John Holford and the rest

of the brethren present caused John Bevice, Walter Norman 1457. and John Spencer, brethren professed in the hospital who were absent and apostate, and all others having a voice in the election, to be publicly cited and warned to be present on the said day; that on the said 4 April, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost in the choir, the aforesaid president and brethren assembled in chapter in the chapter-house, and, after the word of God had been expounded to them in Latin and the hymn Veni Creator had been sung, chose the following persons to remain with them, to wit Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, as their counsellor and director, Master John Touker, notarypublic, as their scribe, and Masters Robert Wode, licentiate in decrees, Thomas Overay, bachelor in decrees, John Lewis, John Dygon and Nicholas Collys, notaries-public, as witnesses; that thereupon the president and convent caused John Bevice, Walter Norman and John Spencer, who were not present, to be publicly summoned by proclamation at the door of the chapter-house and in the choir of the church, but without result, whereupon the president pronounced them contumacious and decreed that the election should proceed in their absence (decree recited); that thereupon, after the licences to elect had been read, the president admonished all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons, and any others who ought not to be present, to withdraw (admonition recited); that thereupon, after Master Hugh Sugar had read the constitution Quia propter and declared the ways and forms of election described therein, the president and brethren, after deliberation, decided to proceed by way of scrutiny, and elected and nominated John Holford, John Croyel and Edward Chauntrel as scrutators, giving them power to ascertain secretly and individually, in the presence of a notary and witnesses, first of all their own votes and then the votes of the rest of the brethren, and to commit the votes to writing and straightway announce them publicly in common and make the requisite comparison (collatio) of them,—or else for Edward Chauntrel to make the said publication and comparison with the assent of his colleagues,—and then for the said Edward Chauntrel, in the name of himself, his fellow-scrutators, and the whole chapter or convent, to elect as master of the hospital

1457. that person who should receive the majority of votes; that the said scrutators then went apart from the rest of the brethren. taking with them a notary and witnesses, and carried out their commission as follows, to wit first of all each of them in succession was required by his two colleagues to vote for a master, with the result that John Holford voted for Roger Cory, John Croyel for Thomas Ile, prior or master of the hospital of St. John the Baptist, Wells, and Edward Chauntrell for John Holford, and then the remaining brethren were similarly required to vote, with the result that Roger Cory, William Rodewel, John Gyles and John Wemdon voted for John Holford, and Roger Parys and Ellis Bertram for Thomas Ile: that thereupon, after the votes had been put in writing, Edward Chauntrel, with the assent of his fellow-scrutators, announced and read them to the chapter, and then made the requisite comparison of them (recited), adding that John Holford was nominated not only by the larger but by the sounder (sanior) part of the convent, since William Rodewel and Roger Cory, who voted for him, were the eldest of the brethren, and Roger Cory had lately been master of the hospital, and moreover all the five who voted for him were far more zealous for the good of the hospital than the three who voted for Thomas Ile; that thereupon the said Edward, on behalf of himself and his fellow-scrutators and the whole chapter or convent, elected John Holford as master (deed of election recited); that thereupon the president and the rest of the brethren authorised John Wemdon to announce the said election to clergy and people in the vulgar tongue, and appointed John Gyles as their proctor to obtain the consent of the master-elect to his election. and then, chanting the Te Deum, bore the master-elect to the high altar, where John Wemdon made his announcement; and that about the first hour of the same day John Gyles repaired to the master-elect in a parlour on the west side of the cloister and prayed his consent to the election, which, after an interval for deliberation, he granted about the third hour after mid-day (deed of consent recited). 7 April, 1457.

1648. Confirmation of the election of Dan Robert Hylle, monk of Athelneve, as abbot.

On 11 March, 1457[-8], in the chapel in Woky manor, the bishop, on presentation to him of the decree of election of the said Robert as abbot,—the abbot-elect being present in person,—and on production to him of certain muniments and documents concerning the election, proceeded to pronounce sentence of confirmation (recited). Thereupon the abbot-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience (recited), swearing especially to observe and secure the observance of the injunctions lately laid on the abbey by the bishop in his late visitation as ordinary, and any similar future injunctions, and the bishop wrote letters to the archdeacon of Taunton for the induction and installation of the abbot, and letters to the prior and convent ordering them to obey him.

On the following day, to wit Sunday the feast of St. Gregory the Pope, 12 March, 1457[-8], during mass in the said chapel, the abbot-elect and confirmed made and read a profession or oath of obedience (recited), which he subscribed with his own hand, making the sign of the cross, whereupon the bishop blessed him and handed to him a pastoral staff. 'JOHN TOUKER.'

Instrument recited:-

Decree of election by William Burnel, the prior, and the convent of Athelneye, dated 28 February, 1457[-8], and subscribed by John Touker, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notary-public, testifying that on the death of Dan John Pederton, the late abbot, on 10 February last, and after his burial in the conventual church on 11 February, the prior and the following monks, to wit William Criche, subprior, John Punne, precentor, John Corwyl, sartarius, John Laurence, kitchen steward (coquinarius), John Bokelond, Robert Hylle, steward, William Wylkys and Thomas Braye, after obtaining from the king the necessary licence to elect a new abbot, met in chapter in the chapter-house on Tuesday, 21 February, and appointed the following Monday,

1458. 27 February, as the day of the election, there being no others in the convent who could claim a voice in the election, after which they caused Thomas Henton and John Braye, brethren professed in the monastery who were absent and apostate, and all others having a voice in the election, to be publicly cited and warned to be present on that day; that on the said 27 February, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost in the choir, the abovementioned prior and brethren assembled in the chapter-house, where, after the chanting of the hymn Veni Creator and the withdrawal of all persons except those having a voice in the election and certain others retained as necessary in the act of election, the names of the brethren were read, and Thomas Henton and John Braye, who were not present, were summoned by proclamation at the door of the chapter-house, but without result, whereupon the prior pronounced them contumacious and decreed that the election should proceed in their absence; that thereupon the king's licence to elect was read and the prior publicly admonished all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons. as well as all others who ought not to be present, to withdraw; that thereupon, after the constitution *Quia propter* had been read by Master John Stokys, bachelor in decrees, who was retained to direct the business of the election, the prior and convent, without any intervening discussion as to the person to be elected, there and then, by divine grace and the inspiration of the Holy Ghost, as they firmly believe, unanimously and with one voice assumed and elected Dan Robert Hylle, their fellowmonk, a man well qualified by birth, age, orders, character and learning, to be their abbot, and then, chanting the *Te Deum*, carried him to the high altar, and caused his election to be announced to clergy and people in the vulgar tongue by Dan John Punne; that thereupon the prior, William Criche, John Punne, William Wylkys and Thomas Braye returned to the chapter-house and appointed Dan John Corwel and Dan John Bokelond as their proctors to obtain the assent of the abbot-elect to his election; and that about the eleventh hour of the day the said proctors repaired to him in an upper chamber commonly called the prior's chamber and prayed his assent, which, after an interval for deliberation, he

granted about the second hour after mid-day (deed of consent 1458. recited).1

There were present at the above proceedings on 21 February Sir Thomas Atwode, chaplain, and John Walter, literate, and on 27 February Master Thomas Overay, and Master Thomas Marke, bachelors in laws, and John Lewis, notary-public, of the dioceses of Bath and Wells and Llandaff.

1649. Confirmation of the election of John Gurman as prior of Worspryng.

On 14 April, 1458, in the conventual church of the priory of Worspryng, Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, the bishop's commissary in the matter of the confirmation of the election of John Gurman, canon of the priory of Worspryng, as prior thereof (commission recited, dated in Wells palace, 12 April, 1458), after examining and discussing the merits and circumstances of the election and scrutinising the whole process thereof, confirmed the election (sentence of confirmation recited).

Then the prior-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical subjection and obedience (recited), and received letters to the archdeacon of Wells for his installation and induction, and to the subprior and convent for obedience to be rendered to him.

Present, Master John Middelton, official of the archdeacon of Wells, Richard Touker and Nicholas Collys, notaries-public, Thomas Michel, chaplain, of the dioceses of Bath and Wells and Lincoln, and John Touker, notary-public and scribe of the acts.

Instrument recited:-

Decree of election by Richard Lussh, subprior, and the convent of Worspryng, dated 12 April, 1458, and subscribed by Nicholas Collys, clerk, of the diocese of Lincoln, and John Touker, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notaries-public, testifying that on the death of William Lusche, the late prior, on 11 March last, and after his burial in the conventual church, the subprior together with his society (persona) assembled in the chapterhouse on 24 March and appointed Thursday, 6 April, as the date

1458. of the election of a new prior; that on the said 6 April, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost at the high altar, the following canons, to wit the subprior, John Gurman, John Blake, Henry Benet, David Tayllour and Nicholas Wylly alias Weston,—there being then no other canons having a voice in the election,—assembled in the chapter-house, where, after the word of God had been propounded by William Holcot, a Carmelite Friar of Bristol, and after the names of all the canons had been read over, they chose the following persons to remain with them, to wit Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, as their counsellor and director in the business of the election. Master Nicholas Collys, notary-public, as scribe, and Master John Catour, notary-public, Friar William Holcot, Thomas Somer and Thomas Edwyn, canons of the priory not professed, as witnesses; that thereupon, after the chanting of the hymn Veni Creator, the subprior, with the assent of the rest of the chapter, admonished all suspended, excommunicated and interdicted persons, and all others who ought not to be present at the election, to withdraw (admonition recited); that thereupon, after Master Hugh Sugar had read the constitution Quia propter and expounded the forms of election contained therein, the subprior and chapter, after debate, unanimously decided to proceed by way of delega-tion, and appointed the bishop as delegate, with power to elect one of themselves as prior before St. Mark's day, to wit 25 April next, and appointed John Gurman and John Blake as their proctors to request the bishop to act as delegate; that on 8 April the bishop undertook to act, and then elected John Gurman as prior (deed of election recited); that on 12 April, after the bishop's notification of the election (notification recited, dated in Wells palace, 10 April), had been read in the chapter-house, the subprior and chapter, chanting the Te Deum, bore the priorelect to the high altar, where his election was announced to clergy and people in the vulgar tongue by John Blake; that the subprior and convent then returned to the chapter-house and authorised John Blake to obtain the assent of the priorelect to his election; and that about the seventh hour before mid-day the said John repaired to the prior-elect in the presence of Master Nicholas Collys, Thomas Somer and Thomas Edwyn,

witnesses, and prayed his consent, which he at length granted 1458. (deed of consent recited).

1650. Confirmation of the election of Dan Thomas Pipe as abbot of Mochelneye.

On 3 October, 1463, in the chapel in Banwell manor, the bishop, on presentation to him of the decree of election of Dan Thomas Pippe, monk of Mochelneye, as abbot thereof,—the abbot-elect being present in person,—and on production to him of certain muniments and documents concerning the election, proceeded to pronounce sentence of confirmation (recited). After which the abbot-elect and confirmed took the oath of canonical obedience (recited), and the bishop ordered letters to be written to the archdeacon of Wells for his induction, and to the subprior and convent for obedience to be rendered to him, as well as letters testimonial of the election to the king (recited, dated as above).

Instrument recited:-

Deed of election by Thomas Cory, subprior, and the convent of Mochelneye, dated 28 September, 1463, and subscribed by John Touker, clerk, of the diocese of Bath and Wells, notarypublic, testifying that on the death of John Cherde, the late abbot, on 10 September, 1463, and after his burial in the conventual church on 13 September, and after the king's licence to elect a new abbot had been obtained, Dan Thomas Pipe, the prior, and the following monks, to wit Thomas Cory, subprior, William Mountagu, the elder, John Tyntenhull, John Pyke, Thomas Helver, William Crokehorn, John Langport, John Bracy, John Michell, William Wyke, John Brygge, John Axbrug and John Rede, met together in the chapter-house on Monday, 19 September, and the prior, with the assent of the others, fixed the following Tuesday as the day of the election, and decreed that Thomas Lodam, William Mountagu, the younger, John Elvord and John Mason, who were formerly monks of the monastery but have long been apostates and vagabonds whose dwellingplaces are unknown, as well as the monks and others having voices in the election who were not present in the chapter-house, should be admonished and cited to be present on that day,

1463. whereupon the prior and convent appointed William Crokehorn to cite the said apostates accordingly; that on the said Tuesday, 20 September, after the celebration of mass of the Holy Ghost in the choir, the prior and the following brethren, to wit Thomas Cory, subprior, William Mountagu, the elder, John Tyntenhill, steward, John Pike, precentor, Thomas Helyer, William Crokehorn, kitchen steward (coquinarius), John Langport, John Bracy, almoner, John Michel, infirmarer, William Wyke, John Brigge, sub-sacristan, John Axbrug and John Rede, met together in the chapter-house, where, after the word of God had been propounded by Master Robert Norys, bachelor in theology, and the hymn Veni Creator had been sung, they caused the reason of their meeting to be declared by Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, and the names of all the monks to be read aloud; that William Crokehorn then certified that he had cited the apostate monks as ordered, whereupon the prior, with the assent of the others, caused them to be publicly summoned by proclamation at the door of the chapter-house, and, when they did not appear, pronounced them contumacious and decreed that the election should proceed in their absence; that then, after the king's licence to elect had been read aloud, the prior, with the assent of the others, admonished all excommunicated, suspended and interdicted persons, and any others who ought not to be present at the election, to withdraw (admonition recited), after which no one remained except the aforesaid monks and the following persons who were asked to remain, to wit Master Hugh Sugar to direct the convent in the business of the election, John Touker, notary-public, to commit the acts of the election to writing and draw up the customary public instruments, and Master Robert Hurst, canon of Wells, and Master Robert Norys, bachelor in theology, as witnesses; whereupon, after Master Hugh Sugar had read and expounded the chapter Quia propter, the subprior and convent, without any intervening discussion or communication as to the person to be elected, there and then, by the inspiration of the Holy Ghost, as they firmly believe, unanimously elected Thomas Pipe, the prior, bachelor in theology, a man well qualified by birth, age, orders, character and knowledge, to be their abbot, and then, chanting the Te Deum, bore him

to the high altar, and caused his election to be announced to clergy and people in the vulgar tongue by Thomas Cory, the subprior; that the subprior and convent then met in the chapterhouse and appointed John Pyke and William Crokehorn as their proctors to obtain the assent of the abbot-elect to his election; and that about the second hour after midday the said proctors repaired to the abbot-elect in a chapel of the Virgin Mary commonly called the chapel of the infirmary, and prayed his assent, which, after an interval for deliberation, he granted about the

fourth hour after mid-day (deed of assent recited).

Witnesses present at the proceedings on 19 September, Sir
Thomas Mayow, perpetual vicar of the church of Mochelneye, and Sir William Tayllour, chaplain of the chantry of St. Katharine, Langport; and on 20 February the aforesaid Master Robert

Hurst and Master Robert Norvs.

Subsequently, on 13 October, to wit the feast of St. Edward, King and Confessor, in the chapel in Banwell manor, the bishop blessed and confirmed the abbot-elect, and the abbot made and read an oath of obedience (recited); whereupon the bishop wrote letters to the dean and chapter of Wells for the induction of the abbot into possession of a canonry and the prebend of Ilmystre in Wells cathedral, which are annexed and appropriated to the monastery of Mochelneve (recited)

1651. Process of the election or provision of John, bishop of Tenos, as master of the hospital of St. John the Baptist, Wells.

On 21 August, 1462, in the choir of the conventual church 1462. of the hospital, Thomas Ile, prior or master of the hospital, resigned his office (resignation recited) in the presence of Master Hugh Sugar, doctor of laws, the bishop's commissary, who accepted the resignation and granted licence for the convent of the hospital to proceed to the election of a new master or prior. Thereupon the prior and the following brethren professed in the hospital, to wit Stephen Compton, John Helier, William Drewe and Richard Coke, after the ways and forms of election had been expounded to them in accordance with the tenor of the chapter Quia propter, by the said Master Hugh, unanimously appointed the bishop as their delegate, giving him power to provide.

1462. nominate and elect in their behalf any suitable person as master or prior. Upon this, the bishop nominated, elected and provided John, bishop of Tenos, professed in the order of St. Augustine, a man well qualified by orders, age, character, knowledge and birth, and also licensed by apostolic dispensation to be elected master or prior of any regular order, to be master or prior of the said hospital, and caused letters testimonial of the election to be made for him (recited, dated in Banwell manor, 27 August, 1462). Thereupon the master-elect took the oath of canonical obedience, and also the oath to observe the statutes of the hospital, and the bishop issued letters to Master Hugh Sugar, chancellor, for his installation and induction as master, and to the convent of the hospital for obedience to be rendered to him.

1790. Letter (in English) from the bishop to John, duke of Somerset, informing him of the lawless behaviour of some of his tenants, as Shirborne and others, inhabiting his town of Langport, in regard to the sacraments, and praying him to use his influence. Woky, 18 April [1444].

1457 1791. Letter (in English) from the bishop to Henry, duke of or Somerset, asserting the bishop's innocence of certain charges

1792. Visitation of the abbey of Glastonbury by Thomas, archbishop of Canterbury, by metropolitical right, in 1408.

1408. On 13 September, 1408, about the hour of chapter, the abbot, prior and brethren assembled in the chapter-house in the presence of the archbishop; and, after they had seated themselves by his order in the manner of a chapter, a discourse was delivered by Walter Offcot, a monk of the abbey, who took as his theme Fiat pax in virtute tua.

Then the abbot exhibited a certificate that—in pursuance 1408. of an order from the archbishop dated in Canterbury palace, 14 August, 1408 (recited), intimating that, at the King's instigation and on an urgent request from the abbot himself, the archbishop proposed to hold a visitation of the abbey on the following 13 September, in order to appease the dissensions which had arisen there.—he had cited all the monks of the abbey to be present on that day.

When the said certificate had been read, the abbot, on bended knees, submitted himself to the judgement, correction, punishment and decree of the archbishop in regard to his rule of the monastery and any excesses or defects of his which might be discovered during the visitation; whereupon the archbishop ordered the prior and brethren to withdraw and proceed with the divine offices of the day, holding themselves ready to come to him when summoned.

Then, with the assistance of the following of his clerks, namely, Nicholas Ruyssheton and Philip Morgan, doctors of both laws, William Milton, licentiate in laws, archdeacon of Buckingham, John Bathe, canon of Wells, John Kempe, bachelor in laws, and others, he examined the abbot as to the state and rule of the monastery and the root of bitterness and dissension which then reigned therein, as is more fully contained in the quire (quaterno) of the examination; and in the afternoon of the same day and on the morrow, to wit Friday the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, he examined the officers and monks of the monastery individually, namely Thomas Coffyn, prior, Richard Bodmyn, George Croukern, Thomas Whityng, Peter Mochelney, John Barton, Henry Pyket, John Payn, Richard Hounesworth, Thomas Osemund, Walter Offcot, Baldwin Rosemond, John Taunton, William Draycote, Robert Parys, John Stapull, John Gloucestre, John Knoel, Walter Pedewell, Walter Staunton, Geoffrey Bristou, Nicholas Gaylard, John Cammell, John Broun, Robert Baryngdon, Nicholas Frome, John Pope, John Sampson, Thomas Pool, John Murlyng, William Sende, Henry Sone, John Laumport. Robert Togood, Richard Prentyse, William Newport, John Grenhirst, John Polglas, William Luyt, John Samdford, Thomas Barton, Thomas Penryn, Thomas Mudeford, John Okyngham,

1408. Richard Spyne, Richard Burnell, John Symnell, John Ledbury, John Bradeford, William Leuysham and John Aylesby, as is more fully contained in the quire of the examination, and those who were responsible for the discord then reigning in the monastery were duly punished, as follows in the acts. This done, the archbishop adjourned the visitation until the following day, Saturday.

On the said Saturday, after the abbot, prior and brethren had assembled in chapter, the prior announced to the archbishop, on behalf of himself and the whole convent, that they had not heard the submission made by the abbot on the first day of the visitation on account of the low voice in which he made it, and that if they had heard it they would have made a similar submission, which they were now ready to make, and made, prostrating themselves to the ground. Then the said prior resigned his office into the archbishop's hands on account of old age and bodily weakness and for other reasons, and prayed that notarial instruments of his resignation might be made.

This done, the archbishop ordered the brethren to go to their places; and then called the abbot and announced to him in public that John Polglas, one of his monks, had deposed against him that he had drawn to himself and kept around him men who were immature, weakminded, improvident and dishonest, not punishing offenders as he ought to do, and that owing to his example the inferior guardians and rulers of the order had not dared or cared to punish or correct offenders. Against this accusation the abbot honourably and canonically excused himself by all the brethren; whereupon the archbishop made a declaration and decree (recited) that all injunctions, by whatever authority made, and all obligations, promises and oaths made by the abbot before any superior, were null and void, and that he ought to be, and thereby was, restored to his original estate, fame, dignity, and honour, and to his original administration of the monastery.

Immediately afterwards, the archbishop called before him the following persons, namely, Richard Hounesworth, outer cellarer, John Gloucestre, inner cellarer, Nicholas Frome, almoner, John Pope, subprior, John Grenehurst, third prior, Henry Sone, hosteler, Nicholas Gaylard, chamberlain, Richard Prentyse, 1408. kitchen-steward, and William Luyt, prior's chaplain, and, after reciting their crimes, excesses and defects, relieved them of their offices and received from them their seals and keys of office.

Thereupon Master Thomas Chillynden, prior of Čhrist Church, Canterbury, who was assisting the archbishop, enquired of the abbot and brethren whether, in order to prevent delay and expense, they would empower the archbishop to appoint new officers to take the places of those released from office. To this the abbot and brethren agreed, with the proviso that it should not be drawn into a precedent; whereupon the archbishop made the following nominations and promotions, to wit George Croukerne to be prior, Robert Parys to be subprior, Robert Togood to be third prior, John Staple to be chamberlain, Walter Offcote to be almoner. William Sende to be kitchen-steward. Walter Staunton to be outer cellarer, John Knoel to be inner cellarer, and Geoffrey Bristowe to be hosteler, and delivered to those nominated their keys and seals of office.

After this had been done, he made the following decrees and ordinances, to wit that Thomas Coffyn, doctor in theology, the late prior, should have an honourable chamber in the abbey, and a servant and all other things proper to his estate and doctoral dignity, as well as a yearly pension of 10 marks for life, to be paid by the prior; that the following persons should be transferred until further order to the undermentioned places for the peace and quiet of the house, namely, Richard Hounesworth to the monastery of Hyde, John Gloucestre to the monastery of Wynchecombe, John Pope to the priory of Bath, Nicholas Frome to the monastery of St. Augustine, Canterbury, and John Polglas to the monastery of Shirbourne in the diocese of Salisbury; that Henry Sone and Nicholas Gaylard should be committed to prison within the bounds of the abbey; and that John Grenhurst, William Luyt and Richard Prentyse should return to the cloister until further order.

Then he called before him Baldwin Rosemond, a monk of the abbey, and questioned him as to a report that he had obtained from the apostolic see bulls of exemption and licences to hold ecclesiastical benefices and other privileges. This the said

1408. Baldwin denied, and he renounced and swore not to use any bulls which had been obtained for him by his friends or others, and prayed that a notarial instrument of his renunciation might be made.

This done, the archbishop adjourned the visitation to the feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist next, or any day before then, and ordered the abbot and monks to be ready to appear when summoned. He then called in certain noble and powerful persons who had come to the abbey to see the issue of the matter, namely Sir Hugh Loterell and Sir Thomas Brook, knights, and the lord of Palton, esquire, and many other clerks and laymen, and expounded to them all the proceedings of the visitation, requesting them to assist in securing the execution of all that had been done; which they all with one voice promised to do.

The following were present at the proceedings on that day, namely, Thomas, prior of Christ Church, Canterbury, Master Nicholas Ruyssheton, doctor of both laws, William Mylton, licentiate in laws, John Chitterne and John Bathe, canons of Salisbury, and John Stevenys and William Gillyng, notariespublic.

Then the archbishop caused letters to be written under his signet to the prelates of the places to which the delinquent monks were transferred,¹ and appointed 21 November next [? 1409] as the day for continuing the visitation of the abbey. He then made certain injunctions for the abbot and convent, and commissioned Master John Bathe, canon of Salisbury and Wells, and Master John Kempe, bachelor in laws, to communicate the same to them, with power to make any necessary alterations therein, to correct and punish any crimes, excesses and defects which they might find, and to proceed against any persons contradictory or rebellious. The injunctions are dated in Lambeth manor, 16 November, and the commission is dated at the same place, 27 November, 1409. The tenor of the injunctions is as follows:—

The abbot, who has hitherto been somewhat lukewarm and

remiss in discovering and correcting offences, is to be more 1408. diligent in future.

The brethren are to be present in church at all the canonical hours, none being excused except such as are compelled to be absent for some necessary cause with the knowledge of their president. They are to bear in mind that they have been dispensed by the Holy Fathers from the bodily labours enjoined on them by the rule of St. Benedict for this very purpose that they may compensate for such labours by redoubled services of praise. They are also to be assiduous in celebrating mass, after the requisite confession and preparation; and no one is to be absent from mass except for some reasonable cause approved by his confessor. If anyone keeps away from mass for several days together, he must give his reason to the abbot, or, in his absence, to the president of the convent. Absence from matins, mass or the celebration of mass, or from the other canonical hours, is to be punished by withdrawal of the whole pittance for that day; absence from vespers or compline by withdrawal of the pittance for the following day. A second offence is to be punished by withdrawal, not only of the pittance but of wine and ale as well; and a third by fasting on bread and water during the president's discretion.

In order to prevent neglect of the discipline of silence, anyone who breaks silence at all in the choir, the dormitory, or the refectory, or noticeably in the cloister, is to be punished for a first offence by the withdrawal of his pittance, for a second by the withdrawal of all drink except water, and for a third by fasting on bread and water.

In order to put an end to the scandal of incontinence among some of them, no brother is to go outside the bounds of the monastery, especially to places where women are likely to be met, without special licence from the abbot, or, in his absence, from the president; and anyone offending against this rule shall ipso facto be suspended from entering the church until he has fasted for three days on bread and water, and moreover he is not to be allowed to go outside the bounds of the cloister for a whole year.

No brother is to take to himself a clerk without a special

r408. indulgence from the abbot; and all such clerks, as well as other youths in the monastery under the age of twenty years, are to be excluded from all places of the order, especially the infirmary, and are to go straight across from table to church or school. Offences against this rule are to be visited by condign punishment at the discretion of the abbot.

The approaches to the cloister on all sides, and the entry to the infirmary, are to be barred against seculars by doors and locks.

Hunting with hounds is prohibited; and no one shall keep hounds inside or outside the monastery, except that the abbot may keep a reasonable number for the use of the parks and warren of the brethren, but these shall not be allowed in the monastery or the enclosures thereof. Anyone offending against this rule shall *ipso facto* be suspended from entering the church until he has got rid of the hounds and fasted on bread and water for three days.

In view of the heavy burden of repairing and building the houses and buildings of the monastery, a sum of 120l. is to be put aside yearly and spent on the construction and repair of the church, the refectory, the dormitory, and the chapter-house, until the work is completed; and the said sum is to be deducted proportionally from the goods assigned to the abbot's table and the goods and provents pertaining to the table of the convent or any other offices or administrations in the monastery.

The archbishop sees clearly that the fury of dissension and root of bitterness which has made the monastery a byword and a scandal in all the country round had its beginning in an impatient spirit of disobedience; and that it has been strengthened by conspiracies and meetings in corners, and by nightly potations and private feastings too long continued. He therefore charges the brethren to fulfil their solemn vow of obedience and humbly obey their abbot in all things which are not contrary to God. If anyone speaks irreverently of the abbot or resists his rule by word or deed, be the offence great or small, he is to be committed to prison and to remain there until he show fitting signs of repentance and be released at the abbot's discretion. Moreover, in order to preclude the possibility of future conspiracies

and assemblies by night or by day, all the brethren, without any 1408. exception by pretext of degree, administration, or office, are henceforth to eat in the refectory, the infirmary, or the abbot's hall, and nowhere else, and to sleep at night in the dormitory, and nowhere else; and after compline they are to devote themselves to prayer and rest only, all drinking and idle talk being forbidden, except in the case of those who are appointed by the subprior to see to the refreshment of the guests. Anyone eating in his chamber or any other private place, or sleeping outside the dormitory, shall ipso facto be suspended from entering the church until he has fasted on bread and [water] for three days, and the punishment for drinking after compline or breaking silence shall be fasting for one day on bread and water. Anyone who attends or consents to a conspiracy or assembly shall ipsofacto incur sentence of the lesser excommunication and shall not be absolved therefrom except by the bishop.

If any of the monks transferred to other monasteries are received back without the archbishop's consent, the abbot and convent shall ipso facto incur sentence of the greater excommunication.1

If any delinquent monk refuses to undergo any of the punishments for delinquency prescribed above, he shall be separated from the rule of the order (a canone) and shunned by all until he submits.

The above injunctions are to be read in chapter once a term.

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Somerset Record Society.

Report for 1934.

THE list of subscribers for 1934 shows that our numbers have not expanded as we had hoped they might when we took in hand the publication of Bishop Bekynton's Register.

During the year, we have lost, through death, Miss Clark, of Millfield, Street. It is interesting to note that Mr. W. S. Clark became a subscriber in 1891: on his death the subscription was continued by Mrs. Clark: and when she died, Miss Clark carried on the tradition. We must hope that the vacant space may be filled by another member of the family. Right at the end of the year, the passing of Walter Farrer, archdeacon of Wells, removed another valued subscriber. Resignations have been received from Miss Greenwood and Mr. Goodchild of the Western Gazette. Against these losses we have to record that Mr. H. E. Chafy, Mr. E. E. Mitchell and the Library of the University of Leeds have become subscribers.

The opportunity of 'temporary membership' which was offered by the Council a year ago has been taken by thirteen subscribers to the Canterbury and York Society. This has meant a slight increase in the amount available for the publication of the Bekynton Register, as in addition to their subscriptions for the years 1934 and 1935, several of the temporary subscribers have availed themselves of the opportunity to purchase other Episcopal Registers in our series.

Throughout the year, the work upon the Register has proceeded. Mr. Dawes has now finished the translation and Sir Henry Maxwell-Lyte's annotations and introductions are also

completed. The work has been heavy and the Society is very grateful to both of them for the care they have given to the volumes.

The expense of their publication is straining our resources severely. The balance sheet for 1934 contains no hint of this, as the accounts will not be rendered until we have passed into the financial year 1935. What is shown is that to meet them we have £288 4s. 7d. and the subscriptions for 1935. We are hopeful of making both ends meet: the only safe way of financing the Society's work is a large increase in the number of subscribers. That, we are persuaded, can only come through the personal efforts of our present supporters.
